## IT DOES NOT APPLY

Favored Nation Clause Has No Bearing Says Court

S. CUSTOMS DECISION

Finding Regarding the Treaty Between the United States and France Has a Bearing on the Canadian Reciprocity Agreement - Great Britain Does Not Reap the Advantages In Question.

Washington, April 11.—The customs court, in a decision yesterday, held in effect that the so-called "favored nation" clause in the existing commercial treaties with England, France and Germany does not restrict the United States in effecting the the United States in effecting the proposed reciprocity agreement with Canada.

Canada.

The court's decision was brought out by a comparatively unimportant contest over the rate of duty which should be imposed on whisky imported from England and France. The point involved is the same raised in opposition to the proposed Canadian reciprocity agreement by those who claimed it was practically forbidden by the "favorned nations clause."

A. Shaw & Co., a firm of New York

A. Shaw & Co., a firm of New York importers, protested payment of duty on whisky from England at the rate of \$2.25 per gallon, holding they were entitled to a rate of \$1.75, which is imposed on whisky and other spirits, from France. The essence of their claim was that under the most face. claim was that under the most favor-ed nation clause with Great Britain importations from England are en-titled to be entered at the same rate of duty levied upon on special mer-chandise when imported from France and the other countries with which similar treaties have been executed.

The treaty with England was negotiated in 1815, and indefinitely extended in 18.7. The treaties with France, Italy and Germany, forming the basis of the importer's claim, the basis of the importer's claim, were put into effect by the President under the tariff act of 1897. Under the last named treaty "in view of reciprocal and equivalent concessions," the rate on whisky from France was fixed at \$1.75 a gallon. The court holds that by its terms the treaty is one of mutual consideration and concession.

The importers' claim was that the concession of the lower rate of duty to France was a special favor with-in the purview of the treaty with England.

England.

Citing several German decisions by the Supreme Court, the court held that the portion of the tariff act of 1897, which gave to the present authority to negotiate commercial reciprocity agreements with other nations was not in conflict with the "favored nations" clause with England.

The importance of the decision which was unanimous is interpreted

which was unanimous is interpreted as removing one of the greatest obstacles yet raised against the proposed agreement with Canada.

#### TOWN REBELS. STEAMER WRECKED! Tiny Republic Has Been Declared In

Iroquois Founders Off Waterfront of Sydney, B.C.

#### THE DEAD NUMBER TWENTY

Within Sight of the Shore, Little Steamer That Did a Passenger Business Between Vancouver Island and Gulf Points Gees Down-Eight Women Are Said to Have Lost Their Lives.

Victoria, B.C., April 11.—The steamer Iroquois, Capt. Sears, which plies between Sydney and the Guli Islands, was wrecked shortly after nine o'clock yesterday morning and a large number of passengers and members of the crew were drowned, estimates varying from 20 to 25. First bulletins had stated it was believed that all those on board had been saved, with the exception of A. G. Munro, purser. At one p.m., it was estimated that there were between 20 and 40 passen-gers aboard, the first estimate being made by Capt. Sears, and the second by the officials of the Victoria and Sydney Railway Co. The crew numbered twelve.

The known drowned of the crew are: A. Olsen, Robert Hornbull, Chinese cook, D. N. Davidson, A. G. Munro, purser, and Dryden. One man's body has been recovered. He was wearing a ring bearing the ini-

Eight women are reported missing. Their names are unobtainable.
Capt. Sears came ashore with a number of others who were saved on a raft, which was part of the wreck The accident occurred in the channel near Mary Island, opposite Capt. Curtis' house, which has been turned into a morgue and hospital. Capt. Curtis put off in his launch and saved a number of lives. George and Clifford Brethour of Sydney also put out launches and did good rescue work. Many Indians also put out in

When the Iroquois foundered part of the upper works were left above water and people ashore could see the survivors clinging to this portion of the wreck. The swirl of the water soon tore off the housework, the scene being covered with wreckage and people struggling for their lives. Of the bodies which drifted ashore many were equipped with life belts. A number of launches put off for the scene, but were unable to get near the wreck. The first of the survivors to be landed was Capt. Sears of the wrecked boat, who with the mate, Isbister and two Indians belonging to the crew, were towed ashore. The boat is believed to have foundered in comparatively shallow water, her boilers blowing up and part of her housework remaining unsubmerged. G. Neeves, of Sydney, a witness of the disaster, has arrived here, but is unable to tell how many lives were

