A Strike.

BELLEVILLE, Feb. 18. -The hands in the axe factory went out on strike on Saturday, in consequence of the heavy reduction which they were asked to accept by the firm. Twelve men quit work—six grinders and as many polishers. The latter were to be reduced 17½ per cent., and the grinders 12½ per cent. The men complain that they have been making very low wages all winter.

OTTAWA. A Row in the Family.

OTTAWA, Feb. 18.—Sir Charles Tupper and Mr. Chapleau had arow at the Cabinet Council meeting on Saturday. Mr. Chapleau accused Sir Charles Tupper of bringing the country into its present uncertain financial position, and took him to task for his rail-way policy. Sir Charles said he had done the best he could under the circumstances, but intimated that this would be his last session in parliament. Mr. Chapleau asked him to resign at once. The matter was smoothed over by Sir John.

CHEATCH A WE.

Factory Durned. CHATHAM, Feb. 18—At eight o'clock Saturday night a fire broke out in a large frame building belonging to Mr. Knight, just outside the corporation and occupied by the Wagon Manufacturing Company as a store house. On account of some misunderstanding with the fire department and council, the brigade did not turn out for some time, and the building and contents were time, and the building and contents were destroyed. The fire spread to a dwelling house adjoining, which was also burned to the ground.

St. Catharines, Feb. 18.—A great deal of dissatisfaction exists amongst the joiners who are working at the cabin fittings of the Canadian Pacific railway's boats, now lying at Port Colborne. The contractors advertised widely for men, and the result was that a large number flocked to the port, and as a consequence the employers at once set about to dictate the most humiliating terms. The bulk of the work to be done was carpentering, and the stuff was already cut and pre-pared for matching in Montreal. They were supposed to receive 20 cents per hour for putting it together, but on the most trifling occasions all hands were knocked off, so the result was that the average earning of the men did not exceed \$4.50 to \$5 per week out of which they had to pay \$3.50 for their

The Brooklyn Driven Well System.

This "plant" is situated on a farm about two and a half miles beyond East New York, alongside of the aqueduct which supplies water to the city of Brooklyn. Water is ob-tained from 100 2-inch tubes (or driven wells) driven from 40 to 100 feet into the ground by means of a simple portable pile driver, worked by hand.

worked by hand.

These 2-inch tubes are driven in two rows, the rows being 15 feet apart, and the tubes in either row being 12 feet apart. The space occupied by the tubes or driven wells is thus a small strip of ground about 800 feet in length and 15 broad. The top of each tube just at the ground surface is connected by a cross pipe with a horizontal pipe running along half way between the two rows. Sketch 1 represents a section of one of the wells and the strata—sand and water-bearing Sketch 1 represents a section of one of the wells and the strata—sand and water-bearing strata—through which the well is driven. Sketch 2 represents the plan of the plant, but this particular sketch is taken from a precisely similar plant at Jamaca, a few miles beyond. In this the wells are driven 13 feet apart each way. In every other respect the East New York and the Jamaca plants are alike. Sketch 3 represents the "receiver" with the 16-inch suction pipe which enters the pump house. Sketch 4 represents the details of the connection or cross pipe from one well to the main.

one well to the main.

It is found that when a suction pump is attached to this horizontal pipe, water is drawn by suction from all the driven wells at once. Practically the pump is not placed at house, Chatham, narrowly escaped a terrible death on Thursday night. It appears that the lady was standing with her back to the fire which was burning in the grate, when her clothing ignited and she was instantly way. From this receiver a pipe enters the way. From this receiver a pipe enters the pump house and constitutes the induction pipe to the pumps. From the pump house a discharge or delivery pipe enters the Brook-aqueduct only a few feet distant from the

pumps.

It is impossible for any one not to experience a peculiar feeling of surprise and wonder when told that this simple plant, without excavations for a large well, without reser-voirs, and without long lines of supplying conduits, is furnishing 5,000,000 gallons, or about 25,000 tons, of water daily to the city of Brooklyn. Another similar plant at Jamaica, a few miles beyond, is supplying as much more, or a total for the two stations of 12,000,000 gallons (50,000 tons) daily.

It is unnecessary to give a description of

the pumps, as any steam pump or pumping engine is adapted to this work. All that can be seen above ground, as far as the wells are concerned, are the hand wheels of the stop valves, and portions of the valves and connecting pipes, which may, if desirable, appear above the surface, and all of the plant below ground consists of the 100 2 inch tubes driven into the ground.

