Large Crowd Celebrate the Anniversary of the Battle of Boyne—Local Lodge Won Prize

After the march back to the park a program of addresses was then carried out, with Major John McCaughey as chairman. A hearty address of welcome was given by Mayor Gummow, to which Lieut. Col. Nothing draws the crowd like a 12th of July celebration and yesterday was no exception. The familiar sound of the life and drum and the blaring of Orange tunes by the brass bands were everywhere in evidence.

The Port Hope lodges turned out strong 1062 looking very natty in their uniforms of white duck and yellow sashes. The Ideal Concert Band accompanied them and the Port Hoppers certainly made the best appearance on parade, and the music by the band was far ahead of any of the others. **FREIGHT SHEDS BEING CONSTRUCTED.**

Foundations for the Canadian Northern freight sheds have been laid east of the Ontario street overhead bridge and a gang of men are busy erecting the building. More grading is being done to make the approaches to the freight sheds easier.

On account of the heavy embankment near the viaduct having been placed while there was frost in the earth, there was a lot of settling in the clay. This has occasioned the use of a large amount of gravelling to bring the rails up to grade, but a good roadbed will be the result.

The viaduct is about complete. The guard rails are nearly all in position, and the sidewalk and hand rail is about completed.

The station building is very tasteful and convenient for its purposes. The main waiting room is floored with maple, the walls finished in panels of green burlap and the ceiling is paneled Southern pine in natural colors.

BELLEVILLE WATER DEARER THAN PORT HOPE.—The statement made by Councillor Beggs at the last meeting of the Council, that water was sold in Belleville at 9c. per 1000 gallons, was incorrect. Belleville citizens pay 30c. per 1000 gallons, an increase of 5c. over Port Hope; and manufacturing industries pay 10c.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.—Mr. J. Burgess' house, in Belmont, about three miles from Norwood, had a narrow escape from being destroyed by lightning during the storm on Thursday morning. On account of the severity of the storm, Mrs. Burgess had just roused her two children and was going down stairs when the bed in which they had been sleeping was struck and soon was in flames. Fortunately the fire was extinguished, but not before much serious damage was done.

MAGNIFICENT SCENERY.—Hon. Frank Oliver, Minister of Interior, and Mr. Howard Douglass, Commissioner Dominion Parks, returned to Edmonton on June 27th from a trip over the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway to the Rocky Mountains and an inspection of Jasper Park, the new five thousand square mile National Park. He expressed himself as highly pleased with the reserve which embraces some of the finest of the magnificent scenery for which the Canadian Rockies are famous throughout the world. Speaking of Jasper Park Mr. Oliver stated that the scenery was of a grandeur and ruggedness similar to that of Banf, the only difference being that it is on a larger scale. The valley of the Athabaska is very wide as compared with the Bow River at Banf, and the mountains are higher, and from a tourist point of view there is everything to attract. The rails of the Grand Trunk Pacific have now reached the confines of the Park.
