

SWEPT BY A STORM Liverpool Wheat Futures Close High

Philadelphia Meets Disaster in Heavy Gale.

FACTORIES ARE WRECKED

Buildings Are Unroofed and Cupola of a Church Is Blown Off-Pennsylvania Line Is Put Out of Business to New York-Traction In the

City Entirely Tied Up by Lightning-One Man Killed.

Philadelphia, March 28.-A severe electrical storm accompanied by a high wind, which at times blew with cyclonic force, swept over the north-ern section of this city shortly after six o'clock last night, leaving destruc-

tion and death in its wake.

Buildings were demolished, houses unroofed, and the New York division of the Pennsylvania Railway was placed out of commission temporarily by the demolition of its tower at Holmesburg, cutting off all telegraphic communication. New York trains are being routed via the Trenton cut-off; which branch of the Pennsylvania Co. was not in the path of the high

Tacony, the section was completely cut off from the rest of the cits. Teleweakness at American and yworld's ship-tres in wheat and the heavy world's ship-tres were blown to the ground, and it was hours before the details of the catastrophe reached the central section of street, also lost its roof, as did the pear. The police station at Tacony was demolished. The evening squad of policemen were preparing to leave for their beats when the roof of the building was blown off and every window broken by a sudden burst of wind. At the Tacony station of the Pennsylvania Railway an unidentified man was killed when a portion of the man was ki man was killed when a portion of the structure was blown away. Many houses in this section were unroofed

or completely demolished.

In the manufacturing section of Kensington in the northwest, toward Tacony, several factories were destroyed, trolley wires were blown down and roofs of houses hurled to the centre of the streets. A corner section of the three-storey brick inctory of John Blood & Bros., manufactory of John Blood & Bros., manufactors of weallows. turers of woollens, at Trenton and Allegheny avenues, more than 100 feet in width, was torn away, wrecking much valuable machinery. Three hundred and fifty men who were employed here, it is said, will be out of work for at least two weeks. The factory of the Enterprise Cooperage Co., near-by, was struck by lightning, but the flames were extinguished before much

damage had been done.

NEW SHIPPING LAW

Hon, Mr. Brodeur Brings in Important Amendments.

BANK CHANGES ITS NAME

Banque Du Canada Will Insert the Word "Internationale" .- . Hiring of Pilots Is Compulsory, According to the Proposed Shipping Act-Conmee's Power Bill Passes House - Lake Manoeuvres.

Ottawa, March 28.-Good progress was made with routine business in the House of Commons yesterday, and if the same pace is maintained all week the decks will be clear by Monday next for a resumption of the reci-procity debate or such other business as the Government may want to de-

An important bill to amend the Canada Shipping Act was introduced by the Minister of Marine and Fisher-

The expected wrangle over the giv-ing of "La Banque du Canada" to the new financial institution, which Rudolphe Forget (Charlevoin) is promoting, was prevented by the inser-tion of the word "international."

Late in the evening the House went into committee of supply on the Speaker's estimates, which cover the

speaker's estimates, which cover the expenses of Parliament, and the members became jovial. George Taylor (Leeds) was inquisitive regarding points of minor economy, and objected to a vote of \$350 for engrossing an address to the Governor-General last session. He thought the work should have been done in the Printing Bureau and gave it as his oninion that

nave been done in the Printing Bureau, and gave it as his opinion that
"it would be thrown in the waste
paper basket any way."

When the House met, Hon. L. P.
Brodeur introduced a bill to amend
the Canadian Shipping Act. The important feature of the bill is that it
makes the hiring of pilots compulsory. The Minister explained at some sory. The Minister explained at some length that the proposed legislation was based on the recommendations of such bodies as the Dominion Marine Association of Ontario, the shipping interests of Montreal, the pilots and some important private companies. The bill provides that all vessels with draught of over ten feet will be obliged to take on pilots in the St. Lawrence. If the owners do not desire to take on pilots, the masters and mates in charge of such vessels must pass the necessary examinations.

Mr. Brodeur explained further that the bill would make provisions for all possible means being taken to provide for the safety of the St. Lawrence route. He believed that when the provisions of the bill became generally known it would do much to do away with the discrimination which existed in the matter of insurance against the St. Lawrence and in favor of American ports. Another proposed change is in refer-

ence to the time during which an enquiry into a wreck may be inaugurated. Under the law as it stands today an enquiry must be commenced with a month. The limit has now been extended to one year, at the instance of the imperial authorities.

Another departure from the present

Another departure from the present ractice is that vessels with the certificates of the British Board of Trade or other responsible British and foreign bodies may, with the consent of the governor-in-council, be relieved

from the necessity of boiler inspection on this side of the Atlantic.

The bill will also give the Govern-ment larger powers in respect of the regulation of the channels of the St. Lawrence.

