THE TORONTO GLOBE AND **COBOURG QUIET** SIR ARTHUR CURRIE **AFTER BIG TRIAL**

Under the heading "General Currie Vindicated" the Globe of May 2nd said, "True or untrue, it is doubtful if the article should have been written."

It is a fact that the jury gave a verdict in favor of Sir Arthur, it is not, however, generally known that a substantial number of that jury were opposed to giving a verdict of that character.

A short time ago the Globe printed a warning to its readers pointing out the danger of writing letters for publication while an action was being tried at Cobourg. The action is now out of court-will the Globe now print those letters? There is no danger.

Defendants will by demanding of Parliament an investigation and securing not only "The truth" but "the whole truth" about the frightful, unnecessary waste of human lilfe, not only at Mons, but throughout the war as was charged by the Port Hope Guide?

The Port Hope Guide has not solicited help but without solicitation on our part we have received numerous letters offering valuable evidence and substantial sympathy.

We challenge the Globe or any other city paper in Toronto or elsewhere to ask for an expression of public opinion in the way we have suggested.




Defendants in Currie-Preston Mr. Fred Winfield's Recital In Libel Case Decide On Appealing the Verdict
