In many respects Branch 30 has become almost synonymous with the Town of Port Hope. Over those past many years your members have played an exemplary role in the affairs of this community and, indeed, the Legion Hall itself has become a significant local landmark and focal point for Town activities.

The veterans of that long ago 1914-18 war established a great tradition of service through the Legion, which has been maintained and expanded by those who served Canada in later conflicts, as well as their families and friends.

May I wish you every continued success in the years to come.

## A History of Branch 30, Royal Canadian Legion.

The History of Branch 30. R.C.L. really began on April 4, 1919, when a group of Port Hope Veterans received a Charter in The G.W.V.A. Great War Veterans Association.

This group, like many other Veterans organizations were struggling to gain benefits, such as pensions, medical treatment, hospitalization, care for Widows and dependants etc. Each as a minority group were not meeting with the desired results.

In 1924 negotiations began toward forming all these organizations into one powerful unit, one with clout, one the Government would have to listen to. The result; In 1926, The Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League was formed and recognized as the "Bargaining" agent for all Veterans in Canada. All members of these organizations did not elect to go with the Legion. This was so in Port Hope. Sixteen members did decide to go with the Legion. They applied and received their Charter on the 25th May, 1927 as members of The Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League, Port Hope (Ont 30) Branch.

George Corbett was elected as the first President and served in that office for five years - 1927-1931. The membership grew slowly and several of the Charter members filled the Offices from President down for the years to and through the second World War. George Corbett, after his term as Past President, served on the executive into the late '50's, giving of his knowledge and training, guiding many new Presidents. The Auditorium in the present Hall is appropriately named. "The George Corbett Memorial Hall".

Many Veterans, both old and young, owe a great deal to another one of the Charter members for the good results in pension and other benefits assistance. This man, Arthur Fisher, had acted as Veterans Welfare Officer with the G.W.V.A.. He continued in that capacity with Canadian Legion until 1948 when he trained and handed over to Ted Harwood.

Branch 30 had little funds, no regular meeting hall, yet they carried out the duties as demanded of them by Legion Command. 1. Veterans Welfare. 2. Community projects, 3. Youth Education. and they managed to save \$2,000.00 in war Bonds. They met in homes, they rented halls to conduct fund raising programmes. Finally they met in the Town Hall until 1948 when their first hall was ready.

1. Veterans Welfare; The responsibility for Veterans Welfare lay solely on the Legion. The demands, in the early years was great and even greater during the depression years but they managed to spread their sparse funds and those of the Poppy fund very well.

2. Community; They never failed to meet the requests and demands. They set up and aided the Boy Scouts with paper salvage drives. They served all community functions, such as Dominion Day celebrations, as ticket takers, crowd control, organizing and running children's events, such as foot racing etc. and Christmas Trees for children.

3. Youth Education; The Poem and Essay programme started in those days and Branch 30 participated with some successful winners beyond the local level.

In 1942, on Mar 2nd. The name was changed to: Brig. Gen. Geo. H. Ralston (Ont 30) Branch.

At the end of World War II, with the coming home of the Younger Vets, the membership began to increase. The older Vets were reluctant to let go of the reins, at least some were, which was indeed a pity. However the young were eventually accepted and progress began.

Herbert K. Long was the first W.W. II Vet to become President. Herb. was invalided home in 1944. He immediately joined the Branch and became President in 1946. His Tenure was rough, he wanted to get things done, such as a hall, most older vets thought he wanted to go too fast, go in debt etc. He was followed by an older Vet and gentleman, Alex Murray, whose thinking was along the lines of the younger Vets. He did survey on the possibility of building a Hall and encouraged his Vice-Pres., Ted Harwood to push toward that end. The result the Hall was built in Ted Harwoods' first year as President. Alex Murray contributed a few thousand dollars to get things started and then on completion told us it was a donation. Many thanks are due him.

Thanks are also due to the late Comrade Col. Goodeve who conducted the municipal drive for funds, which netted the Branch Building Fund Approx. \$10,000.00. The Hall at the first stage of completion was paid for. The funds raised by Public subscription were deemed to be "Public Funds". This required a committee of non-member Trustees. The following were approached and cheerfully offered to serve. L.T. Sylvester, Mathews Conveyor, J.S. Owens, Port Hope Sanitary, R. Briden, Nicholson File, S. "Shorty" Free-

man, Royal Bank. They served for about 18 months. They approved the audited Statement of "Public Funds" and congratulated the President and the Branch on their efforts.

The Hall on Young St. was officially opened on Sunday Nov. 7, 1948. Again Comrade Goodeve is to be commended. He arranged the programme for the official opening; Mrs. Ralston, widow of Gen. Ralston unveiled the plaque and declared the hall officially open. The padre, Comrade John. W. Foote V.C. dedicated the Hall. Padre Comrade H.C. Boulden read the prayers. Comrade Goodeve introduced the Speakers. Maj.-Gen. Howard Graham and Brig. Ian Cumberland. Lt. Col. Comrade Lyall Carr was Parade Marshall and Past Pres. Comrade Herb. Long commanded the Colour Party. 12 Zone Branches attended along with the Midland Regt. 33rd Reg. Band Skeena Sea Cadets, Scouts, Guides, Cubs, Brownies and the ex-service Club.. Gen. Graham received the Salute on the March Past. President Harwood thanked those who participated and the Citizens, of which there was approx. 1000, for turning out.

