MORNING POST AND THE PREMIER

The Morning Post of London is the organ of the Tory Die-Hards, and it finds itself at variance with much that goes on in these times.

It is clear that the Post views with alarm all those developments of the overseas dominions which enlarge their self-government and raise them in status to a place within a circle of British nations. With the London Times urging this status on Canada and the other dominions and chiding them for being slower even than England could wish in exercising the full privileges of nations within the Commonwealth, it comes as a surprise to hear the Morning Post ascribe to "separatist" tendencies those steps towards fuller self-government which Canada has taken of recent years. It occasions surprise until one recalls that the Morning Post is out of sympathy with all recent progress in Britain as well as here.

When the Morning Post questions the motives of the prime minister of Canada on matters of Canadian policy it is idle for that journal to disavow any intention to interfere in the politics of this country. That is what it is doing, and nothing else. "The loyalty of the dominion to the Crown and the Empire," it says, "is fortunately not in question." It is not.

Nor is that of the prime minister of Canada any more in question than that of the millions of people in the dominion, among whom he is the first citizen. If the Toryism of the Morning Post misleads it into thinking that by becoming a partisan in Canadian politics it can effect anything but mischief, or if it thinks it can by offensive and unfair insinuations weaken the purpose, universal in Canada, to enlarge the self-government of Canada within the British Commonwealth, it is quite mistaken.

In doing away with the use of titles in this country, in arranging to send a Canadian plenipotentiary to Washington whenever the need arises, in deciding to negotiate a halibut treaty with our own eyes open to our own interests, in arranging a treaty of disarmament on the great lakes that will answer our needs, Canadians are as competent as any other British community to look out for their own interests and, being deeply interested, are perhaps somewhat more competent. In any event, if they make errors in connection with affairs especially their own they will not be able to blame London diplomacy as in the early days of this country they had occasion to do more than once.—Toronto Star.

GERMAN RAILROADS ARE PROSPERING

The German railroads, how that they have got out of politics and are under the Dawes plan, are reported to be making money.

The revival of prosperity, is doubtless one cause, but the principal reason is that these railroads are now, for the first time, run as businesses, on business principles.

This was, in fact, one of the greatest boons to Germany conferred by the Dawes plan. Under the old political management, the roads were run to promote favored industries, and to help favored interests or districts. That sort of favoritism is not good, even for the favored.

There is much truth in Henry Ford's doctrine that the first service a business can render to its customers, its workers and the public, is just to be a successful business.—Kitchener Record.

WORSHIP WITH METHODISTS

Invitation Accepted to go into Glenmount Church as a Presbyterian Group

Upon the announcement of the results of the balloting on church union, the unionist minority of Emmanuel Presbyterian church met recently in Glenmount Methodist church, and it was unanimously decided by those present to accept the invitation of Glenmount church to worship with them as a Presbyterian group till union is consummated on June 10th.

A resolution was adopted, thanking Glenmount church for expressing its intention to enter the United church of Canada in June, and for the action of its board in providing a place of worship open to all unionists who were uncomfortable in their own church.

Old Myth About Bells.
There is a poetic myth that silver gives a sweet tone to bells. According to the bell-makers, a silver bell would give about the same tone as one of wood. Cause of Earthquakes.

"Faults" are breaks in the strata of the earth's surface, the broken edges slipping past each other so that the same rock is found at different levels on opposite sides of the fault. These breaks create weak places in the earth's crust, and from time to time more slipping occurs. When this happens, an earthquake of greater or less violence is the result.
