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

PEOPLE'S PULPIT.



Pastor Brooklyn Tabernacle.

London, April 23.—Pastor Russell preached in London Tabernacle to-day to a crowded house. His theme was the resurrected Lord, no longer a man, but ascended where he was before— made partaker of the divine nature. His text was, "He was put to death

in flesh, but quickened in spirit" (I. Peter iii, 18). The speaker said:
In the past those of us who continued to believe in the resurrection of the dead, held some inconsistent theories respecting the matter which served to make the resurrection doctrine the more absurd in the minds of those opposed. For instance, we claimed that the Logos, the Son of God, left the heavenly or spirit nature and, according to the Scriptures, was made flesh, and that He was resur-rected from the dead a human or fleshly being and ascended to heaven with a body of flesh. In the same breath we acknowledged that human nature is a little lower than the an-gelic; and thus, while still wishing to honor the Redeemer and to see wis dom and love in the Heavenly Father's Plan, we assumed that the Sav-iour, since His ascension, has had a body inferior to that of the angels and out of harmony with His sur-roundings; and that this is to be to all eternity a part of the cost of hu-

man redemption.

How absurd! Do not the Scriptures particularly tell us that in His resurrection the Son was highly exalted by the Father, far above angels, princi-palities and powers and every name that is named? Do they not tell us that "flesh and blood cannot inherit the Kingdom of God?" Do they not tell us that the elect Church, in order the twinkling of an eye," in order that she may be made like Him, and because "flesh and blood cannot in-herit the Kingdom?" We have been too careless in our study of the Divine Word. On this subject, as upon others, we have assumed that our forefathers of the "Dark Ages" under-stood the matter thoroughly. We forgot that those who lost so much of the Holy Spirit that they could burn fellow-Christians at the stake were quite likely to be more or less confused on all questions. Put "the path of the just is as a shining light, shin-ning more and more unto the perfect day," and it is now our privilege to learn the way of the Lord more per-fectly, in the light now shining upon the Bible through the aid of our won-derful concordances and other Bible

study helps. Our difficulty on this subject arose from our failure to understand that human and spirit natures are distinct, and that God has provided two dis-tinctly different salvations for mankind—the salvation of this Age being exclusively spiritual, while that of the next Age will be exclusively human. We are not to think of these natures as blending, but, according to the Lord's Word, we are to view them as distinctly separate. Whoever is of the human nature is earthly fleshly human nature is earthly, fleshly, whether perfect or degraded. Who-ever is of the spirit nature is heavenly, whether perfect or degraded. Thus, when "the Logos was made flesh and dwelt among us," He was human, though unblemished. And the fallen angels are still spirit beings, although cut off from Divine favor and fellow-ship. In other words, human nature

is not an imperfect form of spirit nature but a totally separate and distinct nature. The Logos, the Only Begotten of the Father, "was made flesh" (John i, 14). He was not a spirit being incarcerated in a body of flesh

ners," while all others are sinners, imperfect. Like other men, the man Jesus was not a dual being—a spirit being living in a human frame. He was merely human. But the Redeemer became a dual being when He received the begetting of the Holy Spirit at the time of His baptism. Thenceforth, for three and a half years, until His crucitizion, He was dual. The flesh was the same; but the spirit-begetting receiv-

ed from the Father constituted Him a ed from the Father constituted Him a new Ego, a new person. He not only thereafter had new hopes, based upon Divine promises, but He had a new mind or new will specially illuminat-ed, quickened, enlightened by the Holy Spirit. From the time of His baptism His flesh (all that belonged to His human nature) was given up to die in the carrying out of the Heav-enly Father's purposes. Thenceforth the Spirit-begotten One waited merely for the accomplishment of His sacrifice according to the Father's will, an' for a new body, a glorious spirit body, in the resurrection-His completing or perfecting as a New Crea-

