

MILITIA CHANGES

General French's Recommenda tions to Be Followed.

IMPERIAL STAFF OFFICERS

English Staff College Men Will Be Appointed to Each Division and General Increase In Efficiency Is Looked For - New Adjutant-General Is Expected From Great Britain This Summer.

Kingston, March 22 .- Important announcements have just been made in military circles which go to show that the Militia Department has decided to accept Gen. French's recommendations for reorganization of the mili-tary forces of the Dominion. Pending the arrival of officers of the Imperial army, arrangements have been made temporarily for the following changes: Col. Thomas Benson, Ottawa, will be transferred to Kingston, to com-

be transferred to Kingston, to command a division here.

Col. T. D. R. Hemming, in command here, will be appointed A.A.G. at Toronto, the D.O.C.'s having been done away with. Major L. W. Shannon of London will come to Kingston as D.A.A.G., to replace Lieut. Col. D. Young, retired. Lieut. Col. Burstall, commanding the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, will go to Quebec dian Horse Artillery, will go to Quebec to take the place of Lieut.-Col. Eng-lish, who will become A.A.G. at Mont-real. Col. J. A. G. Fages will return to Kingston from Halifax as A.A.G. A radical departure will be made in the appointment of an officer of the Imperial Army to each division to act as Chief Staff Officer. The work of the deputay assistant adjutant-general for the second division, which for many years has been perwhich for many years has been performed by Lieut.-Col. J. Galloway, wil be divided between the chief staff officer and the D.A.Q.M.G. Lt.-Col. Galloway on account of ill-health,

is retiring.

It is understood that officers coming out from England may take the places of Col. Drury, Halifax: Col. Roy, Montfeal; Gen. Cotton, Toronto; Col. Benson, Ottawa. The adjutant-general. Col. Lessard, so it is reported, may be retired, and a war office official may take his place.

It is also reported that an officer of the Scots Guards had been selected for this post.

A Specious Proposal. London, March 22.—The Newcastle Chronicle says anent arbitration: "If we withdraw our forces it would not long before the United States annexed every inch of territory from Alaska to Winnipeg. It is not improbable that the next move of American diplomacy will be the offering of some concession like the free passage of warships through the Panama Canal as a recognition of the cession of Vancouver Island, Alberta, British Columbia, the Yukon, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Ontario. Despite the disclaimers, we need be in on doubt as to the desire of the United States to see the entire wheat belt of Western Canada under the Stars and Stripes, so that the territory from Chicago right up to Alaska would be under the jurisdiction of Washing-

VOTES FOR WOMEN

Studholme's Bill Lost In Ontario Legislature.

MEMBERS RATHER FAVOR IT

A Good Deal of Jocularity is Aroused In Debate on Question of Suffrage But While Most of the Members See Possibilities In It the Premier Advises Against It-Five Per Cent. Over \$60 Now.

Toronto, March 22.-Woman's suffrage occupied the attention of the Ontario Legislature yesterday afternoon. Representative members of the various woman's enfranchisement associations and other ladies thronged the Speaker's gallery. The other galleries were also filled by visitors, who listened with close attention to the speeches.

The introduction of the bill by Allan Studholme (Labor, East Hamilton), was not taken seriously by a number of the members, who, after indulging in bantering remarks, and a certain amount of ironical applause, betook themselves to the corridors. Sir James Whitney and Hon. A. G. MacKay gave the mover of the bill a respectful heading, as was also the case with about half the the other members of the House. Hon. Dr. Reaume, Hon. James S. Duff and Hon. J. S. Hendrie were absent, representing the Ontario Cabinet at the funeral of the late D. F. Tolchard, caterer at the Parliament Buildings.

In opening the discussion on his bill to grant women's suffrage, Mr. Studholme said the subject was as important as the subject of recipro-city which ha,d occupied the atten-tion of the Government for the past

two weeks. two weeks.

