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They Scoop in Many Prizes at the World's Fair.

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WORLD'S FAIR, CHICAGO, Oct. 7. The fates have been kind to the White City. From the let of June till the past and bardly a drop of rain felt During the week fast closed the daily at missions varied from 143,000 to 222,000, the total for the week being about a round million, with a grand aggregate since May lat of 15,700,000. Monday (Chicago Day) will, it is expected, show up at least half a million, and it needs no great optimism to place the grand total up to Ostober 31st at

20,000,000. THE SHEEP EXHIBIT.

Resuming the subject of sheep where it was left last week, we come to the Dorset Horns, which are a novelty in their way and quite a curlosity to most of the visitors to the stock barns. The Dorsets are a mutton breed, the fisece not being heavy. They are bardy and vigorous and very prolific. The horns are the first thing that strike an observer, growing on both rams and ewes, and are a valuable feature in protecting them from the attacks of dogs; in fact, their admirers claim that they are dog proof, which of itself, would be enough to recommend them highly in most parts of Ontario. The Ontario prize-winners were J. A. McGillivray, Uxbridge, and Thos. W. Hector, of Springfield on the Credit, who shared up some \$765 between them.

In the Southdown class the first realls serious competition began, breeders from Ohio, Nebraska, Illinois, Kentucky and other States contesting the honors with the Ontario men-John Jackson & Son, and D. J. Jackson of Ablugdon, and T. C. Douglas, of Galt-with the result that our country. men took nearly all that was worth having. BOME SI, UHU TN MONEY.

The Shropshires are probably the favorite sheep in America to day, more of them being raised than of any other breed. The American Shropshire Association, of which Hon. John Dryden, Ontario's Minister of Agriculture, had the honor of being reelected President the other day, has over 1,200 members, and the number is inheavier than the Southdowne, and the mutton is coarser for the most part, though it reaches the Southdown standard in the best specimens. English farmers look on the Shrops as the rent payers. Ontario entered two flocks, those of John Campbell, of Woodville, and W. H. Beattle, of Wilton Grove. No less than \$1,170 in prizes fell to their lot, of which Mr. Campbell trok the lion's abara.

HAMPSHIRE DOWNS

are not very extensively bred on this side of the water, though they are a very useful sheep, bling exceedingly popular in Eogland, where they are largely used for crossing on the long-wooled breeds for large and rapidly growing lambs. The wool is nearer like that of the Southdowns than either the Shrops or Oxfords, and they are good general purpose animals. The only Ontario man who contested the honors with the Americans was John Kelly, of Shakes. peare, who brought over some five head of his Leicesters and took some \$50 in prize

Besides the breeds mentioned above. there are several in which Ontario is not represented, including the pretty little Cheviots, the Merines of various kinds, of which the most notable are the Rambouil. lets from Russia, with matted wool and ourious hooded heads. They are of large size and are said to produce good mutton, while their fleece is of great length and fine staple. Then there are the ourlous Persian sheep, with lop ears, huge tails and ourly coats, from which is obtained the Astrachan fur of commerce, and the beautiful Angora goats, with silky coats and long whiskers. These two latter are beginning to be extensively bred in California, where they appear

to thrive well. Roughly going over the sheep prize list I find that while Americans had 411 animals in the mutton classes against our 310, the awards stood : First prizes, Ontario, 61; U. S., 49; second prizes, Ontario, 47; U. S., 44; third prizes, Ontario, 46; U. S., 39; fouath prizes, Ontario, 35; U.S., 17. The money value of the Ontario sheep prizes was about \$6,800, which, added to the \$5,600 won for cattle and horses, makes a total of \$14,400. Querulous folks are agt to ask what good will result from the roending of so much money and how will it pay Ontario? No other way could the name of Ontario have "so well adverticed to the world, or so an attration coon sitrated to our native products. The sheep sales I have alluded to. Above and beside these there is likely to be a decided boom in fruit, as American buyers are constantly inspecting our mag

ulticent display and inquiring when it can be bought. Fruit is coming in at the rate of 300 to 500 entries a day and the quality is uniformly good. The lists of award are now being published and, as I foreshadowed, a very large number are coming our way. In small fruits alone we have had some 180 samples placed, and that is but a beginning.

The vegetable court continues to attract great attention, and, strange to say, it is the only one in which a really complete show of field and root vegetables is made, though some of the States make an effort in that direction. Of late there have arrived consignments selected from the Toronto Industrial and other shows, including mammoth mangolds, turnips and cabbages, as well as celery, onlone, beets, carrote, etc., of excellent quality. The potatoes are parfionlarly good, and in view of the almost total fallure of the crop in many of the States, buyers in Chicago and elsewhere have taken a good deal of notice of them and will visit Ontaria in the fall to make purchases.

The October cheese exhibit has arrived and is being installed by Mr. J. Ruddicks of the Dominion Experimental Dairy. It comprises some 424 cheese of 1893, 115 ci 1892 and 5 of 1891. The bulk of the cheese is from Ontario, though all the Provinces are represented. There are also 167 pack ages of butter, factory and dairy make. C. W. Young.

