While the Mayor favored giving persons unable to pay every attention, still he felt that in this case the privilege was being abused. During the smallpox epidemic it cost the town for vaccine \$312.15, and now there was a bill for antitoxin of \$42.

Three Hundred Thousand Yearly Is the Limit Which the Mother Country Can Stand Without Serious Drain on Population—Imperial Confer-ence Affirms the Resolution Encouraging Emigration.

London, June 10.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—
At the Imperial Conference yesterday
Premier Fisher moved the treaffirmation of the resolution of 1907, that it
is desirable to encourage British emigrants to proceed to British ecolonies
rather than foreign countries, and
that the Imperial Government be requested to co-eperate with any cosguested to co-eperate with any cossisting suitable persons; also for the
representatives of the dominions to
form a committee of the emigrants information office.

If the rate of increase for the first four months were confined been of emigrants from Britain to all countries would smount to 331,299, of whom it was estimated that nearly 50,000 would go to different parts of the Empire.
