BAILEY IS HOSTILE

Senator Will Press His Amendment to Reciprocity. SEN. CLAPP WANTS CHANGE He Wants to Add Several Things to the Free List—Bailey Announces His Intention of Going on With the Struggle Which He Propheasies Will Be a Long One—To Vote on Root Amendment.

Washington, June 24.—A declaration for straight reciprocity at an informal conference of a dozen Democratic Senators willing to vote down all amendments to the bill introduced by Senator Bailey adding to the reciprocity measure all the free list provisions except meat and grain products, a unanimous decision of the Senate to vote Monday on the Root amendment to the wool pulp and paper schedule—these were features in the reciprocity fight yesterday.

A DEADLY CANCER.—That cancer is due to a parasitic fungus that stimulates the animal cells so that they become parasites themselves is the view advanced in a new work by C. E. Green, a British medical student. The theory is based on the resemblance of animal cancers to plant tumors, and supposes that the undiscovered organism of animal cancers must be very similar to plasmiodiophora brassicae the cause of plant cancer, sulphurous substances specially favor the growth of the plant parasite, while calcium and copper tend to destroy it. As this would suggest, human cancer is most common in chimney sweeps, brewers and furriers, who are most exposed to sulphur vapors and is rarest in tanners, copper workers and papermakers, whose occupations bring contact with copper or lime. The houses and districts that have most cancer, moreover, are those where sulphur dioxide is present in the air—that is, where coal is burned and chimneys draught and ventilation are imperfect.
