An im portant announcement was made by Sales Manager Snider of the Electric Power Company and Manager Munro of the Peterboro Light & Power Company this morning, relative to the institution of a new system of charging for house-lighting.

The new system of charging for house-lighting.

The new system of charging is the one being standardized in the towns served by the Electric Power Company and its subsidiary concerns. It is based on the room system with a meter charge of scents per kilowath thour for all current used. The company will charge to cents per room, flat rate this serving instead of the minimum of 75 cents a month as charged under the old system.

The rooms to be counted are the parlors, dining-rooms, libraries, kitchens, bed-rooms and any other living rooms but not halls, cellars both-rooms, etc. The system of room-counting will be just the same as that of the estate man who talks, about a five, or six, or seven-roomed house—only the chief rooms being cause nausea, flatulence, excessive looseness, diarrhea or other annoying effect. ## POISON LURKS IN KITCHEN

Every kitchen is not only a place for the preparation of food, but also a laboratory of poison. For example, tin rust is dangerrous to health. Some little time ago a twelve-year old boy died at Preston, England, from the effects of tin poisoning, and at the inquest it was proved that he had eaten some stewed fruit in which a tin spoon had stood so long that it had become corroded.

The absolute necessity for carefully scouring all kitchen utensils is illustrated by another sad case of poisoning. A constable in the T Division of the Metropolitan Police, London, went to visit his mother in Oxfordshire and she gave him some of her own home-brewed beer.

He was taken violently ill and died of arsenal poisoning. The jar from which the beer had been taken had been used previously for storing an arsenical weed-killer. It

It had, of course, been washed out, but unfortunately arsenic forms a crust which ordinary scalding will not remove. The beer contained enough arsenic to kill a dozen men. It cannot be too strongly urged that the tap should be allowed to run for a minute or two in the morning before taking off any drinking water. People who put up home-made wine and cordials, cannot be too careful about the corks which they use. Bad corks offer harborage to all sorts of unpleasant mites and microbes—especially a most repugnant creature known as the "tyroglyphus."

## **NOW REALLY PRINCE**

Investiture Takes Place With Great Pomp at Carnaryon.

THOUSANDS SEE PAGEANT

Interesting Ceremony Takes Place In Ancient Castle, When the Heir to the British Throne Receives From His Father the Symbols of His Principality—Troops and Nav-al Brigade In Attendance.

Principality—Troops and Naval Brigade in Attendance.

Carnarvon, Wales, July 14.—In the
old and well-preserved castle of Carnarvon the young Prince of Wales
was invested yesterday vith the insignia of his high office.

The quaint town in festal attire
made a holiday, and drew within its
borders thousands of Welshmen from
the aurrounding country. The weather was matchless, and two hours
with the prince great crowds had
gathered along the route from Griffith's Crossing, where the royal party
alighted, to the castle gate. The
buildings on all the streets were lavhishly decorated. Troops, bluejackets
and marines kept open the way
through which the procession passed
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prince received an enthusiastic recep-tion.

On a platform in the centre of the castle square the mayor and corpora-tion received the royal visitors and presented addresses. From castle square to the first entrance into the castle there were two processions, that of the Prince of Wales preceding that of Their Majesties by a few min-utes. The prince entered the castle at the ancient watergate on the sea-front.
