WANTED, A NATIONAL AIR.

A Chicago educationist is promoting a half-million dollar fund as a prize for the production for the best "American" National Anthem. Isn't it singular that the "greatest nation on earth" has had a separate existence for 140 years without having a national air of its own. It has all this time been whistling British airs, set however to Yankee words, of the true spread-eagle, rip snorting brand. The "Star Spangled Banner" with its time-honoured inquiry "Can you see it?"

"Yankee Doodle" and "My Country," constitute the musical library of the national airs of the United States, and not one but has stolen the music. The stirring staccato of the "Star Spangled Banner" is an old English air, used to fillip the starchy flag, through the medium of words set in patriotic stills. "Yankee Doodle" is the air which yokels sang on village greens in the merry days of the merry monarch and knew it is "Lucky Locket," and in "My Country 'tis of Thee," Uncle Sam has cribbed the copyright of John Bull's "God Save the King." We don't blame our Yankee neighbors for adopting these airs; it shows their appreciation of a good thing. But it is a surprise that the United States, which is so prolific of inventors, and which has turned out many good poets and literary men and clever musicians, should not before this have been "up to" concocting the music of a national air which would be their very own. "But, perhaps, this comes from being a ready-made or semi-ready country. A real nation grows, and is not made in a day. In the process of growth and development folk-lore and folk songs come into being. The United States has no traditions old enough to have the cork drawn and yield a satisfactory bouquet. They are a great country, because they got their ideas of government from a great country, that grew into greatness. Great Britain, the mother of parliaments, the cradle of real civilization, in its widest meaning, is the growth of a thousand years. The United States sprang complete from the head of the revolutionary Jupiter—George Washington. They gained a lot of time in this way, but they missed a lot of fun—that goes with ethical and national development—they missed a great deal of the poetry of life which the primitive or intermedial Britons gathered in the process of