The question was: "Are women fit to vote?" Men seemed to have a habit of saying "no," and it was an insult to Canadian women. With their splendid intelligence and magnificent education they were just as capable to vote as any man at present sitting in the Legislature.
"Some of the members have asked

me if I wanted to live under petticoat government." said Mr. Studholme. "Well, as a child I lived
under the petticoat government of
the best mother that ever was.
"The second I lived under the petticoat

"In England I lived under the petticoat government of the best Queen that ever was. I am still under pet-ticoat government of the best wife that ever was, and I have got the best mother-in-law in the world. So why shouldn't I like petticoat govern-

One of his chief reasons for demanding suffrage for women was that women were forced to sell their labor cheap, and on account of the government of men, women were undercut-ting the labor market. Every labor organization in the whole world he knew of was ready to hold up both hands for woman's suffrage.

Where the equal franchise had been established the effect had been

to purify politics.
W. Proudfoot (Liberal, Centre Huron) said that from the manner in which the bill had been received he which the bill had been received he did not expect that it would receive lavorable treatment, but he hoped that the day would soon come that some Government would carry a bill through the Legislature.

Every member of the Fruse looked up with reverence to womanhood. It

was that feeling which caused many men to object to women mixing with men in politics. But the influence of women could always be counted upon where they had the vote when moral issues were involved.

A. E. Donovan (Con.), Brockville, argued that it had been in the best interests of society that women be not allowed to vote and the Legislanot allowed to vote and the Legisla-ture should wait until they were abso-lately sure that the bulk of the women of the province wanted the franchise. It was his firm belief that the intelli-gent mass of women had no desire to mix up in the animosities of politics. R. J. McCormick (Lib.), East Lamb-ton, whose Irish wit and accent are tichly appreciated, was applauded un-til the whole auditorium acheed when

tichly appreciated, was applanded un-til the whole auditorium echoed, when he rose to his feet. He confessed that he didn't have very much to say that was going to please the ladies in the galleries, but he simply had to say something, because all the members of his household were women, and they would go for him if he didn't take some part in the discussion. Humbly be would advise that things he allow. would advise that things be allow-

od to go on as they were.

Dr. J. S. J. Smellie (Con.), Fort William, said he was getting up in years now, and if he were younger, his view: on the question might be different. Laughingly, he gave Mr. Studholme the hint that while latitude was tolerated in the House, longitude was intelerable and aborningly. intolerable and abominable. However, he would suggest that before another

he would suggest that before another political campaign came, an educative campaign should be inaugurated to instruct the foreign voters.

The proper thing to do was not to admit ladies to the polls until the Legislature had taken hold of the foreign element and instructed them up to this standard.

Hon. A. C. Mackay said the bill was rather in the form of a resolution than of a bill, and even if adopted, would not amend the electoral law. For that reason, and also because there had been no demand, not a single petition presented, he would be compelled to vote against the bill at the present time. On the whole, he was rather in favor of the resolution.

Where the franchise had been granted to women, it was the hall mark of full citizenship. The enfranchised wo-man would not rock the cradle less, but would rock it with a more con-fident hand if she knew that her vote could be used to make the future of the contents of the cradle more safe.

If the women of Ontario want the vote, they should come to the Legis-lature with their petitions and apply for it in the usual way, but in the meantime, did the women think that they could accomplish more with the

Children Cry FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA vote than they were able to do now by the exercise of their influence? If the women of Ontario demonstrate that they desire the vote and believe

that they desire the vote and believe that they can do more for this province with it than by their influence without it, they would certainly have his vote when that time came.

erious thought.

It was sufficient guidance for him to note that every member in the House but the member from East Hamilton was opposed to the bill, and the mover had had difficulty even in getting a second. had difficulty even in getting a second-er. This, of course, did not mean that women's suffrage was wrong nor did it mean that it was right, but no Leg-islator had a right, having regard to his public duty, and the history of Great Britain, to vote for a bill of so-cial revolution when only one member in the whole province was in favor of it.

The bill was declared lost without a formal division.

