

## MORE RABIES FOUND

Six Cases in Three Weeks Cause Uneasiness—Should Dogs Be Muzzled?

It is another widespread outbreak of rabies imminent? Since the first recent case was reported to Dr. J. W. S. McCullough, Provincial Health Officer, three weeks ago, five additional cases of rabies have been received by the department. Two canine heads were received by Dr. McCullough yesterday morning, and the report from Dr. Amyot, Provincial Analyst, verified suspicions that the animals were suffering from the dread malady.

The districts from which the heads came are widely separated, one being sent from Palmerston boulevard by Dr. J. A. Campbell and the other from East Toronto, by Dr. Milne. According to Dr. McCullough neither dog attacked anyone.

The Provincial Health Officer has nothing to say to questions concerning the putting into force again of the muzzling order. "The matter is in the hands of the Federal authorities," he said. "The only part we have to co-operate with the Dominion officials in seeing that such an order is enforced once it is issued."

## THE BODY RECOVERED

Victim Had Relatives Living Here

The sad drowning fatality which occurred at Yankee Bonnet, Ontario River, on Saturday, culminated in the finding of the body of John Costello yesterday afternoon. It was recovered by Archie Guerin, by means of a trowing line, with two hooks attached. The body was found about 3 o'clock, in twelve feet of water, fifty feet from shore, and about one-half mile below Yankee Bonnet.

The Coroner, Dr. Grier, who was immediately notified, decided that an inquest was unnecessary. The remains were removed to Lane & Eano's undertaking establishment, after which they were taken to the home of the deceased's father, Ennismore, from which place the funeral will take place to-morrow at 9 o'clock to St. Martin's cemetery for interment.

The late Mr. Costello was a member of the Catholic Order of Foresters and was well known and highly esteemed by all who knew him, and the news of his demise comes as a startling shock to his many friends. Besides his parents he leaves to mourn his loss three small children, six brothers and four sisters. The children are Leonard, Paul and Mary; brothers, Frank, of Toronto, Joseph, Stephen, Eugene, Paul and William, of Ennismore. The sisters are Misses Mary, Port Hope; Katharine, Toronto; Annette of Lindsay, and Margaret of Ennismore.—Peterboro Review.

### CHURCH IN RUINS

One of Montreal's Finest Edifices Hit by Lightning. LOSS IS ABOUT \$200,000. Church of St. Jean Baptiste Burns During Electrical Storm and Fire Started—Flames Raged All Night and Went on into the Morning.

Montreal, June 28.—Lightning yesterday struck the Church of St. Jean Baptiste on Rachel street, and completely destroyed the splendid edifice, at a loss of about \$200,000.

At midnight there was little left but the walls and the tower facing on Rachel street, which still stood, although it was momentarily threatening to fall.

At a late hour this morning the fire is still raging within the almost bare walls of the church, and it is said that the flames will probably be soon before the firemen would be able to leave the ruins.

While the losses are very heavy they are well covered by insurance. It being stated that there was \$175,000 insurance on the main building, spread over the various parts of the church, the insurance on the organ amounted to \$14,000.

Daring Aviator Flies Under Niagara Arch Bridge.

'NEVER AGAIN,' SAYS HE

Bird-Man Circles Over the Falls and Dips Under the Steel Structure Before Great Crowds—Machine Sucked Down by Air Currents as Beachy Goes Over Crest of Cataract—Blinded by Spray.

Niagara Falls, June 22.—For the first time in the history of aeroplanes, an aeroplane circled over the majestic cataract of Niagara and dipped gracefully under the upper steel arch bridge shortly before six o'clock last evening, when a daredevil aviator, Owen Seaman Beachy, in his bi-plane safely over the perilous course in the view of a quarter of a million people.

Beachy rose into the air in his machine about a mile from the roaring cataract, soared several hundred feet into the clouds, then swung near to the earth. Several times he was lost to sight. Like a great sea eagle, the aeroplane passed over the steel structure, clearing the trolley that crosses it by a margin of twenty feet. Down the gorge for a mile the machine circled, then passed over the city on the Canadian side.

Circling over the horseshoe falls for the second time, Beachy dipped his machine as soon as he cleared the cataract and ducked under the bridge. He even brushed a gull as the aeroplane passed under the bridge, the gull flying to the Maid of the Mist and the gorge falls screeched out the news of the new feat which James McCurdy, the Canadian aviator, and other well-known bird-men had refused to try, declaring it to be suicidal.

Beachy will fly over the falls again this afternoon, aviators here being attracted by Niagara's international carnival in progress yesterday and today.

Here is Beachy's own story of his swoosh-making flight, as he told it to a reporter last night:

"I would not again attempt to fly under that bridge for \$5,000, let alone the \$10,000 price such as is now being offered. It is the uncertainty as to what is before the aviator as he passes through clouds of spray over the falls that makes the feat so suicidal.

