NEW REGULATIONS

Moving Picture Licenses Advance from \$25 to \$100.

Local proprietors of moving pic-ture houses received a copy of the new regulations governing same, and which call for an increase in the annual fee from \$25 to \$100. The operators on the machines must also pay a license fee of \$5 and pass an examination before a board Lindsay.

Probably the most important clause of the regulations is that children under fifteen years of age must not be admitted to the picture shows unless accompanied by an go into camp with the 40th Reg't adult. For a conviction, on an offence being charged, the minimum fine is \$50 and the maximum \$200.

Besides the \$100 fee the local bylaw demands a license fee of \$50 for houses where only moving pictures are shown.

All government licenses will be made out to expire on June 1st, and while that date was set for the new law to go into effect a report from Toronto says that the time is extended to June 20, the delay being principally due to the illness of the Provincial Treasurer, Hon. A. J. Matheson. His illness has brought about a delay in the appointment of the board of censors required by the act, and the board will probably not be named before the end of the week, or after time set for the going into force of the new act. > One hundred and fifty-two answered the Conference Roll Call and at every session splendid progress is being made. Thursday the Committee on Church Union presented a report recommending the basis of union proposed by the Joint Committee of the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational Churches. It was reported that in this Conference eight districts voted in favor of union, three made no expression of opinion, and one voted

against it. The Church Property Committee will report on applications for per-mission to sell the old Lonsdale Church, and to erect a new church at Empey Hill, and to sell the site of the old Methodist Church at

Dr. A. C. Crews, Toronto, presented a report on the Methodist Book Room, showing that its turnover for the year was \$700,000, an increase of \$78,000 over the preceding year. In the near future it will probably be necessary to secure larger premises, but no immediate was contemplated. No offers had been made for any pro-

Toward this contingency certain. President Taft is devoting his atten-tion. He is holding daily conferences in an effort to keep Republican and

Democratic Senators alike in line for

the pact.
President Taft is certain that the reciprocity bill will pass the Senate by a comfortable majority if it can be brought to a final vote without amendment. He feels that a test of the true friends of reciprocity will come in dealing with the proposed amendments. Mr. Taft recently has had assurances that the bill will be reported out of the finance committee without amendment and without recommendation. This is what he de-sires. The President feels any amendment in the Senate will defeat the bill, and he believes that to be the purpose of some Senators who have proposed amendments. The present proposed Root, Lodge and Nelson amendments have got the President into sharp conflict with these Sena-tors, but he has not hesitated to ex-

ress his views regarding them.
Fully cognizant of the fact that he must depend upon the almost solid vote of the Democrats in the Senate to carry the reciprocity bill through. President Taft has been endeavoring to devise a means to help them out of the dilemma that will be presented when they are asked to vote for or against the free list bill as a rider to the reciprocity measure. Some Demo-cratic Senators have told the President frankly that they would vote against the free list amendment if they could be assured that the "stand-pat" Republicans would not stifle in committee the free list bill as it came from the House, and thus deprive the southern Democratic Senators of the opportunity in open Senate properly

President Taft fully appreciates the position in which the Senate Democrats find themselves, but he thinks he has found a solution of the prob-lem. He has suggested that a motion by the Democrats to discharge the finance committee from consideration of the free list bill and to put it upon its passage, would serve the purpose of the Democrats in making their attitude a perfectly clear one, and he has further expressed confidence in the fairness of the American people to recognize the purpose of those who would attempt the free list method of

defeating reciprocity.

The plan, as outlined, has been broadly discussed among Democratic Senators, and it is said they believe with other friends of reciprocity, that it is an acceptable solution of the dif-

The reciprocity agreement, as ne-gotiated, provides that Canadian paper could come in free only when provis-ional restrictions were removed. The House, instead of incorporating this conditional provision in the bill, gave more of a concession, with the idea of inducing the provinces to lift their restrictions, and provide that all pa-per made in Canada from pulpwood not grown on lands under restriction, should be admitted free. As the duty on paper is \$5.75 a ton, the House felt that Canada ultimately would be

glad to lift the restrictions to gain the advantage of this reduction. According to the White House view, the Root amendment to the paper and pulp schedule does not actually violate the agreement, but repeals the House amendment and puts the paper pro-vision again in conditional form. The House, it is said, will not accept the Root amendment or any other amendment carried through from a technical standpoint.

