
#### SKINS SELL FOR \$33



When flames broke out in College Street Baptist church, Toronto, about 5 o'clock Tuesday morning they swept through the huge church building with such rapidity that within an hour, despite every effort of a large part of the city's fire fighting force, the interior of the building was completely gutted, leaving only the bare brick walls of the once beautiful church building. The loss is estimated at between \$75,000 and \$100,000 with an insurance of approximately \$30,000.