"As I cleared the Horseshoe Falls I dipped my machine to the spray. I saw the water for the first time above that of my machine, but I could not see three feet in front of me.

"As I passed through the spray and out into the daylight, I saw Hicks, Kirby and Garner, handed down a very important decision yesterday, affecting all real estate dealings all through the west. The plaintiff is an Englishman who holds certain valuable property in the west.

The defendants called him stating that a capitalist had made an offer for this property, and he called his solicitor to see what he could do. He visited Winnipeg and found property had been transferred to a law student, and then transferred to the defendant's company, which one of the defendants was interested in.

Judge Robinson ordered that defendant be taken to jail, and received since the sale, an \$10,000 payoff on the action.

On Trial For Alleged Perjury. Colborne, June 22.—Judge Hicks, the aged jurist, accused of having committed perjury in his evidence at the trial for murder of "Sam" Matthews, was arrested yesterday before Magistrate Miller.

Children Cry FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA

FESTIVITIES NEARLY OVER.

Their Majesties Attend a Remarkable "Command" Performance.

London, June 22.—The King and Queen and royal distinguished guests attended the second command performance in connection with the coronation festivities at His Majesty's Theatre last night. This might be described as an all-star performance to an all-star audience.

For the occasion the Herbert Beerbohm Tree had arranged a superb program. He received their Majesties in the auditorium, however, and still more loudly by the adoption of a scheme of decoration along Grecian lines, remarkable for their delicate simplicity.

The play's the thing, Owen Seaman, editor of Punch, boldly paraphrasing Shakespeare in the prologue composed for last night's performance, emphasized the fact by writing:

"The play's the thing, wherein to snatch a consequence of the King's."

So the distinguished audience was treated to scenes from "The Merry Wives of Windsor," "David Garrick," "Julius Caesar," "The Critic," and "The Merchant of Venice."

Long before the doors opened a great crowd had gathered about the theatre and the streets leading to it.

The principal coronation festivities are nearing their close. The subsidiary functions and social entertainments are still sufficiently numerous and important to keep the city in a constant state of effervescence.

While in one section of the city an army of workmen is busy removing the scaffolding and another section great numbers are employed erecting new arches and stringing bunting to do honor to their Majesties.

FREIGHT HITS CAR

Watchman is Killed in Collision at London, Ont.

THE MOTORMAN IS INJURED

Timothy O'Leary Loses His Life, Motorman Face Is Hurt, and Ten Passengers Are Badly Injured in Collision on Level Crossing—Engineer of Train Falls to Engineer of Watchman's Signal.

London, Ont., June 22.—Timothy O'Leary, a watchman, was killed, Motorman J. H. Facey injured, ten passengers badly frightened and three freight cars were thrown across the tracks in backing down at a siding in the Grand Trunk tracks last night.

Watchman O'Leary had thrown the derail for the car to cross the tracks. A freight train backing down a siding failed to stop on signal and crashed into the front end of the car.

The car was turned entirely around but remained in an upright position, allowing the frightened passengers to escape. The caboose of the freight train left the track, striking the watchman in backing down the siding.

Motorman Facey jumped just in time to avoid being crushed in the vestibule of his car, which was broken to splinters. He struck the track with his left leg broken and his right arm injured.

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MILLERS MERGE

Union of Western Ontario Companies is Now Announced.

Guelph, June 23.—Another big merger has been formed. This latest consists of a union of the various milling companies scattered throughout western Ontario.

The stated object is to secure, if possible, a larger share of the export trade, and to do away with overlapping orders. The companies are interested, these being the owners of mills situated in Chatham, Hamilton, St. Marys, Stroud, the John Campbell Milling Co., with two mills at St. Thomas, and the Goldie Milling Co. of this city.

The official of the Goldie Milling Co. stated that this merger has been under process of formation for some time. It was announced at a meeting of the millers, held at Toronto on Monday.

The merger will not affect the output of the Goldie Milling Co. for some time at least, and will have no effect on the many men who have been at the head of the Goldie Milling Co. for many years.

Ottawa Fireman's Escape. Ottawa, June 22.—Two firemen were seriously injured, and several others partly overcome by smoke, in a blaze which broke out in the east of the city, at noon yesterday.

The fire was in a shop, and fireman Gravelle fell through a trap door into the burning cellar. It was many minutes before he was rescued, but his life was probably saved by Capt. Alex. Stewart, who was present.

Will Be the John Bryce. Ottawa, June 22.—John Bryce, of the grain inspectors branch of the Department of Trade and Commerce, is said to have been slated for the position of Secretary of the commission to be appointed under the Grain Inspection Act.

Muzzle the Dogs. Toronto, June 22.—An order from the Provincial Department of Health is likely to go forth to this effect at any time. Yesterday two more dogs were muzzled, and the provincial department is said to have shown signs of rabies.
