The Well Posted Man THE SPUR LINE TO BE RUSHED

Four Subways to be Built---King street and Base Line to be Closed Absolutely Across The Track.

The much talked of new connection between the Midland Division and the main line of the Grand Trunk railway known as the "Spur Line" is now to be hustled and finished in time for this year's grain trade. Tenders are now invited for the grading and all the work except the telegraph for this line, the work to be finished by the 15th of October.

The present plans differ considerably from those first shown by the Railway Company and approved by the Railway Commission. The elevation of the line will begin at the File Factory Bridge, will cross Barrett street, Ontario street, Mill street and Peter street at an elevation to permit subways for all these streets. This is certainly an improvement. A switch on trestles is shown for Rosevear's coal sheds. The old Midland line at Barrett street and the freight sidings there are moved west, taking in the brick house occupied by Mr. Robert Rankin on the north side of the street, and the frame house occupied by Mr. Roach on the south side.

FINING DRUNKARDS

In an address to the city council, of Titusville, Pa., Mayor Dickerson spoke strongly on the absurdity of fining drunkards who appeared in court. This practice has been the subject of a good deal of adverse criticism from those who have considered the matter from the standpoint of those dependent on drunkards for support as well as from the standpoint of the state and oit the men themselves. Mr. Dickerson, in his remarks to the council said:

"Alnost every dollar received at that source takes away some comfort, if not necessity, from innocent women and children. Asscredly, taking a lew dollars from a household to pay for an imaginary injury to the municipality by an intoxicated individual is poor recommendation. It would seem more like justice to me if the police were empowered to search a defendant and send any money they find to the wife asd mother."


