One advantage of the Club would be to encourage the breeding of one particular breed in this community. He spoke of Holland Jersey, Gurnsey and the North of Scotland 'Don't try to, I beg. But at where the farmers had practically adopted one breed and the success that followed this course was very encouraging. He referred to his correspondence in that two of every three letters he received, contained enquiries from men who wanted to purchase frome one to a carload of purebred Ayrshires. As an example the cow "Panglewyld" in completing a year's record gave 16196 lbs of milk and 625 lbs of

butter fat. Prof. Arkell of Ottawa told of the efforts being put forth by the Live Stock Branch to better live stock conditions, generally. He expressed his deep interest in this, I would get temporary relief from some the first local stock breeders' club organized in the Dominion which had come under his notice, and it is the intention of the Department to give all the assistance they can to turther such organizations as they considered it the first step towards real co-operation, which is an important question with the agricultural people of Canada. The Menie District Ayrshire Club should feel proud that they have interested the Dominion Department of Agriculture first in this step. Prof. Arkell explained the methods that had been adopted in Denmark, which had increased the production of the dairy cow from an average of 2000 lbs in 1908 to 6,660 lbs. in 1910. preciated by those present. Mr. H. B. Cowan, of Peterboro, laid special emphasis on the fact that Ayrshire men should advocate "pay by test" at all cheese factories and strongly advised the formation of Cow Testing Associations and entering cows in the Record of Performance Tests. Cost of produc-

8,000,000 In Canada Now.

### WOULD END REVOLT

U. S. Intervention Would Unite Forces, Says Mexican.

#### CALL TO THE INSURRECTOS

Senor de la Barre Urges Friends of Mexico to Join the Uprising-Dr. Gomez Says Regulars and Rebels Would Make Common Cause Against the Common Enemy if U.S. Interfered In Trouble.

New York, March 15.—Before Senor de la Barra left for Washington yesterday, he gave out here the proofs of an article which will appear in The Independent, on "the situation in Mexico," urging all his country-men, regardless of "all divisions of party, all differences between men," to recall the "sacred interests of our country," and "to work together for the progress of true democracy and of the best development of the mother-

Insurrecto leaders to whom the paragraph was shown last night, said they considered it an invitation to come into camp, and its issuance makes more noticeable a trend of events that has been discoverable for

the past three days. After the first shock of surprise in

the United States and of alarm and distrust in Mexico, caused by the despatch of 20,000 American troops to the frontier, there began on the one side a series of formal diplomatic exchanges between the two powers and on the other a series of carefully weighed interviews and authorized publications in the daily press. Underneath this current ran a deeper tide of sympathy between countrymen who might be at odds, but were still "Intervention means countrymen. war," said Senor Limautour in so many words. "Intervention?" echoed Dr. F. Vasquez Gomez, the insurrecto agent at Washington, who has been here for the last three days: "The moment there is intervention, there will cease to be an insurrection. Both sides will make common cause against a common enemy.'

In his morning statement, Senor Limautour warned Americans that if they took part in the insurrection and fell captives, they might expect the same justice meted out to other pris oners. In view of the suspension of constitutional guarantees recently announced, this means death, and the answer made is deliberate, for it is known to have followed diplomatic representations made to Mexico City that captured Americans be treated leniently.

Ask Release of Americans. Washingtonu, March 15.-An investigation having convinced the American Government that Edwin Blatt of Pittsburg, Pa., and Lawrence Converse of Los Angeles, Cal., held as prisoners at Jaurez, Mex., had been captured on American soil, the State Department yesterday asked the Mexican Government to release them. The request was delivered to the Mexican

embassy at Washington.

### WILL-GO-FURTHER

Hydro in Full Control

W. K. McNaught's Measure Will Be Withdrawn and a Government Enastment Will Be Made Putting All Electrical Power Companies Under the Jurisdiction of the Hydro-Electric Commission.

Toronto, March 15.-W. K. Mc-Naught's bill placing electric power companies competing with municipal enterprises under the control of the Hydro Commission, power which was shelved a few days ago, will be formally withdrawn.

It will be replaced by a new hill, of which Mr. McNaught gave notice yesterday, and will probably be fully explained to the Ontario Legislature this afternoon.

This bill is more comprehensive than the former bill. It will have the status of a Government bill and will be carried through the House with the full strength of Sir James Whitney's influence and that of his colleagues in the Cabinet behind it. The new bill is made provincial in

2 While the original bill applied only to companies entering into competition with municipal power systems, the new measure gives the Hydro-Electric Power Commission power in case disputes over questions of damages, the jurisdiction is placed

under the Municipal Arbitration Act. The new bill gives the commission absolute control over all power and electric companies in the province. The commission will have supervision oven the plant, equipment, operation, erection of poles, stringing of wires and laying of conduits.

Disputes arising between municipal and private electric light companies, other than claims for damages, will in fature he stilled by the commission, and all business carried on by any electric company will be done under the direction and supervision of

At an immense meeting of the citizens of Nassau held Feb. 20, which was addressed by a number of Canadians then visiting the Island, a resalution favoring the admission of the islands to the Canadian Confederatio as a province was carried by a standing vote with great enthusiasm, there being but two dissenting votes. The governor is to invite the Government of Canada to a conference to consider whether annexation to the Dominion is feasible and desirable, and, if so, on what terms it would probably be carried out.

The Bahamas, a chain of islands in the West Indies, contained in 1909. 61.277 people, most of them descenthe capital, situated on the Island of New Providence. The chief industry is sponge gathering. Bananas, cocosnuts, fruit and vegetables are also largely exported, principally to the United States. The hemp fibre industry is also fairly well established.


