MARKET PRICES IN ST. JOHN

Small Supply of Foodstuffs in City Market According to St. John's Weekly Globe

There was a small supply of foodstuffs in the City Market, Monday morning, February 2, and there was little change in the prices since Saturday.

Fresh eggs were still selling at 70c per dozen, and cold storage eggs at 60c per dozen, while dairy butter brought 46c per lb., and creamery butter, 47c per lb.

Potatoes were 25c per peck, cabbage and squash 5c per lb., and onions 6 lbs. for 25c.

Eating apples were 60c per peck and cooking apples 50c per peck.

Chickens brought from 40 to 50c per lb., and fowl from 30 to 40c per lb., while ducks went at 35c per lb. Turkeys were quoted at 60c per lb.

Steaks brought 45c per lb., veal was obtainable at from 25 to 30c per lb., and pork could be had at from 25 to 30c per lb. Beef was from 20 to 30c per lb., and lamb from 25 to 35c per lb.

BLUNDERS DUE TO BAD WRITING

Out of twenty telegrams handed in recently at an Old Country office, two were not addressed, three were so badly written that the clerk had to ask the senders to re-write them, the signatures of eight were illegible, while altogether only three were acceptable for transmission without question.

"Carelessness and haste cause most of the mistakes," the official said. "Many people seem to think that because a telegram denotes hurry it must be written in a hurry. It is a fact that even the most unimportant telegrams are written in haste."

"Not long ago a prospective tenant negotiating for a flat in Hans Court, London, telegraphed to the agents, 'Secure Hans Court.' This was delivered as 'Secure hams and port.'

"In another instance, a business man went away unexpectedly on a yachting trip in the company of a friend named Mahoney. Before embarking, he telegraphed to his wife, 'Shall be away some days, Mahoney is with me.' To his chagrin, this was translated by the operator as, 'Shall

be away some days my honey with me.'

"More to be deplored was the faulty writing of the word 'and' in a telegram sent by a man who represented a London firm to whom the message was sent. The word was written so badly that it was interpreted as 'did' with the result that the firm broke the supposedly sad news to the wife of the man to whom the telegram referred. The shock was so great that it was some time before the woman recovered."

SKINS SELL FOR \$33

Seven thousand fox skins were sold at the weekly session of the Canadian Fur Auction Sales at Montreal. Prices were good, a few skins fetching as high as \$33, while some Nova Scotia pelts brought \$31. Nearly all the buying was done by representatives of American firms, who strongly fancied the fox skins, particularly those from the Maritime Provinces. Prices were about 20 per cent. higher than the previous sale.