Hence, during the period of our Lord's ministry, for three and a half years, H: was a dual personage. So far as form and organism were con-cerned He was a man, but so far as mind and purpose and interests were concerned He was changed—a New Creature, a spirit being; earthly things had passed away. The New Creature followed the instructions of the Divine Word and providences to the extent of mortifying the fiesh—surrendering it fully for the accommunity of the Divine will

Accord-ing to the Divine Program He slept in hades, the tomb, and on the third day was born from the dead, raised up by Divine power as a New Creaup by Divine power as a New Creature, being given a spirit body of divine nature—glory, honor, immortality; "Him hath God highly exalted (Philippians ii, 9). He did not lose His personality, His identity, and could therefore properly say, "I am could therefore properly say, "I am He that liveth and was dead" (Rev.

Thus was our Lord "put to death in flesh and quickened in spirit"made alive in spirit, a Spirit Being. True, He was also quickened by the Spirit. It was the Father's Spirit or Power which raised Him from the longer a prisoner in the grave.
mans viii, 11). Indeed, as the Apostle reminds us, all the blessings of Divine providence are of the Father. From Him cometh every good and

every perfect gift.

He Who thus ascended up on high, the Prince of glory and partaker of the divine nature, is the same Who first descended to the earthly nature, yea, Who was humbled even unto death, even the death of the Cross, and went to the tomb as the sinner's substitute or ransom-price. The forty days which intervened between the Redeemer's resurrection and His ascension taught two great lessons:

(1) That the crucified One was no longer held in the bonds of death, no longer a prisoner in the grave.

(2) It also taught that the Risen One was different in many respects from what He was before He died. No longer was He a man. No longer was He flesh. The body of flesh pre-pared for Him for the suffering of death had served its purpose. He needed it no longer. The Father had raised Him up to the plane of glory again. As a quickening spirit He was with the disciples during the forty days, instructing them during the few moments of each of His seven or eight appearances. But He was feaching them equally when invisible to them. He noted their perplexities. to them. He noted their perplexities. His several appearances were in different forms—as a gardener, as a traveler, as a purchaser of fish on the shore of Lake Tiberias, calling out, "Have you any fish?" and then, "Drop the net on the other side."

He "revealed" Himself to the dis-

ciples in various ways in connection with those materializations and then straightway He "vanished" out of their sight, to be present with them, unseen, for days. For identification He appeared on two occasions in a body bearing the marks of His crucifixion. During those forty days the faithful Teacher established the faith of His followers in Himself as the glorified Messiah, their Heavenly Bridegroom, Who would later come again and receive, them unto Himself again and receive them unto minister and at that time give to them also a similar resurrection "change," that they should be like Him, "see Him as He is" and not as He was, and share His glory—because "flesh and blood cannot inherit the Kingdom of God" (I. Corinthians xv, 50).

St. Paul, the last of the twelve Apostles to be called (to take the place of Judas), needed, as well as the others, to be able to witness to the resurrection of Jesus. Of this He tells us, saying, "He was seen of Ce-phas, then of the twelve; after that He was seen of above five hundred brethren at once; after that He was seen of James; then of all the Apos-tles; and, last of all, He was seen of me also, as of one prematurely born' (I. Corinthians xv., 5-8).

In the ordinary course of events St. Paul would not have seen the Lord until His resurrection, when he himself would come forth as a member of 'the Church of the First-born." He therefore describes his view of Jesus on his way to Damascus as being like that of one born before the time. In other words, St. Paul saw the Lord as He is and not as He was. He saw the Lord of glory, and not the man Jesus. The appearance was glorious indeed. In various parts of the Bible angels in their normal condition are pictured as bright-shining ones. Thus one of the Prophets fell as dead before an angel of the Lord, whose face shone as the sun. Thus John the Revelator, granted a glimpse of the clorified Christ fell as dead before glorified Christ, fell as dead before Him. The effect of this great light above the brightness of the sun upon the eyes of Saul of Tarsus was destructive and a miracle was necessary for their repairment.

