The local sanitary authorities are largely responsible for the continuance of excessive infant morality, and until they fulfil satisfactorily their elementary tasks, efforts in the direction of domestic hygiene can only be partially successful. Diarrhoea is most prevalent where municipal sanitation is bad. It cannot be entirely removed unless infants' tood is prepared under cleanly conditions. Sanitary authorities, in the words of Sir John Simon the first medical officer of the local government board, are the "appointed guardians for masses of human being whose lives are at stake in the business."

The white man again searched his pockets and abstracted a fifty cent piece. This Chief Whetung's father accepted with eager gusto. Shortly after this Chief Whetung's grandfather was in Port Hope and was given a quantity of potatoes by a white man. On his return to the Indian encampment he called his people around him and together they held a consultation as to whether the potatoes should be cocked or eaten raw. Finally they decided to eat them raw. This was the first time that these Indians had ever seen potatoes in any form.
