Brantford, May 15.—Preaching at the Colborne street Methodist church last night, Rev. E. B. Lanceley, Hamilton, condemned modern Marathon races, declaring that it was a sin to test one's powers to the limit of endurance. He also attacked the practice of putting boys in jail. It was a crime, he said, to imprison any boy, for youth was largely the victim of heredity till the boy came to the time to accountability and young manhood. Were he a legislator he would place on the statute books an act prohibiting committing boys to jail by any magistrate.

Having closed the office about 10 o'clock on Friday evening he passed into the dwelling in the rear of the office, and after sitting down with his father in the dning-room for a few minutes complained of feeling tired, and retired, saying he was going to bed.

The father retired as usual, but becoming restless about midnight he rose and going down stairs was surprised to find the back door wide open, an unusual occurrence. About the same time he saw through a window a buggy drive by south-

Nature provides the hallocination which flings a lover at his mistress's feet. For the chill which follows upon attainment she cares nothing—let 'society and individuals make their account with that as best they may. Even with a wife such as Sidwell the process of disillusion would doubtless have to be faced, however liberal one's allowances in the forecast.

Reflections of this colour were useful; they helped to keep within the growth of agitating desire. Parliament Bill Passes Las Stage in Commons.

COMPROMISE IS UNPOPULAR

London, May 16 .- The fight in the London, May 16.—The fight in the House of Commons over the Parlia-ment bill, also designated as the veto-bill, for the curtailment of the powers of the House of Lords, ended last night. An am-idment moving the re-jection of the whole bill was defeated by a vote of 503 to 143, and a motion for the adoption of the bill on its third reading was carried 50% to 941, to the House of Lords at an early date.

It is expected that the bill will go to the House of Lords at an early date.

The debate in the House of Lords yesterday, on the second reading of Lards Lord Landowne bill for the reconstruction of the Upper Chamber, indicated that the leader's orders will be considered the large of the lar

rather than at the hand of their lord-ships.

Lord Morley of Blackburn, spokes-man for the Government, insisted that the passage of the veto bill must pre-cede any settlement or compromise with respect to the Upper Chamber. He three out the signification of the Lords the number would be restricted to 100. This is regarded as foreshadow-ing the purpose of the Government when the reform of the House of Lords comes before it for consideration.