"A squally southeast wind was blowing," said Mr. Neeves, "and the sea, while choppy, was not rough. About twelve minutes after leaving Sydney, as I was standing at the railway station waiting to catch the train to Victoria, I noticed the vessel keel over on her port side. Those with me cried out. We watched her for several minutes when she slowly disappeared. The distance was so disappeared. The distance was so great and the mist so heavy that we could not see what had taken place on board. In about half an hour one of the boats from the wrecked vessel came ashore and we heard that another had swamped, but were unable to find out before the train left for Victoria, how many, if any, lives were

Mr. Neeves, who is quoted above, says that over thirty passengers, bound to Pier Island, Salt Island, Mayne Island, and Nanaimo, took passage on the Iroquois from Sydney. The crew numbered twelve, so there must have been more than forty persons aboard when the accident oc-

When the ship was rapidly filling and settling, Purser Munro ran back to his office to secure the books and valuables, which were aboard. When he again came back on deck he jump-ed on a bale of hay, but after it had had been in the water for a few se-conds it began to sink. Not being a good swimmer, Munro was drown-ed. He is survived by a wife and

#### Landslide on C.P.R.

Ottawa, April 11.—A landslide oc-curred Sunday between Ironsides and Chelsea, on the Gatineau branch of the G.P.R. The landslide was dis-covered yesterday by the outward-bound train which had to back down to Hull. A gang of men were sent up, but it was found that the whole hillside would have to be removed, as the water had undermined it. Word was sent to Chelsea for the down train to transfer passengers. This was a difficult task as the country around is of blue clay, and the passengers had trouble wading through it. The track was covered for quite a distance, and it is feared that more of the mountain is in danger of sliding.

Poisoned Food For Enemy. Mexicallia, Mex., April 11.—Col. Mayott, commander of the federal forces near here yesterday burned all provisions abandoned by Stanley Wil-liams' filibustering American band,

after the fight of Saturday.
According to survivors of the latter force, Mayott's suspicion that the food was poisoned, was well founded. One guerrilla said enough cynaids had been mixed with the flour to kill the entire federal army.

Poaching Tug Captured. Kingsville, April 11.—The fishing tug Eagle of Lorain, Ohio, was captured yesterday afternoon as a poacher in Canadian waters, and the vessel, with a crew of six men, was brought here. The Eagle had on board 3,000 pounds of fish and 30 boxes of net twine. All of this, with the tug, has been confiscated.

Johnson, twice Congressman from 21st Ohio district, four times mayor of Ohio district, four times mayor of Cleveland, champion of three cent street railway fares, and prominent advocate of the single tax theories of the late Henry George, died in his apartments in the White Hall, East 107th street, at 8.45 o'clock last night, after a long illness. Death was caused by cirrhosis of the liver. He was 57 years old.

Thomas Lottin Johnson was born in Georgetown, Ky., July 18, 1854. At the age of fifteen, he took a position with the Louisville Street Railway Co., where he applied himself so

Co., where he applied himself so well that after six years service, he had thoroughly mastered every detail. He invented and patented numerous improvements, the sale of which formed the nucleus of a fortune later

He said that Amadeo had often had to ask him for the loan of a few francs. "Now," he said, pointing to Ama-deo, who was in the audience, "he

comes here as an accuser. Then he was without a cent; now, he goes to the expense of having five lawyers."
He further alleged that Amadeo, while drank, had told of dividing the proceeds of the murder.

#### Clerk Foiled Hold-Up Man.

\7oodstock, Ont., April 11.-The village of Tavistock was greatly excited by a daring attempt at a hold-up, which was made yesterday at the G.T.R. station half a mile west of this village. An unknown man pre-sented himself at the wicket asking the clerk for a ticket to Tillsonburg. The clerk handed out a ticket, asking \$1.25 payment. The stranger appeared to search in his pockets for the money, but instead drew a revolver, saying: "I have no money, but I want all that is in that till."

Charles Sibley, the clerk, a lad cf only fifteen years, slammed the till closed and dropped the wicket, just ducking his head in time to dodge a bullet fired from the revolver. The would-be thief then took to his heels.