Thus the Lord identified Himself in glory with His former self, the man Jesus. These lessons of the Lord should not have gone unheeded. We should not have thought of the glorithe Messiah as a man. The effect of the wrong thought has not only be-clouded our appreciation of the Sa-viour in glory, but has also confused many respecting His Second Advent. It is safe to say that even yet the majority of those who are expecting

the Second Coming of the Son of God and His establishment of His Messianic Throne are looking for Him as a glorified man, forgetting that He sacrificed Himself as a man, and that Le took not back that sacrifice, but received exaltation to the more exce lent glory than that which He had to become our Redeemer.

These wrong expectations respect-ing Messiah's Kingdom Lave turned the hearts of many in a contrary di-rection. They have reasoned correctly-that the establishment of an earthly Kingdom, with Christ the King in the flesh and His saints joint-heirs with Him in His Throne, also in the flesh, and with an earthly court -would be a condition of things in-ferior to the present one and apparently very inadequate for the accomplishment of the great things which the Bible promises Messiah's King-

dom will secure.

The proper thought respecting the resurrection of our Lord and His present glory shows us clearly that His Kingdom, when it shall be established, will, indeed, be a heavenly Kingdom, a spiritual one. From this standpoint only can we see the force of the Apostle's contrast, when he pictures to us how Satan, ambitious and scheming to be the Emperor of the world, took the path of disobedi-ence. He indeed gained his desire and is the "Prince of this world" over a sorry Empire, in which sin and death reign. On the other hand, the Apostle points us to the fact that our Redeemer, loyal to the Heavenly Father to the core, humbled Himself to take the human nature, to be crucified; and that therefore God has exalted Him and will give to Him the Kingdom now usurped by Satan, the Prince of this world. Satan will be bound for the thou-

sand years of Messiah's reign. The spiritual Prince of darkness will be deposed and the spiritual Prince of Light and Truth, as the Father's hon-ored Agent, will be inaugurated as King of kings and Lord of lords. And "He must reign until He shall have put all enemies under His feet"—the last enemy being death, Adamic death, the death introduced through the deceptive lie of Satan, who was a murderer from the beginning and abode not in the Truth" (John viii,

St. Paul, according to the Greek text, institutes a comparison between Satan's course and that of the Logos (Philippians ii, 6). He there implies that Satan was ambitious and sought to grasp Divine prerogatives, but that the Logos "did not meditate a usurp-ation to be equal with God," but, on the contrary, humbled Himself and made Himself of no reputation. Nevmade Himself of no reputation. Nevertheless, eventually, in the outworking of the Creator's great Program, the One who humbled Himself will be the Exalted One, and the one who exalted himself will be abased. The Apostle urges the Church to follow the example of Jesus — "Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you in due time" (I. Peter v. 6).

As the Only-Begotten of the Father was begotten of the Holy Spirit at the time of His consecration, as an embryo New Creature, and as He was

embryo New Creature, and as He was born of the Spirit or perfected as a New Creature in His resurrection, so also the Scriptures indicate must be the course along which the Church is to follow Him. None can be born of the Spirit unless first he has been be-gotten of the Spirit and quickened of the Spirit. It is through this spiritbegetting, quickening and birth that the "elect of God," called during this Age to a change of nature, are made New Creatures—"members of the Anointed One," the Christ, the Messian, the Mediator between God and the world, under-kings, under-priests, under-judges, in association with their Lord, the Chief-Priest and Bride-

In the present life the new nature is merely begun, and, as the Apostle declares, we have it as a treasure in earthen vessels—in earthly bodies. He again declares that all the spirit-begotten ones are in a conflict in which it is required that they shall prove themselves "overcomers." Their speconflict is with their own flesh. The New Creature, the new will, must mortify the deeds of the flesh, the desires of the flesh. It must "fight a good fight" and demonstrate its loyalty to God and the principles of His righteousness. Otherwise it will not be accounted worthy or "meet for the inheritance of the saints in light". the inheritance of the saints in light" The First Resurrection, or Chief

Resurrection, is to be that of the Church. It must be completed before he world's resurrection can begin. And concerning this First Resurrec-tion it is stipulated that none can have share in it except the blessed and the hely. And for these a reward is promised, that they shall be priests unto God and shall reign with Christ thousand years-on the earth, over the earth, as earth's spiritual Empire and Ruling Government, to put down sin and to uplift righteousness.