The years following this event were quite active. The members got on with the completion of the Hall and Furnishing it. Keeping up with the Veterans programme re welfare etc., obtaining property in the Cemetery for the Veterans Plot. In the period of the '50's the umbilical Cord was cut. We were no longer called The Canadian Legion of the B.E.S.L. Our new Title being The Royal Canadian Legion., close ties however still remain with the B.E.S.L. 1956 was a year of note. Phase 2 of the Hall was completed with a ground level extension. Also that year the Ladies Auxiliary was formed. This you'll read about elsewhere so we'll not dwell on it here. There is one note of interest concerning the L.A. One should wonder why it took so long to form an L.A.. It was not from want of trying, by the young Veteran members. It appears that back in the G.W.V.A. days the older Vets had a bad experience with a L.A. and that left them prejudiced. They would have no part of it. That was a pity and big mistake. The success of the Branch 30 L.A. has proven this to be so.

The official opening of the Hall extension was made by His Excellency Vincent Massey, Governor General of Canada. It was a most memorable event and a step forward for Branch 30. All Legion programmes were on full go and sponsoring sports for youngsters was high on the list during these years.

In 1971 Russell Honey M.P. turned the sod in preparation for the building of the present Hall on Toronto Road. Mel. McMahon was President at this time. A note of interest for 1972, Geo. Corbett was presented with his fifty year sevice medal by Ted Harwood who was invited to come from Toronto for this event on Feb. 4, 1972.

Later in Dec. 1972, the new Hall was completed and was officially opened in the Spring of 1973 by the Dominion President of the Royal Canadian Legion, with Allan Lawrence M.P. as a Speaker.

The opening of the new Hall did not mean that Branch 30 was on easy street, with no problems. It did solve the problem of space, it gave the community the largest assembly hall but it put a tremendous financial strain on Branch 30. The treasurer, Alex. Ramsey had many sleepless nights figuring out how to

spread the available dollars to keep the creditors temporarily satisfied and the Bailiff from the door. Much credit must go to the President and his officers and executive, especially Alex. Ramsey, for getting Branch 30 through this rough period. It is not suggested here that the financial problem was resolved, indeed not, it is still with us, albeit somewhat easier. Let us be honest, at this point, and give credit where it is due. Without the use of names, of the 900 plus members a very small group of faithful members can take credit for the present state of Branch 30, in respect to the building, finances and organized activities and the good name it has as a Host Branch. You know who they are, try thanking them sometime by offering your assistance.

Time marches on; Those young Vets referred to earlier, for the most part are now senior Citizens. They wished to continue serving the Branch. So in 1977, a seniors group known as the 30-60 club was formed. We are sure you'll read in detail elsewhere so again we'll not dwell here except to say they deserve a lot of credit for much activity in the Branch.

We would indeed, be remiss if we did not refer to those, who, over the past few years have conducted fund raising projects, in the form of lotteries, Community assistance, thus enhancing our reputation.

In the late '70's Branch 30 took on the sponsorship of Squadron 718 of the Air Cadets, which was foundering and in danger of disbandment. Today we are happy to report they are thriving. Membership has better than doubled, projects are being completed. We are proud of them - Congratulations to them and Branch 30.

Branch 30 has reached its Jubilee year - 60 years of service to Veterans and dependants, the Community and the Nation.

A milestone looked forward to by the "OLD" members, is the burning of the Mortgage. "YOUNG" members your help is needed to advance that happy day, so that you too can say - Well done.

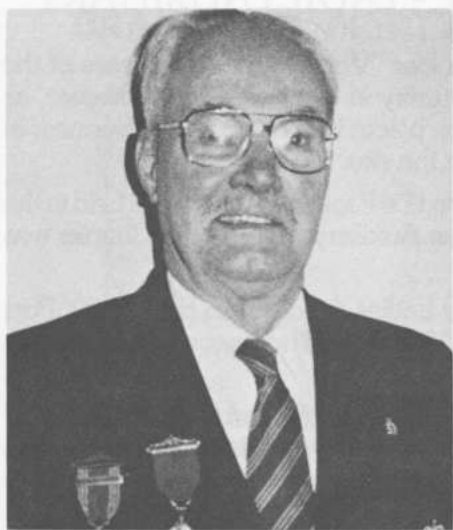

## BRANCH 30, PORT HOPE - LADIES AUXILIARY

Due to a lack of understanding by the older "Vets" in the early years of the Branch, a Ladies Auxiliary had no opportunity in being formed. However, as veterans of the Second World War took their places in conducting the business of the Branch, there was a glimmer of light in the sky.

Through the tremendous efforts of Mildred Le Page, meetings were held in the Town Hall of those interested in forming an Auxiliary. Finally, the Charter was received.