At the night session of the Legis-lature, Hon. W. J. Hanna announced that the Government had decided to make the exemption from the 5 per cent. tax on bar receipts \$60 in cities and \$50 in towns and other municipalities. H. C. Lackner, North Waterloo, ap-

proved of the exemption being raised to \$60, but favored the amount be made general throughout the province.

Hon. W. J. Hanna replied that such an action would mean that nothing an action would mean that nothing would be collected outside of the cities, and in the cities \$60 was made the limit because the city licenses were much higher than in the towns.

A. E. Fripp (Con.) Ottawa West, moved the second reading of his bill to give municipalities local option in

the matter of assessing land at a higher rate than buildings.

Hon. A. G. MacKay said that he believed the bill was worthy of support. Sir James Whitney opposed the bill as being the thin edge of the single

TRAINMEN'S ARBITRATION

W. B. Northrup Takes Hon. Mackenzie to Task, But Minister Explains the Matter-Sir Wilfrid Asks That the Banque du Canada Bill Be Delayed - Reciprocity Lebate Is Continued In the House.

Ottawa, March 22.-The voice of the great west, emphatic, insistent, is making itself heard and heeded on the reciprocal trade arrangement. The Conservative Opposition at the capital is beginning to scurry for shelter. Mr. R. S. Lake, Qu'Appelle, the only Conservative member from the Province of Saskatchewan, led the re-treat in the Commons yesterday after-

On motion to go into supply, W. B. Northrup (E. Hastings), moved an amendment to the motion to go into supply, that the House expresses regret that the Government failed to make any intelligent efforts "to avert the late strike on the Grand Trunk Railway, to put an end to it during its continuance, or to compel C. M. Hays, president of the railway, to effectively carry out the agreement."
Mr. Northrup dealt severely with the
Minister of Labor, and declared that he had allowed himself to be put off with assurances from the company. The amendment was finally lost on division, and the House went into supply on marine estimates.

R. S. Lake (Qu'Appelle) took occasion to refer to a remark made by D. D. McKenzie (Cape Breton) last week that he (Mr. Lake) was the only elected representative of the people from the Province of Saskatchewan. who was opposed to the reciprocity agreement. He was not sure about that. It was a misstatement. So far he had not expressed himself upon the matter. He felt it his duty to weigh the information on both sides before coming to a decision, and in this connection he complained that the Government had handed out information in a niggardly fashion. Mr. Lake referred to previous discussions, and said that if the farmers of the west had known that Sir Wilfrid Laurier would have gone no farther than he has in the reduction of duties on manufactures the resolutions approxi manufactures, the resolutions approving of the agreement would have been

worded differently.

The members then indulged in what will likely be the last competition of the session in the presentation of resolutions for and against reciprocity. When it was over, Hon. Geo. Foster observed that, while it was interesting, the rules were being unduly stretched. Sir Wilfrid Laurier agreed with the member for North Toronto, and said that in future the rules would

be more closely observed.

The enquiry into the Lanctot charges was continued at the afternoon sitting of the privileges and elections committee yesterday. Mr. Papineau, director of the works at Sorel, informed the committee that he would informed the committee that he would not have granted the application for employes and material to be used on the Lanctot residence if it had been

the Lanctot residence if it had been made to him personally. Excepting in cases of great emergency he would decline to do such work.

When the private bill to incorporate La Banque du Canada came up in the House Sir Wilfrid asked Mr. Bickerdike, its mover, to allow the bill to stand over. "This is an important matter," remarked the Premier, "and the Government would like an opportant wou the Government would like an opportunity to consider it further."

Mr. Northrup, in supporting his re-Labor for not invoking the Conciliation Act and made no effort to secure an arbitration of the difference at issue between the parties. He proceeded, however, with an investigation which did not bind the company and did not benefit the men. The Minister should have brought about an arbitration, and, if necessary, should have used the "big stick" for the purpose. Mr. Northrup declared that the hon-

or of the crown was pledged to the men, and Mr. Hays' refusal to rein-state the strikers was a deliberate breach of faith. The Labor Department had been no benefit to the men, and Judge Barron was in the employ of the Grand Trunk. He had refused to hear any cases which had not first been appealed through the hierarchy

of the railway.

