IT GOES TO LORDS Parliament Bill Passes Last Stage in Commons. COMPROMISE IS UNPOPULAR Lord Lansdowne's Bill in the Upper House is Debated on Second Reading. But the Tory Leader Will Have a Hard Time Covering Some of His Followers Who Want to Fight to Last Ditch.

London, May 16.—The fight in the House of Commons over the Parliament bill, also designated as the veto bill, for the curtailment of the powers of the House of Lords, ended last night. An amendment moving the rejection of the whole bill was defeated by a vote of 363 to 543, and a motion for the adoption of the bill on third reading was carried 302 to 241.