Incendiaries In Vancouver. Vancouver, June 2.—Three houses within three blocks of each other in South Vancouver were burned yes-terday morning by incendiaries. There is no doubt of evidence of the fires having been thus started. Contractors having been thus started. Contractors declare that they know of no reason why the places should have been burned. Non-union workmen were employed erecting the buildings, which had just been completed. The suggestion is advanced by non-unionists that the present labor fight is responsible for the firebugs' operation.

No World Steel Trust. Washington, D.C., June 2.—Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the board of di-rectors of the United States Steel Corporation, yesterday flatly denied any knowledge of the proposed formation of a combination to control the steel trade of the world.

He appeared before the House Committee investigating the "steel trust."

Lunacy on Increase.

Montreal, June 2.—Lunacy appears
on the increase in Montreal. During the past month the civic authorities have been called upon to remove 60 insane persons to the asylums. This is an unprecedented number for any month in the city's previous history. The number recorded insane has in the past varied between 15 and 30 per month.

So while Fatty was in my house Tuesday morning Fatty shot Johnny through the heart and took the money. Johnny had left \$7.50. Then Fatty and me tied Johnny's body up and we shoved had left \$1.50. Then ratify and me tied Johnny's body up and we shoved Johnny into a feed bag, and me and Fatty carried Johnny down two flights of stairs to our cellar and shoved him in a coal bin and covered the bag with oilcloth and nailed boards over the place.

"Then Fatty gives me a quarter, and my brother Joe another quarter, and Fatty goes out, buys a swell suit of clothes, and we all go to the moving pictures.'

Yesterday morning Carmine broke down and confessed that he himself had fired the fatal shot.

Senator Lougheed of Calgary, Mr. Duncan Coulson, president of the Bank of Toronto, and Mr. Robert Bickerdike, M.P., of Montreal, vice-president of the Banque d'Hochelaga. d'Hochelaga.

The resignation of the directors mentioned followed on the adoption by the board of the policy recom-mended by the president, Hon. Geo. E. Cox, and the vice-president, J. H. Plummer, under which the Joint General Management has been discontinued, and Mr. E. W. Cox has been

appointed general manager.

The above official statement handed out yesterday afternoon by E. W. Cox, general manager of the Canada Life, amply confirmed the rumor yesterday that five of the directors of the company had resigned.

Suicide In Hamilton.

Hamilton, June 2.—W. A. Ellis, a man about 50 years old and a native of New Zealand, committed suicide in Harvey Park yesterday afternoon by taking cyanide. Despondency over ill-health and loss of wealth and position is indicated by notes found on his person, as the cause of the deed. Newspaper clippings which were found in the man's clothing indicate that he at one time was a man of considerable prominence in the old country, having campaigned on sev-eral occasions with the Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain. He had also apparently been wealthy, but had lost all his money in a patent right swindle and in speculation. He was an expert chemist and was supposed to possess the secret of preserving eggs for a year or more.

Bequest to Earl Grey.

Ottawa, June 2.—Word has come to Ottawa that His Excellency the Governor-General has fallen heir to an interesting bequest. Last February his cousin, Mr. George Grey of Fallo-den, Northumberland, died in East Africa, having been injured in a lion hunt. Mr. Grey was famous in South Africa, having been commanding of-ficer of the corps known as Grey's Scouts, in the Matabele war. After disposing of his English property he left one-third of the residue, which includes a share in the Tangan Yika concessions, to his cousin Earl Grey: "Through whom I was induced to go to Africa, and to whose advice and help any success I have achieved in Africa is greatly due."

R. & O. Boat Runs on Bank.

Montreal, June 2.—Wednesday night's windstorm was the cause of an accident to the steamer Quebec of the Richelieu & Ontario Co.'s Montreal-Quebec line.

The building will be fireproof throughout. The architects are Messrs. Warren and Wetmore of New York.

DO NOT INTERFERE

So Says Sir Wilfrid Discussing Britain's Treaties.

DECLARATION OF LONDON

Canada's Premier Says the Colonies Should Let the Mother Country Use Her Own Discretion In Making Treaties Other Than Commercial Ones - London Pact Causes Considerable Discussion.