Mackenzie King dissented from the wiew that the Government should have forced a binding agreement upon the company. The Government had no power to compel the parties to submit to an arbitration. The men were not willing to arbitrate, because they claimed they were getting lower wages than the men or the C.P.R. The Gov. than the men on the C.P.R.. The Gov-ernment must either be credited with settling the strike or be free from blame for not enforcing the settle-ment. It was the action of the Government and intervention of the Cabinet Ministers which had led to the end of the strike If one could judge from results, it was evident that the "big stick" had been used effectively. Mr Hays had determined not to yield to arbitration, but fight to the bitter end regardless of cost. The employes had no objection to being taken back "as soon as possible."

Ottawa's Water Supply.
Ottawa, March 22.—The meteorological department of the Dominion Government has commenced observations at Lucerne and Perkins Mills, on the north and south sides of McGregor's Lake, to ascertain the water fall and temperatures. The information-secured will be given the city for use in considering the lake as a source of the city's water supply. The city en-gineer says there should also be bac-teriological tests of the water taken at various times.

SCHOOLS NOT VICIOUS.

London Official Says W. C. T. U. Charges Are Untrue.

London, March 22.—The charge of Mrs. May R. Thornley of the W.O. T.U., made to the Ministerial Alliance Monday, that immorality existed in the city schools, and that drinking, gambling and immorality was carried on in the young men's clubs, met with a storm of denial yesterday.

"I would not be afraid to challenge

anyone to find anything immoral go-ing on in our schools," stated George S. Weir, truant officer, yesterday.

"I do not believe there is anything in these reports of immoral condi-tions at all. I got a little magazine called The Purity Advocate some time ago. It was full of stories such as the ministers heard yesterday. It seems to me some of the women must

have been reading that.
"I suppose," continued the truant officer, who day by day goes in and out among the schools and the pupils, "that there are some boys, and perhaps girls, too, who are not as pure as they might be. Personally I know of one instance where all is not as it should be. But to imply that the schools are hotbeds of iniquity, that in them immorality is spread, is absolutely wrong. I feel sure of that.
"The trouble comes in when the

boys and girls have to leave school carly and work together. The schools themselves I know are free from all just suspicion of impurity."

Suckers Were Plentiful.

London, March 22.-All mail ceived at the postoffice for the Mes-dames Gall of Picadilly street, famous because of the matrimonial bureau episode, is being sent back to the "suckers" from whom it was received. This statement was made yesterday by Inspector Campbell of the post-

The inspector asked the postmaster to hold all mail coming for the wo-men, and requested that it be turned over to his department. This was done for the first day, and in the meantime the women in question were communicated with, and they agreed to have the mail returned to

the people who sent it. Since the matter came to light, the postoffice has been able to get some idea of the size of the correspondence carried on. Many letters have been received for them daily, and at times as many as thirty in one batch would come in. They were from all over the States.

Curtailing Sunday Work.

Washington, March 22.-Sunday work in postoffices throughout the country is to be discontinued so far as consistent with the faciliation of the transmission of the mail.

It is not proposed to close important postoffices entirely on Sundays. Mails will be received and despatched as heretofore, and arrangements will be made for a limited delivery through the general delivery windows and the distribution of mail boxes will be continued. Special delivery letters will be delivered, and patrons of any of-fice will be afforded the privilege of having their mail delivered on Sundays by depositing the required fee for special delivery service.

American Opposition. New York, March 22.—The executive officers, members of the executive committee and members of the board of managers of the American Protective League, held a special meeting yesterday and adopted resolutions reciting that "the manufacturer can hope to retain protection for his industry when protection has been pro-vided for the farmer," and urging that all friends of protection bring to bear "every proper influence on Con-gress against the adoption of the reci-procity agreement with Canada."