As a mode of obtaining large volumes of pure water for any purpose whatsoever, but especially for cities and towns, this bold but successful enterprise of the Messrs. Andrews & Co. must be considered a new departure in engineering, and an experiment of great public value and utility. W. P. Troubridge in Sanitary Engineer.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

FROM OUR REGULAR CORRESPONDENT.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11, 1884. There were lively times at the Capitot during the past week. A spirit of decided animation seemed to have been infused into both branches of the Nation legislature. In the early part of the week, Mr. Morrison introduced his much mooted tariff scheme in the House. But in this he had the field all to himself, as Mr. Converse had decided, after mature deliberation, not to introduce his counter-resolution upon the product of this counter-resolution upon the product of the shorn lamb that afternoon, some other afternoon. This had the effect of dampen-ing the ardor of Mr. Hurd, who thereupon kept his peace also, so that complete order reigned in the tariff camp. Then the lower house resolved itself into a debating society house resolved itself into a debating society on the rules, every member having a chance to enter his pet hobby, while Mr. Randall stood like a legislative Sullivan "knocking out" in one round of three minutes, each of the amateur parliamentarians in turn. The report from Mr. Randall's committee on rules provided that the rules of the House of the Forty-sixth Congress, as amended by the present House, shall be the rules for the Forty-eighth Congress until further ordered. But about fourteen amendments were there-But about fourteen amendments were there-upon submitted, nearly all of which were opposed by Mr. Randall, and suffered defeat. Mr. Anderson's amendment forbidding the floor to ex-members who used their privilege of admission for lobbying purposes, was lost, but Mr. Cox, with his usual tact and good luck, carried the House with him on his motion to continue the Census Committee.
Mr. Belford and "Calamity" Weller entertained the members by their observations,
the former in favor of his amendment prothe former in favor of his amendment providing for a clerk for each member of Congress not the chairman of a committee, and the latter by a vehement speech attacking the National Bank system. Mr. Reed also "talked right out in meeting," and gave the House and the country some needed facts on the inability of Congress to cope with the business of legislation under its present rules of procedure. He claimed that present rules of procedure. He claimed that Congress does not reach eight per cent. of total of ten thousand bills and resolutions introduced, only three hundred were passed. But the "physical imposibility," as claimed, for Congress to deal with more than a small for Congress to deal with more than a small fraction of its business might be materially lessened by giving a greater measure of time to legislation. As it is now, Congress is in session less than one-half of the time, and when in session gives itself many holidays. Except at the end of the session, Saturday is always a holiday, and Friday generally so, and fourteen the fit wenty four month are spent in vacation.

The bill providing for a new Congressional library has been made the special order in the Senate for next Tuesday, and there is reason now to hope that the effort to provide the Congressional library with suitable accom-modations will not much longer be frustrated. The library is growing steadily year by year. Twelve months ago it numbered 480,076 volumes and 160,000 pamphlets. It now contains 513,441 books and 165,000 pamphlets, not half of which can be made available for want of proper space. One has only to enter the rooms to be given "the ocular proof" of the great need of larger accomodations. The total ultimate cost of the proposed new build-ing will be \$3,362,000. and it will accommo-

date 3,000,000 books.

Fred. Douglas, the eminent colored orator, is having the truth of the old adage impress ed upon him, that the course of true love never runs smooth. His chromatic matrimonial venture has caused much family unpleasantness, and now his ex-housekeeper proposes to sue for \$3,000 for services. is said to now have a fortune of \$200,000, the foundation of which was laid by a Miss Grisfith, an English abolition enthusiast, who entered his family as a member of it, bought him a house, and set him up as the proprietor of a newspaper in Rochester, just after he

The report of the Minister of Education shows an actual decrease in the population of this province. The number of children of school age in 1874 was 511,603; in 1880, 489,924; in 1882 483,817. The total attendance was highest in 1877, when it reached 500,-989. In 1882 it was 484,985. From these returns it will be seen that the number of children between five and sixteen years of age in the Province of Ontario was nearly 28,000 less in 1882 than it was eight years earlier. This, of itself, is sufficient to show that our population is slightly decreasing and that the natural increase and the immigration have not been sufficient to overcome the loss that has gone on during the past six years emigration. It is true that a few thousand have gone from this Province into the Northwest. They are, however, only few in numbers, and not at all sufficient to account for our diminished population. These school returns are not open to the charge of being cooked at Washington. They show very clearly that there has been a very great exodus from this Province, and that that exodus went on during the period that the Tory press boasted the N. P. was conferring such lasting benefits upon the country.