R. L. Borden brought up a pertinent question regarding certain naval manoeuvres which it is proposed to hold in Lake Michigan during the coming summer. He read a forecast of the program from an American newspaper, which included a cruiser from the navy proper. The leader of the Opposition asked if the Government had consented to the passage of

such a vessel through the canals. Sir Wilfrid replied that the agree-Sir Wilfrid replied that the agreement of 1817 provided for one war vessel carrying one 18-pounder gun should be allowed on Lake Ontario and two on the Upper Lakes. He was not prepared to say if the manoeuvres mentioned would come within the purview of the treaty. The matter was engaging the attention of the Government, and if necessary representations will be made to Washington. If he remembered rightly the ington. If he remembered rightly the United States had made application to be allowed to pass a cruiser through the canals, but he thought that the application had been declined. Another application had been made to take one training ship down and substitute another.

When the bill to incorporate La

Banque Du Canada was reached, Mr. Fielding announced that by agree-ment with the promoters the name had been changed to La Banque In-ternationale Du Canada. He moved that the clause be amended accord-ingly, which was done, and the bill

was given a third reading.

James Conmee (Thunder Bay and Rainy River) had his annual assaultat-arms with the Commons yesterday afternoon in a revival of the dispute over the power situation at Fort Frances, when his bill to amend legislation of two years ago came up in committee. The bill is ostensibly to bring the works of the Ontario & Minneapolis Power Co. under the jurisdiction of the Minister of Public Works.

A. C. Boyce (West Algoma) opposed the bill because it was an invasion of provincial and contractual rights.

W. S. Middlebro (North Grey) said a protest had been received from the

Provincial Government. The interests of the municipality had been safe-guarded by an agreement with the province, acting as trustee for Fort Frances, in June last, and that agree-ment was beyond the jurisdiction of the Federal Parliament.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier then took a hand in the discussion. He thought the legislation was necessary. A pre-cedent to the construction of works of any kind was the rights of navigation. The dam must be passed upon by the

Ferrer Case Debated.

Madrid, March 28 .- The debate on the trial of Prof. Ferrer, the founder of the modern school at Barcelona, who was executed in October, 1909, opened in the Chamber of Deputies opened in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday and attracted unusual attention. The proposal to discuss this trial was made by the Republicans and accepted by the Government many months ago. The Republican press declares that the revival of the Ferrer case means the end politically of Senor Maura, who was Premier at the time, and his colleagues.

Deputy Soriano opened the debate

and asserted that none of the facts-charged against Ferrer constituted the crime of rebellion, according to the military law. The Government was advised to that effect, he said, by the local military authorities. Fer-rer's trial and execution were directly. due to political causes, for which the Conservative Government and party

were answerable.

He pointed out that the court-martial before which Prof. Ferrer was tried had only four hours in which to examine the papers in the case, which took up the 1,200 pages of printed matter. This alone would give some idea of what the trial was worth.

Alabama Tornado Kills Three. Monroeville, Ala., March 28.—Three persons were killed near here Sunday night by flying timbers frem buildings that were blown from their foundations by a tornado.

Sheldon operated in Montreal until October of last year. He fled from October of last year. He fled from that city after the Montreal papers had unmasked his swindling game. Shortly after absconding from Montreal he was seen in Pittsburg. His wife, who fled from Montreal shortly after Sheldon left there, came to Second of the second of Scranton, where her parents rive, and where Sheldon formerly did business. It was expected that sooner or later Sheldon would turn up in this neighborhood, and the authorities have been keeping an active watch for him ever since. Yesterday their vigilance

ployment of force. Latest advices from Pekin are that the Chinese Foreign Office has assured the Russian Minister that the ultimaturn that China acquiesce in the conditions put forward as to the treaty of 1881 will be complied with before the time limit expires on Tuesday.

Peace Sunday In States.

Philadelphia, March 23.-Dr. W. H. Roberts, state clerk of the Presbyterian Church, and chairman of the executive commission of the federal council of the churches of Christ in America, yesterday sent out a request that sermons be preached in all churches in the federation next Sunday, upon the subject of "Arbitration as a Substitute for War."

Dr. Roberts in his request says that the churches of all England have forwarded a cablegram asking the churches of America to unite with them in the present movement next Sunday, from all pulpits on the sub-ject of arbitration between England and the United States, now pending.

Alberta Against Negroes.

Edmonton, Alta., March 23.—The arrival of the colored immigrants from Oklahoma, together with their conspicuousness on the streets the past two days, has stirred up bitter feel-ing. Dr. Ely Synge has written a strong letter to the papers, protesting against the admission of negroes into the provinces.

Premier Sifton stated that there was nothing in the provincial statutes to keep the negroes out. The board of trade is committed to a policy rigidly against immigration of the negro. The negroes leave to-day for Atha-basca Landing, in which vicinity they

will take up their future homes.

London Old Boys' Re-union.

London, Ont., March 28—At a neeting of citizens last night, it was decided to hold an old boys' re-union during the week of Aug. 7. This is the first one in three years, and it is confidently expected that former residents from all parts of Canada and the United States will attend. Officers were elected as follows: President, Col. Harry Abbott; first vice-president, Dr. F. L. Wood; second vice-president, George Belton; third vice-presi-dent, ex-Mayor Stevely; secretary, J. O. Weldon; treasurer, James Bell.