Making Giant Steamship Propellers. The casting of large propellers for

teamships is an interesting opera-ion. The pits used for the purpose are 25 feet in diameter, and about 5 feet deep. At one of the largest plants in the country, where some of these propellers are made, the pit is in the form of a submerged steel tank built of rolled plate. The material used for the mould is ordinary loam, and is built up from the bottom of the pit. The leam includes gravel and sand of the grade adopted by most steel foundries. Compressed air fur-nishes the power with which the ramming is done.

The molten metal is poured quickly from a 30,000 pound ladle, into which the furnaces are tapped. Four days are us-ually required to propertly "set" the easting, and then the mould is brok-n and the casting removed for fin-ishing. Recently a wheel measuring 151-2 feet in diameter and weighing 16,000 pounds was cast in this man-

LABORITE IS JAILED

Prominent Official Is Charged With Dynamiting.

EXPLOSIVES FOUND IN BARN

John J. McNamara, Secretary of the Bridge and Structural Iron Workers of America, Is Arrested at Indianapolis Accused of Complicity In Los Angeles Outrage - Says Whole Thing Is a "Plant."

Indianapolis, Ind., April 24.-After months of investigation, directed by Wm, J. Burns, the San Francisco graft investigator, now head of a de-tective agency, John J. McNamara, international secretary of the Bridge and Structural Iron Workers of America, the headquarters of which are in Indianapolis, was arrested here late Saturday charged with complicity in the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times, on Oct. 1, 1910, and the plant of the Llewellyn Iron Works in Los Angeles.

Four hours after McNamara was arrested, detectives found two quarts of nitro-glycerine and seventeen sticks of dynamite in a barn three-quarters of a mile west of Indianapolis. The barn, the detectives say, was rented by McNamara from T. H. Jones, the

A later investigation of the inter-national offices of the union disclosed, in a storeroom, in the basement of the building, 64 sticks of dynamite, 200 feet of fuse, 500 dynamite caps, one dozen small alarm clocks and a leather case made to carry a ten-pound can of nitro-glycerine. Detec-tive Burns took possession of all the explosives.

Requisition papers from the Governor of California, having been signed by Governor Marshall, before the ar-rest of McNamara. He was arraigned immediately before Judge Collins in the Police Court.

Twenty minutes after McNamara had been seized in the association headquarters in the American Cen-tral Life Building, where a meeting of the executive board of the organization was just adjourning, he was tak-en from the city by four detectives, in an auto. It is supposed it was the object of the officers to get McNamara out of reach before his friends had a chance to fight the requisition.

Soon after the prisoner had been hurried into the awaiting automobile, Detective Burns ran for another auto-mobile and rode to the American Central Life Building, where F. M. Ryan, president of the association, and six members of the executive board were being held by the police, pending an investigation. Doors of the room were

guarded with a squad of police.

Immediately after the offices of the union were searched, Detective Burns and a squad of his men went to the barn west of Indianapolis, where the explosives were unearthed. The detectives then returned to the city when a search in the basement of the union headquarters revealed more ex-

President Ryan said last night that he had been connected with union labor for several years, and had never heard of a case similar to the one charged to McNarama, but he had known of cases where "plants" had been made by enemies of labor organi-zations, and that if explosives were found Saturday night they must have been placed by enemies of the organi-

The custodian of the building where the offices of the union are, said that McNamara had come to him six months ago and asked for a store room and that the request had been granted. He added that he had never seen McNamara or his companions carry anything to the store room.

