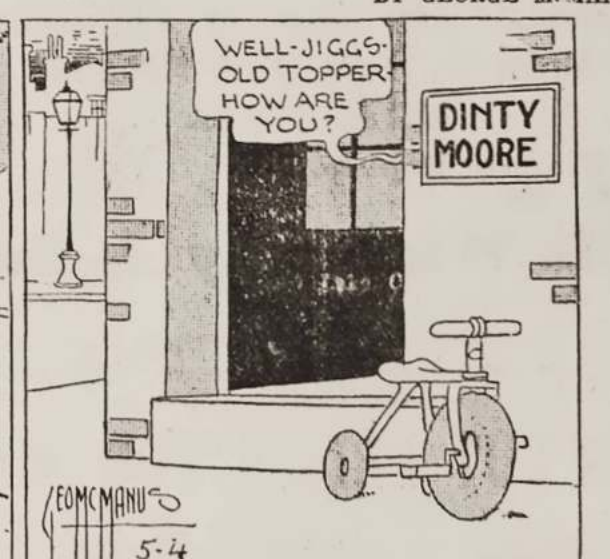

STARS BROUGHT CLOSE AS SUN

Sort of "Trick" Camera Work By Astronomers Show Far Distant Worlds

Gigantic stars that could engulf the whole solar system are transported from their far distances of hundreds of trillions of miles; and set beside our own sun as a result of the latest researches of astronomy.

Spectral messages are received by a combination of the world's largest stellar spectrograph and the world's largest telescope, the 100 inch on Mt. Wilson, California. They are interpreted by Prof. Henry Norris Russell, Princeton astronomer, who worked with Dr. Walter S. Adams, director of the Mt. Wilson observatory.

The powerful spectrograph just put into commission, gave stellar spectra photographs almost as detailed as the standard spectra of the sun, the earth's nearest star. Hundreds of lines in these fingerprints of the stars were revealed for the first time. These spectrum lines allow the astronomer to analyze the stuff of stars, take their temperature and probe their atmosphere.

"For the giant red stars, such as Antares and Betelgeuse, the total quantity of material above a square mile of the visible surface is apparently about a hundred times as great as in the sun," Prof. Russell said. "Procyon, a dwarf star only a little brighter and probably no larger than the sun, has an atmosphere comparable with the sun's in extent."

The lines of the new photographs tell the proportion of excited atoms loaded with energy and thus determine the temperature, which range from 3,000 to 10,000 degrees centigrade for the stars studied.

THOSE BIG STAMPS

Although the diamond jubilee of Confederation was celebrated ten months ago, the special stamp issue commemorative of that anniversary is still in circulation to the increasing displeasure and annoyance of those who make use of the postage stamps in large quantities.

Some harsh things are being said of the Post Office Department in the lobbies of post offices where they are being purchased and in the offices where they are used because of the continued circulation of these

stamps at a time when the jubilee has become little more than a memory.

All those who are required to do twice as much stamp-licking as was formerly the case, and who consider the jubilee issue a positive encumbrance (however appropriate the issue may have been almost a year ago) are praying for relief; and yet the stamps continue to be offered for sale and there is, apparently, no possibility of an immediate exhaustion of the supply.

The Post Office Department prides itself upon the service which it renders the public. It is in grave danger of losing the reputation which it has created in such a respect if it does not immediately call in the remainder of the special stamp issue. The patience of the public is almost at an end.—Brockville Recorder and Times.

Al Mamaux, Newark's leading pitcher, failed to take a leaf out of Jack Bentley's book in yesterday's game at Maple Leaf Stadium and lives to regret it. With the Bears leading by 3 to 2 entering the 9th inning Mamaux decided to pitch them in the groove for Dale Alexander, Toronto's mighty slugger, and "Big Alex." promptly poled that ball high and far up against a sign in the right-field and never stopped until he reached third base. Leslie Burke's single past Fournier scored Alexander with the tying run and singles by Bedore and Phillips and a long sacrifice fly by pinch hitter Sexton gave the

Leafs the winning run, Bedore crossing the plate.

It was the fifth straight victory for "Bill" O'Hara's men and it placed them on the top rung in the International League, Rochester falling back when defeated by the Skeeters in the Flower City. Toronto outdid the invaders by 12 to 9, but only that terrific blow by Alexander saved them from defeat.

INCREASES LEAD

The English 'iron-man,' Peter Gavuzzi, picked up a day's growth of beard and a wider lead over his nearest opponent, Andrew Payne, Oklahoma, in the 61st lap of the transcontinental bunion derby on Thursday.

While Harry Rea, Los Angeles, finished first in the day's 34.7 mile lap from Normal, Ill., to Pontiac, in 4.05. 21, Gavuzzi came in for a triple tie for second place, boosting his lead in the 2300 miles travelled so far to 5.19. 36 over the youthful Payne, who finished the lap in a tie for tenth place. Payne ran the 34.7 miles in 4.59.55 and was tied with Roy McMurtry, Minneapolis. Gavuzzi, John Salo, of Passaic, N.J., and Olli Wantinnen, of New York made the lap in 4.32.03.

Gavuzzi's total time for the distance from Los Angeles, the starting point of the derby is 376.21.52; and Payne's is 381.41.28. By his performance the Southampton runner proved he was not cracking. Wednesday he finished in a tie for sixteenth place for the sixtieth lap after shaving his beard for the first time since he left the West Coast.

Reports from various sections indicate that the trees have wintered well this year, and that with good weather conditions prevailing, a normal crop is looked for. The show of blossoms will indicate the size of the crop likely to be secured, growers said.
