GLOOMY CROP REPORTS

A Backward Season-Fall Wheat and Clovers Damaged the Past Winter.

William Rickard and A. A. Col-will, West Durham, writing to last week's Sun, give rather a gloomy picture of the destruction wrought

picture of the destruction wrought the past winter, especially upon clovers and fall wheat.

Mr. Rickard says: "Both red and alsike clover are exceedingly bad in our section. I have seven acres of killed out red clover on a farm which I have worked for 33 years. This is the first season which I have had a clover failure in all that time. Similar conditions prevail on nearly every tarm in the neighborhood.

Both clover and alsike are being
ploughed up wholesale.
Fall wheat came out better than
clover. Some wheat fields are fairly good, while many are very poor.
The season is exceedingly backward, more so than anyone now
living can remember. The outlook
for farmers is, to say the least,
rather gloomy."

living can remember. The outlook for farmers is, to say the least, rather gloomy." Mr. Colvull says: "Prospects for fall wheat and new clover seed this spring are certainly not very bright. I never saw young clover seeds more killed out. Fall wheat seems to have fared somewhat better, although many fields are bady winer killed. The heavy ice crust formed in mid winter had a tendency to smother these crops, and the hard, dry, frosty weather through March and April played havo:

Very little seeding has been done at this date JApril 2 rand) only a few very early fields having been sown. Unless we get better weather in the future, the crop of grain and hay must be short. Plasture will be late and feed, which at one time promised to be abundant, will have a heavy drain upon it for sometime yet.

Appeared for Sentence.

William Neil, of Haliburton, who was remanded for a week on a charge of stealing a horse from Melvin Bowins, of Pontypool, appeared this morning for sentence. Crown Attorney Kerr had made inquiries about Neil's past record and had learned that Neil had never been in trouble before.

Neil esplained to Magistrate White that he went from Haliburton to Peterboro and wheeled from there to Pontypool. He left Pontypool again and went into a swamp to rest and while there drank a bottle of whisky. Returning to the village he broke into Bowins' barn and stole the horse.

His Honor informed the prisoner that he had since learned that the wheel he referred to was stolen by him at Peterboro, and a warrant was then issued for his arrest. After stealing the horse he rode it to Port Hope, a distance of thirty miles and he considered this cruelty. He then cut off one of the forelocks and tried to sell the horse for \$755\$. It did not appear to His Honor like the work of a drunken man, but rather a deliberate plan. The maximum punishment was fourteen years in penitentiary, but this being his first offence he would deal leniently with him. He sentenced the prisoner to nine months in the Central Prison at hard labor.
