PORT HOPE, FEBRUARY 18, 1884.

It is announced that the scheme for turning the Mediterranean Sea into the Desert of Sahara, and thus rendering fertile the region round about, is soon to be realized. A French hydrographer, who has conceived a plan for doing it, has gone to carry it out. The enterprising and enthusiastic old Ferdinand de Lesseps is concerned in the great undertaking.

It is insisted on that Canada is bound to keep the treaty with British Columbia. Very good. But how is it now? A San Francisco ring has, with the connivance of the Dominion and the local governments, taken absolute possession of Vancouver Island. They own it. We people of old Canada, therefore, must tax ourselves to the extent of \$100,000,000—think of it—keep faith with whom? A gang of reprobates who corrupted a legislature and approached the Bench with a bribe. Truly things have arrived at a pretty pass under Macdonaldite government.

PREPARATIONS have begun for the World's exposition which opens in New Orleans next December. The grounds embrace 247 acres and include four lakes and a railway around the grounds. The construction of horticultural hall has been begun. It will be the largest conservatory ever erected in the world, 600 feet long and 184 feet wide. The Mexican exhibit will be very extensive. Work has also begun on the main building. It will contain between eight and nine million feet of lumber, will be 1,400 feet long and 900 feet wide, the largest exposition building ever erected except one in London. It will be lighted with 1,500 incandescent lamps. Machinery hall will be 1,400 feet long.

SIR CHARLES TUPPER declared that the Canada Pacific Railway Company could get on without the Government loan if they took the time allowed them by the contract for the completion of the road.

We say, then, by all means, let them take it. It is better that they should do that than that the country should waste \$30,000,000 by hastening. We don't believe Sir Charles Tupper. We have not the remotest confidence in his statements. But he spoke for the company, and what he said must be taken as having been spoken with their sanction, and we say that if they can complete the road by 1891 without the \$30,000,000 for which they ask, by all means take that time. We say, "Don't hurry yourselves, gentlemen. Proceed cautiously. Husband your resources. Avoid speculation, and keep your hands out of the public treasury."—*London Advertiser*.

THE report of the Minister of Education shows an actual decrease in the population of this province. The number of children of school age in 1874 was 511,603; in 1880, 489,924; in 1882 483,817. The total attendance was highest in 1877, when it reached 500,989. In 1882 it was 484,985. From these returns it will be seen that the number of children between five and sixteen years of age in the Province of Ontario was nearly 28,000 less in 1882 than it was eight years earlier. This, of itself, is sufficient to show that our population is slightly decreasing and that the natural increase and the immigration have not been sufficient to overcome the loss that has gone on during the past six years emigration. It is true that a few thousand have gone from this Province into the Northwest. They are, however, only few in numbers, and not at all sufficient to account for our diminished population. These school returns are not open to the charge of being cooked at Washington. They show very clearly that there has been a very great exodus from this Province, and that that exodus went on during the period that the Tory press boasted the N. P. was conferring such lasting benefits upon the country.

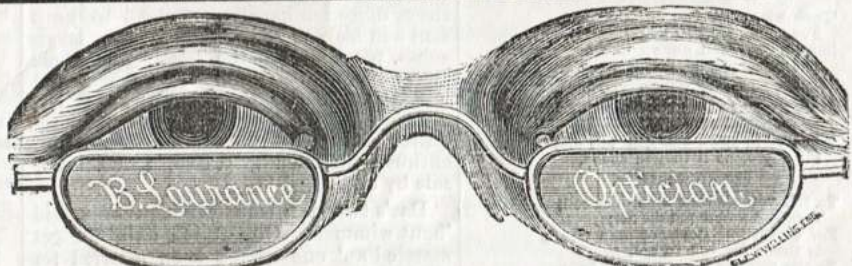