Burns says Otto Manigal, who was arrested in Detroit, told him where these explosives could be found, and it was upon this information that the search was made on Saturday night. The dynamite and nitro-glycerine were found buried under sawdust in the

Jones, the owner of the barn, is also a structural iron worker. said the explosives were placed there last January, and that McNamara and other men made various trips to the barn with suit cases, but he did not know the purpose of their visits. Jones says that McNamara rented the barn and paid him \$25 a month for its use. It is situated about three-quarters of 'a mile west of the city

Wood Has Confession.

Chicago, April 24.-Capt. Stephen Wood, chief of the Chicago detective bureau, said last night that a full confession had been obtained from one of the men arrested in Detroit in connection with the dynamiting of The Los Angeles Times' building. De-tective Burns has already stated that he had got information of the whereabout of the dynamite in Indianapolis from McGonigle. Acting on the in-formation presumably obtained in the confession referred to, Burns located a rough wooden box containing dynamite in a shed behind the house of James McGonigle, father of the

prisoner, at Tiflin, Ohio. Captain Wood says that the confession covers ninety typewritten pages and describes in detail the dynamiting of buildings, railroad trains and factories, entailing the loss of many lives and two million dollars' worth of property.

South African Wreck In Gorge Is Worst In History.

Grahamstown, Cape Colony, April 24.—According to the latest estimates, 32 persons were killed in the wreck of a passenger train on the Kowie Railway, when it plunged to destruction into a gorge, 250 feet deep, through the collapse of the Blaauk-wauntz bridge Saturday. In addition many were injured, some of them fatally. It was the worst wreck in the history of South African railways. The rescue work involved heart-

rending experiences, and the extrication of the injured from the debris was accompanied by terrible groans and cries. A large mass of wreckage lodged on a ledge 120 feet down, and it was many hours before all were removed from the different crags and hoisted in sacking to the lip of the gorge. One little girl had a miraculous escape. She was caught in a fork of the bridge and held by one foot over the ravine. The rescuers had to scale girders to the height of 200 feet to bring her down.

GUNNING FOR JUDGE.

Roland Tanner Sought Revenge and Has Disappeared.

Niagara Falls. Ont., April 24.—The provincial police last night said they believed Roland B. Tanner, who left believed Roland B. Tanner, who left his home at Fonthill, Saturday after-noon, declaring he would kill County Judge Wells, has been drowned in the Welland Canal. Tanner was ar-rested several months ago on a war-rant charging him with criminal libel of Judge Wells. He was later thought to be demented, and detained in jail, but was released Friday, returning to his home.

In spite of all the members of his family could do, Tanner left his farm at Fonthill, near here, Saturday, with an old gun under his arm, declaring he would get Judgo Wells. The police traced him to near the canal, but nothing of his whereabouts are actually known. Officers are divided between their fear for the life of the judge and the belief that Tanner has gone to a watery grave.

Would Weaken Empire.

New York, April 24 .- A London cable to The Evening Post says: The Parliamentary discussion this week about the imperial conference, and letters in The Times, evidently by important personages, reveal an unsuspected weak spot in the constitu-tional theory of the British Empire, namely, the increasing desire of the colonies to have their own foreign policy, irrespective of England. The Empire's attitude towards Ja-

pan undoubtedly is the subject of the gravest discussion. The Government promises to reveal all Cabinet secrets to the colonial Premiers "under abso-lute secrecy." One writer in The Times says that Canada may use her navy to support a policy which England does not want, and that Australia may be threatening Japan when England and Japan are engaged in delicate negotiations about a Japanese alliance.

Australia, by the advice of the English admiral, lent for the purpose, proposes to built a fleet of fifty-two vessels at a cost of \$410,000,000.

Forbid Clergy to Attend.

Viterbo, April 24 .- (New York Sun Cable.)—The bishop has forbidden the clergy to attend the Camorrists' trial upon pain of excommunication unless they are subpoensed. Abbatemaggio is still ailing, but he insisted Saturday upon attending the trial. The judge concluded the examina-

tion of the prisoners, including Maria Standardos. The session was then adjourned until next Tuesday, when the prisoners will be confronted by Abbatemaggio. A wild scene is ex-

A letter has been received from the Naples chemist Scotto saying that he intended to commit suicide, explaining that he was affected with incur-able heart disease. It is an open secret that Scotto is one of the important witnesses for the prosecution and has repeatedly shammed suicide to escape Camorra vengeance.