I corresponded regularly with Hooper, until Sept. 1892, Oct. 12, 1892, Rooper visited the asylum, and I did not see Hooper for about a year; before this he was very constant in his enquiry, I was not present when Hooper came for his wife. According to my instructions, my assistant, Dr, Buchan would not allow Mrs. Hooper to be taken out on probation. This was on Sept. 10th, about 2 a. m., so as to catch the Montreal boat. She was suffering from mania when she first came and refused food but recovered. She was in good physical health when she left, was strong, industrious and willing to work. Hooper was careful to keep his wife well clothed, was unusually well cared for in this particular. When he removed her he was careful to get clothing that she would like. I never heard of any complains of heart disease or cancer. She had no symptome of any disease beyond brain trouble. Have no reason to believe she had cancer; never heard her express any delusion, herself, to that effect. She had delusions of a religious nature, not suicidal. She frequently refrained from eating when she first name because she was afraid of polson. Whenever Mr. Hooper came he was very affectionate and considerate and appeared anxious that she was well cared for and

Hooper gave me message to send to all agents on the road between Louiseville and Montreal, about a orany woman who jumped off the train west of Louiseville. No signature was attrohed. of egram. He did not give his name, Hooper told me that he was employed by the government and whenever there was a crazy person in a place he had to get thema-Did not say what government. Mr. Hooper said she would die before getting Into Montreal; a doctor told him so. 1 car. ried her 150 feet. She died in the station on the floor in about 5 minutes. Hoopersaid she would die quicker in my arms. There was no contertion. She gasped for breath. She turned her eyes toward me as she died.

Hooper was walking before her when she was dying. The agent and assistant agent were both in the station. Hooper did not appear affected, was quite, indifferent when he was told she was dead. Hooper said be did not know who she was but that she was a single woman. I asked him her name and he said Georgina Malo De LeLlane. Hooper asked for a doctor. I was not present when the dector arrived and heard no conversation between them. I saw a mes. sage signed John Cooper. John Macdonald and John R. Hooper lying on the desk in the office.

The doctor opened her dress and examined her with his instruments. The body remained in the station until the moralng. Hooper and the hackman got coffin and a rough box. I helped to put the body in the coffin. A polloeman was in charge of the body. Hooper was there also. The coffin was big enough when I put her in the coffin. He eyes were wide open, bright and brilliant just like those of a living person. She remained the same all night. The doctor tried to close her eyes but they would not remain closed,

John R. Hooper was called but by advice of his solicitor would make no statement at present.

Silas H. Carpenter, detective aworn, explained where Georgina Malo Hooper's father and step mother lived and the route to take to get there.

He appeared to be all right mentally, talking rationally but said that the large quantities of mcrphine given him at the hospital still affected his head at times. He strongly objected to being confined at Cobourg

After the jurors had dispersed and the room cleared, Detective Carpenter product his warrant and placed Hooper under arrest. He and the prisoner left by the 11,35 train for Montreal last night.



SE ARCHING FOR POISON.

TORONTO, Oct. 9. - A correspondent to-day risited the School of Science, Toronto University, where in one of the chemical laboratories in the upper story Prof. Ellis and an assistant were engaged upon the task of analyzing the stomach and its contents of the deceased Mrs. Hooper. The eminent scientlat took the newspaper representative to a study and talked over the case. The stomach Prof. Ellis said, reached him on September 30. On making a preliminary examination he found that it would take a considerable time, perhaps two weeks, to ascertain defin. ately whether it contained evidences of polson having been taken or administered. The chemical investigation had been promptly commenced but he did not expect and had not within the week made sufficient progres to have come to any conclusion. It would, he thought, be Wednesday at the sconest, and perhaps longer before the analysis would be completed. So soon as the task was fin taked he would state that fact to the press but as to the nature of the result that would be communicated only to the authorities of justice, and must come to the public ear through the coroner's court.

LONDON has just taken a New South Wales loan of \$12,500,000. Notwithstanding the recent heavy failures in Australia the subscriptions for this loan aggregated \$32,500,000. English financiers have evidently not lost confidence in the future of that colony.

MR. CHRISTOPHER ROBINSON Who has been assigned to speak for Manitoba in the Manitoba school case is a lawyer who figures frequently in the public accounts of the Dominion. Since 1888 he has received from the public treasury \$31,296 for services rendered. Last year he got \$11,445.

The formerly diffidently presented "trials of speed" have developed into plain-English "races," and the big pumpkins and turnips, and the home art exhibits which have been carefully laid away in camphor and dusted out for exhibition every fall for twenty-five years, are not in the race for popularity when the score bell rings. The agricultural exhibition is passing.

THE recent superannuation of Mr. Vankoughnet, against his wish, at the age of 57, has again drawn attention to the abuses of the Civil Service superannuation system, as administered by the present Government. At the last session Mr. McMullen, M. P., presented some figures in Parliament showing that during the twelve years from 1881 to 1892 inclusive, \$676,-253,45 had been paid in to the Fund, and \$2,462,327.97 paid out, a loss to the country of \$1,786,074,42. In 1892 \$63,862,76 were paid in, and

\$258,489.88 paid out. Mr. McMullen was able to show that a very large number of the persons superannuated were below the superannuation age. One hundred and forty-nine were under fifty-five years of age, one hundred and three were under fifty years and seventy one were under forty five. The list increases as the necessities of the Government grow.

THE Inter-State Commerce Commission of the United States, in its fifth report now issued, finds that on June 30 last the total railway mileage of the United States was 173,563, an increase of 3,160 miles during the year. The total number of railway corporations was 1,122, of locomotives 33,136 and of cars 1,215,092. The number of passsengers carried during the year was 560,858,211. Of railway employes there were 821,415 an increase of 87,130 over last year. The gross earnings from operation of railways during the year were \$1,171,407,848. The operating expenses were \$780,-997,996. The capital value of the railway lines was \$10,226,746,184 Fewer employes were killed than in the previous year, the number being 2,554. Over 28,000 employes were injured, and 376 passengers were killed end 8,227 injured. It is proved from this that only one person in about a 1,500,000 passengers is killed. The railway affords pretty safe traveling after all.