London, June 2.—(C.A.P. Cable.)— In the Imperial Conference Premier Fisher moved a resolution regretting that the dominions were not consulted prior to the acceptance of the terms of the declaration of London, that it was undesirable for Great Britain to adopt the inclusion of article 24, on foodstuffs, in view of the fact that a large part of the trade of the Empire was in these articles, that it was undesirable for Great Britain to adopt the provisions of the articles permitting the destruction of neutral

He attached the most importance to the first part of the resolution. Being part of the family of nations, he thought that the time had arrived when they should be informed, and, if need be, consulted before arrangeif need be, consulted before arrange-ments were entered into with other countries, by which their interests were affected. Their sole desire was to enlarge their power by means of com-munication between the self-governing communities. This step, if taken, while not weakening the Mother Coun-try, would strengthen the dominions and make them feel they were sharers in all that was done for the protection of the best interests of the Empire. of the best interests of the Empire.

Batchelor said that if alterations could be made in reference to certain points which would be for the good of the Empire generally, it would bring about a feeling of safety, contentment and satisfaction, where the greatest

and satisfaction, where the greatest apprehension was now felt.

Sir Edward Grey said that with regard to foodstuffs there had hitherto existed a state of chaos. When aggrieved they had to depend for redress on the decision of the prize courts of ballicarants. belligerents, which were never satis-factory tribunals for a neutral to appeal to. The Government agreed to a certain extent that there should be no seizure of goods which were condi-tional contraband, when consigned to a neutral port, even though they might be destined to an enemy. One result of this concession, if they found a difof this concession, if they found a difficulty in clearing the whole Atlantic of the enemy's cruisers, would be that all possible goods would be consigned to neutral ports in Europe, and all we would have to do would be to protect the passage of goods across the channel to one of our ports. There was only one thing that could secure safety in war time the su-

secure safety in war time, the su-premacy of the British fleet. That being maintained, other points were of comparative insignificance. The consultation of the dominions would have been difficult, seeing that they were not consulted by The Hague Conference. A prize court convention of the dominions would have to be con-sulted before the next Hague Confer-

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said it was a Sir Wilfrid Laurier said it was a far-reaching proposition that the Dominions should be consulted in regard to treaties negotiated by the Home Government. Canada had claimed the liberty of negotiating her own commercial treaties, which liberty had been given them. Regarding other treaties it might seriously embarrass the Home Government if it had to consult the dominions. If a dominion insisted on being consulted in regard to matters which might result in war, to matters which might result in war, it would imply the necessity that they should take part in the war. He thought on the whole it would be better to leave the matter entirely to the discretion of the Home Govern-ment. The declaration itself was an immense step in advance. It was the first step towards arbitration between nations, which Canada entirely

Sir Joseph Ward and Dr. Findlay both supported the declaration.

Calls It Dangerous.

London, June 2 .- (C.A.P. Cable.)-The Morning Post says that Laurier in favoring the declaration of London as a step in the right direction of abolishing navies by substituting arbitration, does not seem to realize that in any case the international prize which caught his fancy only comes into operations after acts of war are over, not before war is de-

The London Express says that Laurier's argument that the Home Government should never be bettered by the necessity for consulting other parts of the Empire is very dangerous as an imperial principle. It spells disintegration, not federation.

Ignored Protest of Typos.

Toronto, June 2.—The Trades and Labor Council held their regular meeting at the Labor Temple last night and discussed many matters, although little action of any kind was taken. The report of the legislation com-mittee declared that the Government inspectors had disregarded the Typo-graphical Union's letter protesting against poor lead gas protectors in some local printing houses. One of the members had heard that one of the Government inspectors had asked: "What fool wrote that letter?"

The Work of a Lunatic.

Chatham, June 2.—The wrecking of passenger train No. 9 on the M.C.R. near Ridgetown, when Engineer Quin-lan and Fireman Oaks were killed, is now believed to have been the work of a lunatic, and not a job put up by disgruntled railway employes.

The contract will be let -s speedily as possible after that date, and it is expected that by the end of next year steel will be laid on nearly all of this first half of the line to the Hadronian first half of the line to the Hudson

Bay terminal.

Tenders for the remaining portion of the road will be called for early next year, as soon as the route is fin-ally located. The Railway Departally located. The Railway Department will supervise the constructon of the road. Chief Engineer Armstrong who has had charge of the Government survey of the road for the past two years, will be the chief engineer in charge of construction, with headquarters at Winnipeg.