Bankers to Stay In Prison.

Washington, D.C., March 28.—From sources close to the President it was sources close to the President it was learned westerday that the pardon appeals of the two convicted bankers, Charles W. Morse, of New York, and John R. Walsh, of Chicago, undoubtedly will be denied. It is stated that the Attorney-General's recommendation in both cases is adverse.

Children Cry FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA FIRE PROBE BEGINS.

New York Authorities Find Terrible Carelessness In Buildings.

New York, March 28.—The fixing of the blame for the loss of 141 lives in the Washington square fire of Saturday drew to a focus yesterday the energies of the district attorney's staff, the fire marshal, the coroner, the state labor department and Borough President McAneny of Manhattan. Dozens of investigators collected every scrap of available information Grand jury-men turned personal probers, and an additional grand jury, in a formal resolution presented to the Court of General Sessions, offered their aid to the district attorney and declared that some one should be prosecuted for the disaster.

What the probers found - evidence that doors at exits swung inward, the crumpled fire escape in the air shaft, the one fire escape blocked by iron shutters when opened, an empty water tank on the roof, and the practice prevalent among cutters of lighting cigarettes a few minutes before quitting time—all this, and what is yet to be ferreted out, will be placed speedily before the grand jury for ac-tion, District Attorney Whitman an-

The tenement house department summoned owners of pall a dozen faulty structures to the Police Court as a preliminary step to a far-reaching as a preliminary step to a large state of the man was held for violating the law, and other cases, it was announced, will be pressed to-morrow. Fire Marshal Beers summoned the proprietors of the Triangle Waist Co., and several em-ployes, to testify at a public investigation, largely to enquire into the truth of reports that doors leading to the fire escapes were blocked.

Montreal Militiame. Sore. Montreal, March 28.—The local military pot is boiling, in fact it is red hot. And the cause of it is the order issued from Ottawa that all Lee-Enfield rifles be returned to stores, and

that the regiments be armed with the Ross rifle, mark 2 (the short Ross). The local miltia men are sore, from C. O. to recruit, claiming that the change means that shooting will be seriously interfered with, if not made impossible, except for those who purchase their own rifles. The mark 2 Ross rifles, which are supposedly the arm of the militia, and the territorial arm of the minitia, and the territorial rifles from Britain are both allowed on the ranges, the shots claim that a militiaman who does not wish or cannot afford to pay \$45 for one of these cannot compete with those who can, and rifle competitions are out of the question for the ordinary militiaman.

\$2,500 Damages. Toronto, March 28.—Five-year-old Arthur Ewing was the chief witness in his father's suit against the Toronto Railway yesterday, despite the fact that he said not a word. He ex-hibited a wooden leg, the result of in-juries received when the wheel of a street car passed over his foot on Nov. 14, 1908.

The prosecution claimed that the car could have stopped in time, but as the motorman is dead and the conductor unknown, Counsel Mc-Carthy, for the street railway, could bring no evidence to controvert the claim. The jury awarded Richard Ew-ing, the father, \$500, and the youngster \$2,000.

Rector's Unusual Request.

Montreal, March 28.—A request for one hundred square inches of human skin was made by Rev. Dr. Herbert Symonds before his sermon at Christ Church Cathedral Sunday evening. William Thomas two weeks ago fell on a red-hot stove at his house while

noting to fix a stove pipe. tors now declare that only a new skin can save the man's life. Dr. Symonds asked for thirty members of the congregation to volunteer each to part with a piece of their skin three inches long and one inch wide.

Mormon Treasurer Dead.

Salt Lake, Utah, March 23.-James Jack, treasurer of Utah for twenty years, and treasurer of the Mormon Church for more than fifty years, died at his home here yesterday. He was 62 years old.

Jack crossed the plains with an ox team in the early sixties. Shortly after reaching Salt Lake City he was appointed by Brigham Young, as treasurer of the church. He served in this office under all Mr. Young's successors.

Honor for Grenfell.

New York, March 28.—The council of the Royal Geographical Society of England has awarded to Dr Wilfred T. Grenfell, the misisonary and explorer, the Murchison Bequest for the current year in recognition of his many years' work in Labrador, which has added to the world's geographical knowledge. Announcement of the award was made here yesterday.

Private Banker's Death.

New York, March 28.-When busi-ness opened at the private bank of Julius De Brovsky yesterday, the first customer could get no answer to her questions from the banker, who sat leaning over a table, seemingly bur-ied in thought. In his abdomen was a bullet wound. Investigation showed \$1,000 missing from his safe.

Perished In the Flames. Aurora, Mo., March 28 .- Dr. D. E.

Morris, and his four children were burned to death early yesterday in a fire that destroyed the Morris bome. Morris threw a mattress out of the window and lowered his wife and seven-year-old daughter to safety and went to get the other children. He never returned.

Woman and Three Children Burned. Harrisburg, Ky., March 23.—In the destruction of the home of her father, J. T. Veach, by flames early yesterday, Mrs. J. M. Bridges and her three children burned to death.