In Memory of King Edward.

Plattsburg, N.Y., April 24 .- A movement has been inaugurated to name the proposed New York to Montreal international highway in honor of President Taft and the late King Edward, in recognition of their efforts

in the cause of peace.

Geo. A. Simard of Montreal, chairman of the Canada committee, formed to accomplish the building of the Canadian end of the road from Rouse's Point to Montreal, made the sugges-tion that part of the international highway be named King Edward road, and Sir Wilfrid Laurier is also known to be heartily in favor of the idea.

Howard D. Hadley of this city,

chairman of the committee formed to bring about the building of the New York portion of the highway, now suggests that it be named Taft road.

Armistice For Five Days.

El Paso, Texas, April 24.-An armistice of five days beginning at noon was signed yesterday by Gen. Fran-cisco I. Madero, the revolutionary leader, and Gen. Juan Navarro, the federal commander at Juarez. Peace negotiations were immediately begun with Mexico City, though the Gov-ernment does not officially recognize the insurgents.

It affects only the district between Jaurez and Chihuahua, but its con-ditions will extend to Ojinaja, which is under siege by 1,800 insurrectos.

Navigation Opened.

Port Arthur, April 24.—Receipt of word from Sault Ste. Marie on Saturday that the St. Mary's River was open and that boats had passed up was the signal for an exodus from Port Arthur of the fleet which had been here all winter and was ready loaded, waiting for such news to take the first grain of the season down the lakes. Departures commenced Saturday evening and continued until yesterday afternoon, when the harbor was practically cleared.

WEARY OF WAITING

Liberals Will Send Veto Bill to Lords Next Month.

LITTLE TROUBLE IN SIGHT

Ministers Hope to Put Parliamentary Measure Through Its Second Reading In the Upper Chamber Before Coronation - Lords Are Saying Very Little - Peace Meetings Are Now In Full Blast.

London, April 24.—The Ministers have determined to force the Parliament bill through the Commons by the end of the third week in May, and, having the majority behind them, they will do it. This date corresponds with the German Emperor's visit to the unveiling of the Victoria memorial and the assembling of the Imperial Conference. It will not be a favorable time for strenuous resist-

ance by the peers.

The Ministers are reported by the resentful Unionists to be taking a highly-provocative course in demanding the passage of the bill by the Lords before the coronation. This is a partisan exaggeration. The Ministers will be satisfied if the measure can be carried to a second reading in the Upper House before the coro-nation. Probably this will be done, and the month of July will be reserved for the committee stage, with be-lated and ineffectual efforts to obtain a compromise. There is loud talk outside of Parliament about the peers fighting in the last ditch and never surrendering, but among the Lards themselves nothing is heard about desperate remedies. The moderate men

desperate remedies. The moderate men admit readily enough that the Prime Minister is invincible when he has the royal guarantees in his pocket.

Lord Lansdowne's bronchial trouble has been aggravated by influenza and he is not in good form for leading the attack on the bill. Chancellor Lloyd-George's throat is still tender, but his intimate friends insist that his health is not fatally impaired. Winston Churchill is growing old and grey under the tremendous pressure of political work.

Prof. Sieper of the University of Munich, will deliver an address at the Church House next Friday on the problems of an Anglo-German under-standing. The Lord Chancellor will preside, and the International arbitration League and the Anglo-German Friendship Committee will welcome him as a peacemaker. This is timely movement in view of the German Emperor's visit, the Bagdad Railway enterprise and the renewal of complications in Merocco, but public in-terest in it needs to be artificially stimulated.

For otherwise is it with the Anglo-American arbitration movement, which will receive a powerful imwhich will receive a powerful im-pulse on the same day from the public meeting at the Guildhall, which will be addressed by Premier Asquith and A. J. Baliour. That is a course which encourages no resistance and commands popular enthusiasm. The American Ambassador will probably be present, but will not speak so soon after the Albert Hall demonstration.

