FIRE DAMAGES LOWE'S THEATRE

Watchman Lowers Asbestos Curtain and Checks Flames

Strenuous efforts of a large detachment of firemen early this morn ing saved Loew's Yonge St. Theatre, Toronto, from destruction by a fire which did damage estimated at \$30,-000 to the interior of the playhouse and to the furnishings.

One of the chief items in the loss was caused by the total destruction of the magnificent \$12,000 pipe organ, which was consumed in the flames, along with a number of valuable orchestra instruments left in the pit.

The quick controlling of the outbreak was made possible by the prompt action of the night watchman Isaac Thompson of Norwood Avenue, who, on seeing the flames, cut a rope and dropped the asbestos curtain at the front of the stage. Chief Russell thought the blaze was the result of spontaneous com-

District Chief Corbett responded with the downtown sections and Chief Russell arrived a few minutes later when apprised of the extent fight the outbreak from the Victoria Street end of the building.

Three or four high pressure lines were laid into the interior of the building, through stage entrances and exits, while other details of firemen attacked the fire from the Yonge Street doors.

INCREASE IN INCOME TAX

Collection Department Active Euler Reports-Warns of Penalties for Deception

Hon. W. D. Euler, minister of national revenue stated that the collections of income tax as at May 1 of the current fiscal year are \$23,850,615.21 as compared with \$9,450,439.05 for the same period of last year, an increase of \$14,400,-176.16. Mr. Euler attributes this to increased efficiency, and activity of this division and gives some cred it to the large advertisements which the department ran this year for the first time in the daily papers.

The minister also stated that with the new powers which have been given the department this year a greater effort will be made to discover "coupon clippers" who have failed to report interest received from government, municipal and cor poration bonds

Mr. Euler intimated that even if a taxpayer has made an income tax return in which he has failed to declare this interest as income he has still an opportunity of submitting of his own volition an amended return. If he fails to do this and his holdings are disclosed through the activities of the income tax officers the department will have no alternative but to press for the maximum penalty.

Lone Eagle To Start Venture From Newfoundland, Is Expectation

Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's project invest. ed flight to Europe this summer in at least half a dozen independent quarters. STARS BROUGHT **CLOSE AS SUN**

Sort of "Trick" Camera Work By Astronomers Show Far Distant Worlds

Gigantic stars that could engulf the whole solar system are transported from their far distances of ger of losing the reputation which hundreds of trillions of miles and it has created in such a respect if set beside our own sun as a result it does not immediately call in the of the latest researches of astrono-

Spectral messages are received by a combination of the world's largest stellar spectograph and the world's largest telescope, the 100 inch on Mt. Wilson, California. They are interpreted by Prof Henry Norris Russell, Princeton astronomer, who worked with Dr. Walter S. Adams, director of the Mt. Wilson observatory.

The powerful spectograph just put into commission, gave stellar spectra photographs almost as detailed as the standard spectra of the sun, the earth's nearest star. Hundreds of lines in these fingerprints of the stars were revealed for the first time. These spectrum lines allow the astronomer to analyze the stuff of stars, take their temperature and probe their atmos-

"For the giant red stars, such as Antares and Betelgeuse, the total quantity of material above a square mile of the visible surface is apparently about a hundred times as great as in the sun," Prof. Russell sald. "Procyon, a dwarf star only a little brighter and probably no larger than the sun, has an atmosphere comparable with the sun's in extent.'

The lines of the new photograph. tell the proportion of excited atoms loaded with energy and thus determine the temperature, which range from 3,000 to 10.000 degrees centigrade for the stars studied.



HOW TO USE ALBERTA COAL

So varied are the qualities of different Alberta coals that it has been found necessary to classify them for purposes of shipment to Ontario under the test rate recently authorized by the Dominion Government. Thus J. A. Ellis, the Fuel Controller for Ontario, points cut in the Ontario Gazette that certain coals will store in open covered sheds, others in closed sheds, others must be taken directly from the cars for storage in the consumers' closed bins or cellars, while another class is able to withstand only one handling. The public, as consumers of this coal, will consequently need to be on the alert if unscupulous dealers do not substitute for the better grades of Alberta coal those inferior grades which sell at a lower price.

Mr. Ellis furnishes certain suggestions for the consumption of Alberta coal which the user would do well to bear in mind. To obtain the best results, he declares that it should be remembered that the Alberta coals require only one half the draught requisite for United States anthracite. Moreover, in stoking, it is best to fill only one side of the fire pot not quite full, other side. This leaves a vent for Roasting Pork lb 17c to 22c. Side Pork 20c; Sausage 23c the fire to get through instead of having the top a dead mass of coal for some time.

The grate does not require much shaking. The coals are almost smdkeless, produce but little ash, and no slate, bone or stone and it is well to leave a fair amount of ash on the bottom of the grate.

The Fuel Controller makes the further suggestion that the various mlunicipalities of the provinces, as well as school boards and public bodies, should endeavor to provide for the use of Alberta coal in at least one public building during the coming winter in order that it may be given a thorough test .-Brockville Recorder and Times.


