RAILWAY PROSPECTS

We understand team grading soon be resumed on the Canadian Northern this week and the steam shovels are being overhauled and expect to tackle the big cuts here in dead earnest next week.

Mr. Angus Sinclair, the C. N. R. construction contractor, was in Port Hope on Tuesday.

It is reported that the Midland Division grain route will be rushed as soon as the frost is out. This work will include the spur line through Port Hope, the extended time for which will soon expire.

It is doubtful if the Canadian Pacific Railway will do any building through this section at the opening of the season, whatever may be done before the year closes. The new line from Toronto to Niagara will be rushed and the C. P. R. grain route from Georgian Bay to the sea will be pushed. This will include double tracking the present main line from Smith's Falls to a point near Peterboro.

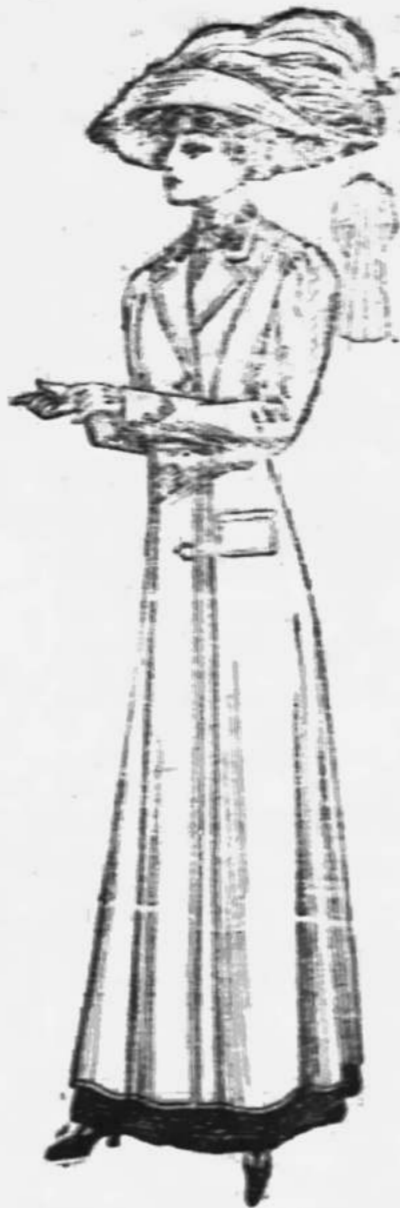