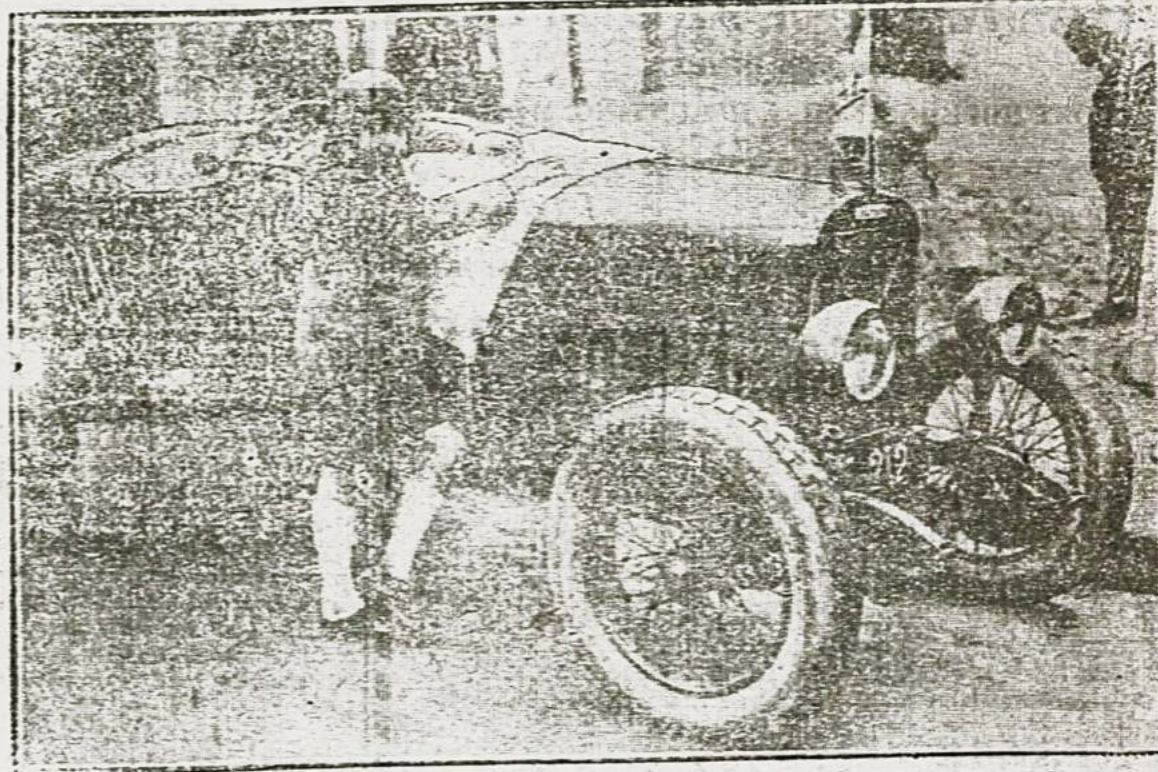

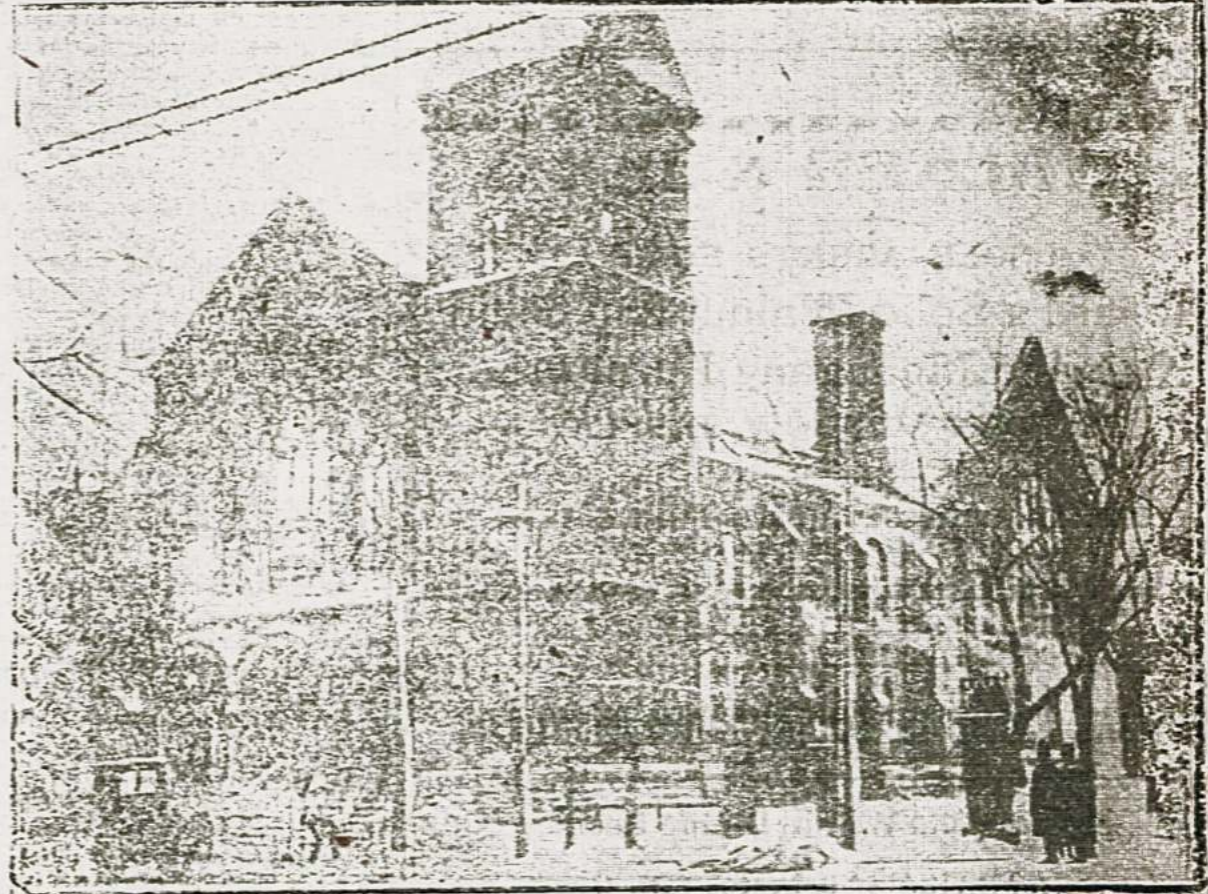

The heavy roads in the country have caused many loads of wood to either get stuck or upset, so that they have had to be abandoned until possible to move them, according to reports here.

Six hundred cars of pulpwood came in over one railway line to Cobourg during January, and were shipped by the car ferries Ontario No. 1 and Ontario No. 2 to points in the United States. These boats are doing a record business this winter carrying pulpwood.