Compartment Sleepers.

Montreal, April 24.—In a few weeks the C.P.R. will start building at its Angus shops, Montreal, six new com-partment sleeping cars, which will be a distinct departure from the sleeping cars at present operated by the company. The new cars will be of practically the same exterior dimensions as the ordinary sleepers, but in the inside instead of having berths separated by curtains, the car will be divided into compartments. There will be seven of these compartments and they will resemble somewhat the staterooms on board the ocean liners. Each stateroom will have its own electric lights, wash basin, etc.
These new cars will be used on the

Imperial Limited. The Angus shops of the C.P.R. at Montreal have just issued ten new switching engines. These engines are of the standard size build and will be distributed throughout the company's lines.

Plague Has Abated.

New York, April 24.-Word came by cable Saturday from Bishop J. W. Blachford of the Methodist Episcopal Church, that the plague is now ex-tinet in North China, and has been almost entirely stamped out in Man-

Bishop Blachford is one of the general superintendents of the church in China, with residence at Pekin, and he has just returned from a long trip through western China, extending to the borders of Thibet.

Stabbing at Port Arthur. Port Arthur, April 24.—With a big wound in his left breast Martin Marran, an Austrian, is in the hospital here hovering between life and death, and Jexano Maurizi is in the police station, charged with the wounding. It is alleged that Maurizi called at 462 Algema street yesterday afternoou under the influence of liquor, looking for a fight, and that besides stabbing Marran badly, he chew up the hand of John Wigiensuerz, who interfered.

Tank Car Exploded.
St. Louis, April 24.—An explosion of a tank filled with gasoline here Saturday killed three persons and injured nine others, four of them per-haps fatally. The car was standing on the Wabash tracks at the plant of the Bell Oil Co.

The dead are Mrs. Agnes Dallwitz, her granddaughter, Emma Dallwitz, and Edwin Hauk, a Wabash fireman, who was standing near the car.

Liberal Candidate Nominated. Vancouver, April 23.-J. W. Weart, reeve of Burnaby, was Saturday night given the Liberal nomination at Westminster for the Federal House. John Oliver, formerly provincial Liberal leader, was first named, but declined on the ground of age and business

Thamesville Firemen Helpless While Apparatus Burns.

Thamesville. April 24.—Thamesville's fire brigade are out of a job. This is not by any special dispensation doing away with the danger of any visitation by fire, but by reason of an extra special visitation which on Saturday destroyed the Town Hall, in which, beside the municipal offices, are located the firehall, the police cells

and the public library.

The fire started in the engine-room and spread rapidly. The volunteer brigade vaulted counters, and quit its various occupations and made a mad and heroic dash for the hose, but the fire beat them to it, and when the first of the fire-fighters arrived upon the scene the flames were merrily eating up all the instruments generally directed to its own destruction. Every time a fireman reached for a length of hose the flames just naturally up and bit him. The volunteer brigade put up a brave battle, and for the first time in years was compelled to stand idly by and watch its ancient enemy chewing up the town property with avid appetite.

The flames were confined, however, to the Town Hall. There they demol-ished everything in sight. The stock of the library, except the librarian, more than \$3,000 worth of knowledge and diversion, was consumed in this branch alone. The total damage will each \$20,000, with an insurance of \$5,000.

The irony of fate was emphasized by the pumping of a bang-up water works within 40 feet of the trium-phant blaze. Firemen and citizens stood about watching the biggest building in the town go down before their eyes. The citizens prayed for rain while the firemen offered up petitions for speedy arrival of a lot of hose which was called from Bothwell, the nearest municipal neighbor. Nei-ther were answered till too late.

As the flames crept up into the tow er where the four-faced clock, built by George Sherran, looked out over the town, the clock became hysterical with fright and struck 13. Then the watchers knew that it was all off. The bell tolled twice more and then the tower tumbled with a terrible crash.
