The Game Worked But It Was Not Clever

Mr. Crawford's Auto Lamp Turned Out In Cobourg Then He Was Rushed to Police Court and Fined

Mr. Blake Crawford of the Hotel St. Lawrence autoed over to Cobourg last evening with a party of friends and the authorities of that eastern hamlet showed once more how they could rub it in. The party arrived in Cobourg shortly after eight o'clock and upon reaching the Danham House Mr. Crawford lighted the lamps on the automobile. They then drove up street and left the car standing near the Town Hall while they went to call upon some friends. They were absent about half an hour, but during this time some of the "smart set" in Cobourg became very busy and turned the light out on the back of the machine. Douglas Wark is acting as Constable during the absence of Chief Ruse and, having an eye like one of the Pinkertons', he discovered that the light was out. Now here was an opportunity to gain notoriety, and Wark hustled to the residence of Justice of the Peace Colonel Floyd and laid the information. When the party returned to the car the "big chief" was in waiting with a summons and notwithstanding the explanations of the party the Chief refused to withdraw, and Mr. Crawford went to the Police Office to settle the case. Mr. Crawford, after explaining the circumstances of the case to the Magistrate, pleaded guilty and the Court assessed him \$5.50.

During all the time the light was out the car stood on Cobourg's main street and acting Constable Wark certainly went out of his way in bringing this case to court. Actions of this kind will not gain any fame for Wark, the right thinking people of Cobourg, not approving it in the least.

Weather Forecasts for July

What he said and what they thought he said and what he should have said and never said and what he might have said, but didn't, assume a historic importance, and men lay awake nights hating his internal arrangements."

He digs up some old three line item printed in the big corn year of '89 and holds it up, "thought lost to sight to memory dear," and you'd think that fellow and the editor had been bitter, burning enemies for a long hateful generation instead of old friends."

"What though he walks his feet off, wear his fingers out, yell his lungs loose for his home town, does it make any difference when an old friend takes the stove? Not a bit. His grievance breads others. Smoldering embers of others differences are uncovered, the dead past exumes itself, and he walks down the street a human pariah. He is the social and moral leper. He is the pink whiskered disturber of the public peace. He is the fountain of all the troubles, all the misfortunes, all the tribulation, to which the town has been heir in thirty years."

"And yet journalism is the greatest business in the world. It is full of large opportunities and deep red overdrafts, rife with glory and prone to sorrow as sparks fly upward. But nevertheless and howsoever it's a funny business."

LIGHTNING DAMAGED MANY PLACES.—The stories of the vagaries of lightning told at the regular Directors' meeting of the Maple Leaf Fire Insurance Company at Columbus recently would make a very readable book. There were all sorts of freaks taken by the electrical fluid in causing 23 losses by lightning that the company had to settle. They all occurred within a few days, and strange to say not a single fire resulted. The net loss therefore to the Company was small, and the whole 23 cases were settled for less than \$1,000, the heaviest payment being \$315 to Mr. Beare, who had thirteen cattle killed within a radius of 24 feet.

Men from Lindsay Sold Counterfeits

Attention of Dominion Officers Again Directed to the Town Where Several Convictions were Obtained a few Years Ago.

The green goods men who met David Watson, of Orillia, by appointment in a swamp and sold him packages of bogus bank notes may yet find their way behind the bars. Watson, who passed through Toronto on his way to Kingston, told the police here as well as Detective Parkinson of the Dominion Police, Ottawa, that he believed the men he dealt with belonged to Lindsay. Detective Parkinson has been making inquiries around Lindsay, and discovered some of the bad bills. Some were passed in Toronto last spring and more in Buffalo, where the gang who "shoved the queer" appeared to have agents. The Buffalo police are also co-operating in the search for the plant of the counterfeiters.

More than once police officers have been taken to Lindsay to investigate the making and circulation of counterfeit money. A number of convictions were secured there a few years ago by Detective Parkinson and J. E. Rogers, now Superintendent of Provincial Police.