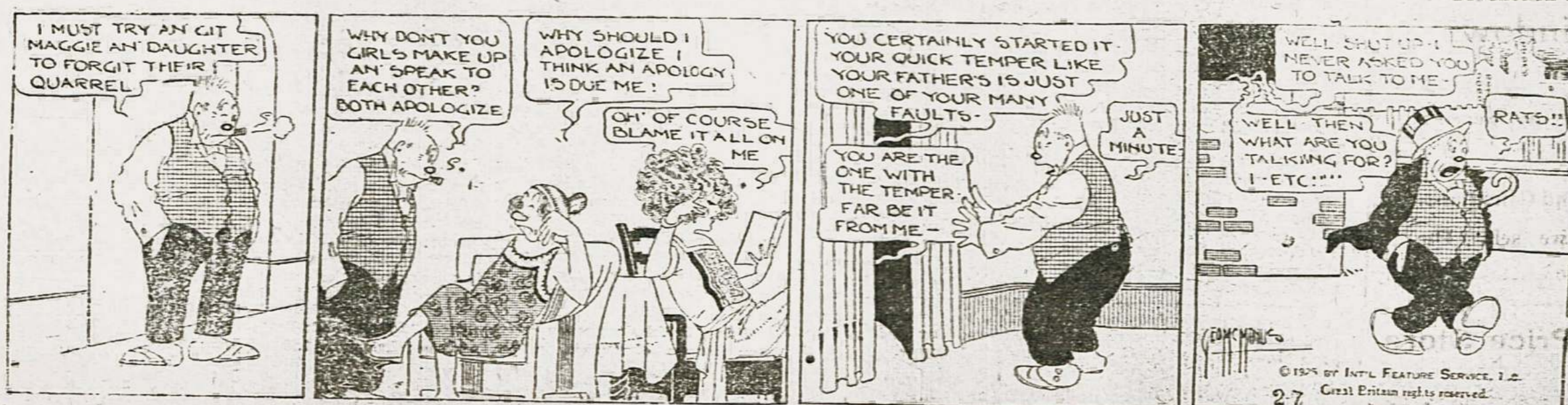

The World Do Move.—Motor boats which supplanted gondolas in Venice a few months ago are now being replaced by hydroplanes.

Legless Burglar.—Vancouver's legless burglar has been convicted and sentenced to six months in prison. He tried to prove an alibi, but didn't have a leg to stand on.

Tombstone Evidence.—The inscription on a tombstone was introduced as evidence in a court case in Toronto this week, and the least interested in the outcome was the party under the stone.

Leg Amputated.—Mr. Wm. Letcher, well known business man of Port Perry, suffered the loss of one of his legs this week, it having to be amputated because of poisoning. The operation was performed by Dr. Bruce of Toronto.

Hockey Fan Died in Rink.—Leonard Enroth, 26, an employee of the Port Arthur News-Chronicle, and one of the most enthusiastic hockey fans in Port Arthur, collapsed during the Manitoba Hockey League fixture there this week and died in the rink office a few minutes later.

The Pace That Kills.—New Belgian road traffic regulations, which go into effect this month, provide that a speed limit will no longer apply to motor cars. Motorists merely avoid driving in any fashion which may endanger the public, and pedestrians must get out of the way and allow cars to pass.

Monte Carlo Tennis Style.—Bare knees have appeared in Monte Carlo among the women tennis players, who are wearing rolled stockings and skirts almost as short as bathing costumes. The abbreviated skirt and plenty of "knee room" add a lot to the play, the players say, and give much more freedom than formerly.

Bread 13c in Halifax.—The standard retail price of bread, which is now ten and eleven cents respectively for a loaf of one and one half pounds, will advance to thirteen cents on Monday, according to an announcement made in Halifax this week, on behalf of several bakeries.

Death Exaggerated.—The original Robert ("Bob") Marks, of Marks Bros. fame, died recently in his 70th year.—Walkerton Telescope. For the information of the Telescope, the Perth Courier wishes to state that the above death is "greatly exaggerated," as Mr. Marks is still very much alive, and in fact hale and hearty, at his home, Red Cedar Villa, Christy's Lake. It is of interest to here relate that Mr. and Mrs. (May A. Bell) Marks celebrated their silver wedding last month. They were married in Kingston in Dec., 1899.

Drove Wife From House.—Alleged to have been driven from her home in 40-below weather, Mrs. Joe Alex, residing in the Waterham district, near Dauphin, is in a serious condition with feet and hands frozen. The woman was found by two hired men and taken to the home of a neighbor for treatment. The men report that when they attempted to enter the Alex shack they were greeted with a fusillade of shots. The provincial police are investigating the case.

Carcase From New Zealand.—Mr. Alex Horn recently received the frozen carcase of a Canterbury lamb which was sent all the way from New Zealand in cold storage. The lamb was a gift from a large co-operative wool firm from which the Horns Bros. Woollen Co. buys large quantities of wool. This lamb is considered a great "shipper" in England, where it is much in demand during the Christmas season.—Lindsay Post.

Seventh Pair of Twin Calves.—Mr. Melville McGinnis, lot 25, con. 10, Ops, is the owner of a cow that stands alone in its class. The animal, which is part Ayrshire and part Durham, and aged 9 years, had her seventh pair of twin calves on Monday, Feb. 2nd. She has had 15 calves in eight years—7 pairs of twins and a single calf. Mr. McGinnis is naturally proud of the cow's record and is anxious to hear from any person owning a cow that will equal this record.

Wild Ducks Wander.—George Lindsay, of Trafalgar township, has a pair of wild ducks in captivity in his barn. The pair came to the farmyard a few days ago and alighted among some of the fowl. A boy who was working at the building managed to get one of them inside and captured the other in a hole in the yard. They are male and female and were in good condition when caught. Whether their presence in this latitude at this season of the year is accounted for by the open fall or the prospect of an early spring is debatable.

DIED AT AGE OF 106
Kingston Centenarian Succumbed After Severe Operation
