> received by the OHC from Mayor Wladyka in September, 1969, which stated that since the town was able to purchase the building at a token price of \$4,000 it was willing to pass it on to the OHC for that same price.

Mr. Simone said that the OHC realized what the town paid for the building but what hurt was the cost demolition; it threw the land acquisition cost up.

He said he had prices for the demolition which were considered "reasonable" at \$12,000 to pull the structure down and truck it away.

"The OHC doesn't bargain with a municipality," he said. That is not our function, but on the basis of this letter from Mayor Wladyka we take it as a partial committment that council might be prepared to turn the property over to us at the book value. If council is prepared to do so, I think we have a project."

What does youth want?

It is sometimes unfortunate that, as most other daily newspapers, The Evening Guide's editorial policy does not permit the publication of unsigned letters to the editor.

Last week we received one such letter, but it was not typical of the anonymous letters we usually receive.

It was written "on behalf of the youth of Port Hope," and plainly by a young person filled with frustration and despair. Its tone was negative, yet its message made us stop and take stock of what Port Hope has to offer its young people.

The writer said in part "you wonder why we hang around downtown all the time. What else can we do? Sure, we can go to the show every Friday night. On Saturday maybe, in the winter, go up to the rink. The boys play hockey in winter and play baseball in summer. The girls do nothing in the winter and play baseball in summer. Almost everyone goes to the pool. But not everyone likes swimming, baseball or hockey.

With a few minor additions, our stocktaking of the activities available to local

We wondered if the letter writer's attitude was typical of Port Hope's young people. We wondered if our stocktaking had missed any significant area of youth development already in existence. And we wondered if any additional facilities or programs were in the offing for our younger citizens.

But we lacked the answers.

To change this, we assigned a team of staffers to interview young people, older people, counsellors, doctors, clergymen, teachers, police, probation officers and anyone else who might be able to tell us what youth wants, what youth has and what the solutions to any problems are.

The professionals' answers, youth's answers and our answers will appear in a special three-part series beginning Monday.

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Bulb gardeners advised to plan now but plant later

skelter approach to grooming. Everything, down to the last accessory, is planned in advance - and the most glorious gardens in town are no accident either.

While bulbs must be planted in the Fall, this is the season to plan your garden for next spring. Now the bulbs you planted last fall are in bloom and you can learn from any mistakes or omissions that

may have been made. It's wise to make a list of the varieties of tulips, daffodils, hyacinths and other bulbs you'll want for fall planting.

Many gardeners also like to draw the garden to scale with patches of colored paper to indicate trees, shrubs and rock areas. Also mark the current bulb-planted areas to be retained or dug up and indicate where new bulbs will be added

The diagram is much like scale drawings of rooms which homemakers use to decide on furniture placement, and in the fall it will be a reminder of the good

ideas you're having right now. In general, let your In general, let your imagination lead you, but follow a few sound rules in planning the spring garden. Remember that bulbs vary according to blooming period. By careful selection of varieties the garden can filled with spring flowers for nearly three months.

By now, it's common knowledge that it's the phosphates in our laundry products that are contributing to the growth of algae which is choking the existing life in our lakes, rivers and streams. But wash you must to keep the family's clothes clean. So how can you, as a good citizen, do your bit to cut down on pollution?

STOP, the Society To Overcome Pollution, organized by a group of Canadian women from Montreal, has one good practical solution. They're advocating that fellow homemakers revise their laundry procedures and switch to products with low phosphate content.

According to recently released results of laundry product testing by the University of Toronto, as well as STOP's own researchers, soap products such as powders and flakes come out best with a phosphate content of less than one per cent. And when soap products are used in conjunction with washing soda, which tests out at one per cent phosphates, laundry office was revealed. results are good.

Just be sure to observe the basic rules of laundry. Separate white from coloured wash. Don't overload the machine. Use the hottest waster possible. Add the amount of soap product recommended on the package, plus one to four tablespoons of water-softening washing soda, depending on the hardness of your water.

Amalgamation

The Mayor said that the study objectives of the Diamond Triangle should and would be influenced by the fact that only a small portion of the area was needed for

urban purposes.
Land-use studies would indicate the areas best suited for agricultural purposes, others for conservation and park purposes and still others for urban requirements such as residential, industrial and commercial.

"It is most important to give serious consideration to future needs of a city, and Port Hope and Cobourg will be one in the coming decade whether we wish it or not. It is therefore incumbent upon all of us to plan this city with people in mind.'

Safeguards from destruction of the natural environment, against pollution and against the social ills of slum areas had to be built in to the planning.

The mayor said the Exterior painting, decorating, during the period of urpaper hanging. Estimates banization, the preservation of Mon lake-front properties, streams and ideally situated park lands had to take precedence over special interests and the profit motive

Port Hope had to decide on a course of action and the available choices remaining. It had also to solve the growth problems and produce satisfactory results for the greater community which overflowed the municipal boundaries.

Mayor Wladyka recited a brief history of regional government and the municipalities which have amalgamated.

'Much thought and detailed studies have been made in various parts of the province concerning regional government and in most cases the time lapse from the initiation of action to the time of consumation has been five to seven years," he said.

In proposing the re-structuring of the Diamond Triangle communities we must base our judgement on well-founded premises, taking into consideration the political, the economic, the social and the environmental requirements of our people, he added
