To us it is one of the supreme moments of our lives. Perhaps you will never realize what these years of suffering and the many months of suspense, since the days of September have been to us.

For the moment we will not speak of them. The relief is too great! There is, however, one feeling that we must express and that is a feeling of indebtedness to you. It is a debt, which we shall never be able to settle, because so many had to give up their lives to bring us our freedom.

Some of us have done our share in a very unequal struggle against a ruthless enemy, but to many

of us it was a bitter thought that we could do so little in the great world.

The enemy have robbed us of many of our possessions, but there is one thing, they have never been able to take from us, because it must be offered, and that is our hospitality. The doors of our homes have been kept firmly closed against them all these years. You, however, shall find our doors and our hearts as wide open as they were shut against them.

Meanwhile the prospects of a speedy recovery look better than they ever did, so that it is likely that you will not stay long among us, but you may trust that we shall not forget.

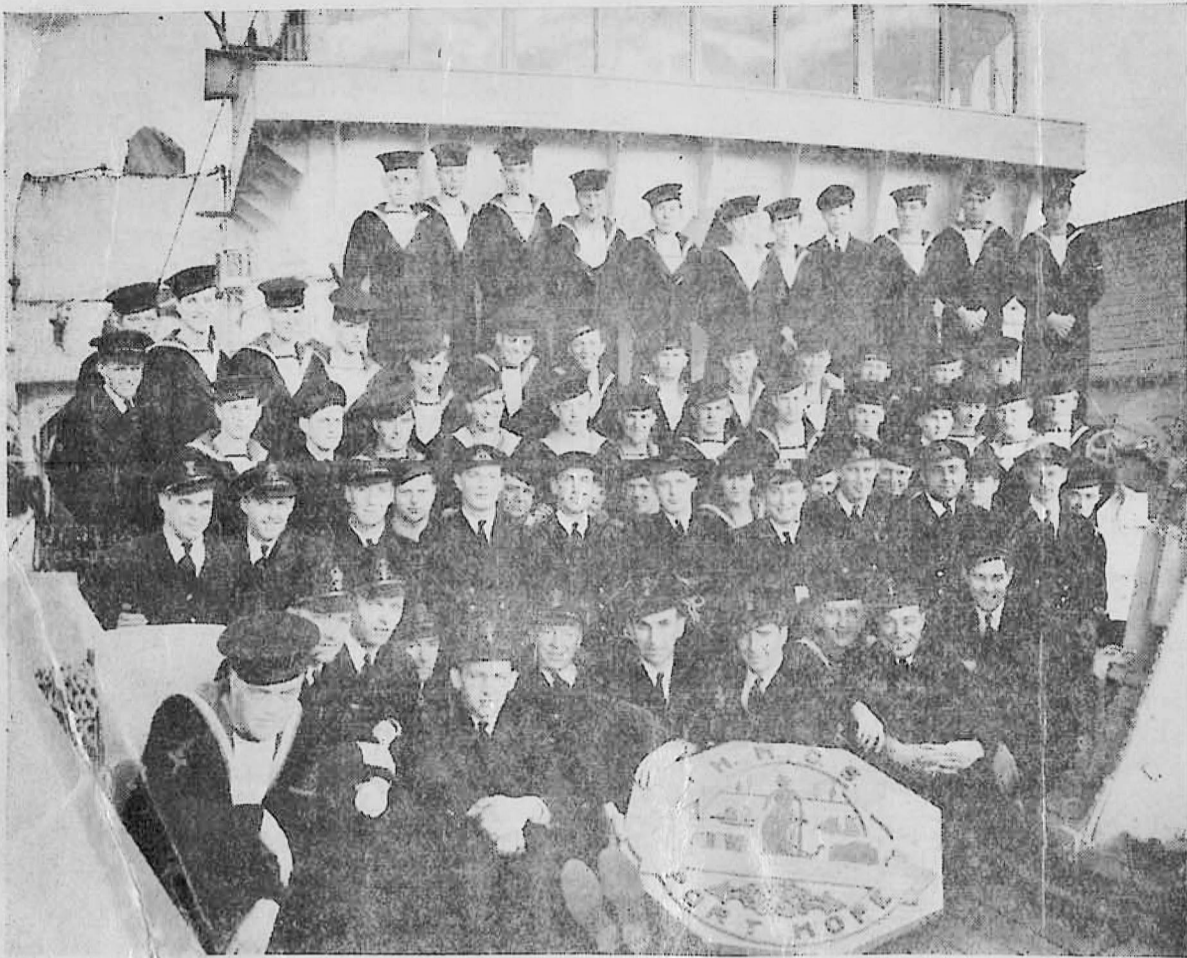

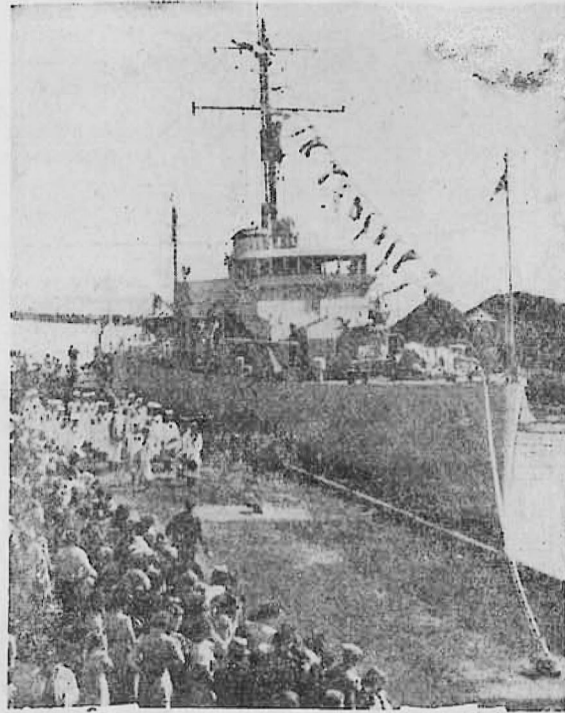

H.M.C.S. PORT HOPE IN HARBOR DEDICATION CEREMONY HERE IN 1942



"The best looked after ship" in the Canadian Navy.—H.M.C.S. Port Hope, the town's adopted minesweeper, steamed into harbor here, on Wednesday, August 5th, 1942. She was dedicated on that day. The event was marked by an impressive ceremony which was attended by a huge enthusiastic crowd. Since that memorable day, Port Hope has seen to it that the crew of "her" ship has been well supplied with comforts.

Ditty bags, washing machines, radios, leather wind-breakers, turtle neck sweaters and sea man's socks are only a few of the items provided for the crew by local citizens. The crew of the ship issued a challenge claiming that H.M.C.S. Port Hope was the best looked after ship in the Canadian Navy. There were no takers.