At the first meeting of the newly formed Ladies Auxiliary to Branch 30, Port Hope, held in the Town Hall, on March 22, 1956, Vida Thompson was elected its first President.

A note of interest - the dues for the first year were .25¢ each - Rent paid to the Town Hall was \$5.00 each meeting. Bank Balance at the end of the first year was \$705.22.

In the first year of its inception, the Auxiliary membership grew to approximately 85. Regulations over the years, permitting Daughters and Wives to join the Branch, has affected the L.A., in that its membership is presently still only between 80 and 90 members.

The L.A. continued holding their meetings in the Town Hall, and it was not until March 13, 1958, meetings were held in the Branch Hall.

Since 1956, two Life Memberships were presented to Vida Thompson and Mabel Doust. It is sad to report Comrade Mabel passed to her last Resting Place in January of this year.

From the beginning, the L.A. has been a bulwark for the Branch. Each year, monies were turned over to the Branch which was raised by Catering, bingoes, bazaars and many other projects. It was largely through their financial assistance, the Branch made a large donation to the Hospital Fund in 1963, also paid off the mortgage, in 1964, on the 1956 addition to the Hall on Yonge Street.

It is often said that a successful Legion Branch has a Ladies Auxiliary to be most thankful for its success. Our Branch is no exception. When the new Hall was opened in 1972, the size of the Mortgage, as well as other expenses, was staggering. However, with doggedness, perseverance, hard work, cooperation between members of the L.A. and the Branch, a light can now be seen in the not too far distance, when we can say, "We did it - We are out of debt".

To each and every member of the Ladies Auxiliary of Branch 30, Port Hope, we can only say "Thank you, we appreciate your help".

## BRANCH 30, PORT HOPE, ROYAL CANADIAN LEGION -PIPE BAND 1958 - 1987

The Port Hope Legion Pipe Band was formed in the Spring of 1958. Practices were held in different homes until Branch 30 emerged as the sponsor.

The original band had six pipers, three side drummers, two tenor drummers and a bass drummer, all of whom had prior band experience. Piper Allan MacGillis was elected Treasurer, a position he held for twenty-five years until retiring in 1984.

The money required to purchase Drums and Uniforms was obtained from private donations, dances, draws and from the Branch. The Fraser Tartan, purchased in Scotland, was used in honour of Col. J.A.V. Fraser, who represented an old military family of Port Hope, and a great nephew of Col. Arthur Williams, whose monument stands in front of the Town Hall. "Matey" Fraser, as he was known, was largely responsible for the personal donations to the cause.

Over the years, changes have taken place in the uniforms. In 1961, the jackets were changed to white tunics with green cuffs and collars made by two Port Hope Ladies, Kathleen Cookson and Patricia Burke.

During the years, many dedicated members have assumed the duties of Pipe Major, Drum Major, Drum Sergeant, but two stand out, Alex Howie and Larry Francis. In the early Seventies, when members were retiring from the Band and being transferred due to their employment, efforts were instigated to have a recruiting campaign with emphasis on youth. Forty two students enrolled for piping and drumming lessons on Tuesday evenings at the Dr. Hawkins School. Alex Howie and Larry Francis were invited to take over this instruction when it spread out to the High School as a night Class.

Many of our young pipers and drummers have won recognition all over Ontario. At the present time, Jamie York is the Pipe Major and David Nixon is the drum instructor.

Through the continued efforts of its members and supporters, and their dedication, the Port Hope Legion Pipe Band has become an organization of which Branch 30, Port Hope, the town of Port Hope and the surrounding communities, can be justly proud.

## BRANCH 30-60 CLUB

In 1977, Comrade Fred Walker and a few of his friends felt there was a need for a Club or Group within the Branch for those who were, or were approaching, the Golden Years. The intent was to provide entertainment in the form of cards, darts, music, dancing, etc.

Although the Legion Constitution does not allow groups to be formed within the Branch, unless it is governed by the Branch, a Club was formed, By-Laws were drawn up and approved by the Branch.

Since 1977, membership has grown each year. Many activities were carried out. Besides entertaining its own members, Nursing Homes and Senior Citizen Areas were visited and entertainment, etc., was provided at no cost to the recipients.

In April 1984, after much research and hard work a total of \$11,916.00 was received from the government Smoke Eaters in the Lounge and Games Room, purchased a new organ for the Lounge, obtained musical instruments, costumes, etc., so that members may entertain with Dance Groups, Comedy Skits, Choir, etc.

In the first year, there were 24 members. The Club has now grown to 180 members. In November 1987, the Club will celebrate its Tenth Anniversary.

Membership is restricted to those who are paid up members of Branch 30, Port Hope. A person must be sixty years of age (Spouse - any age). Also, those Branch members who are retired or disabled, at least fifty years of age, may join.

If you fall into either category above, come join the Club - enjoy the card games, darts, dances, parties, bus trips, etc.

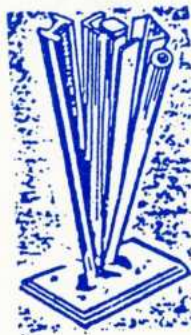
