TOWN COUNCIL.

The thirty-second regular meeting of the Municipal Council of the town of Port Hope was held in the Council Chamber, Town Hall, last Monday evening, Nov. 8th.

Present.—His Worship Mayor J. W. Quinlan, in the chair; Reeves McMullen, Chalk and Barrett; Councillors Stevenson, Giddy, Peters and Purser.

The minutes of last meeting were read, corrected and on motion confirmed.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A printed circular from F. S. Spence of Toronto, in reference to commissioning the government, re a license by-law, was referred to the whole council.

Mr. Geo. M. Healy, late town treasurer, wrote as follows: "With much pleasure, and no less grateful appreciation of the generous action of your honorable body, I beg herewith to acknowledge the receipt of a cheque in my favor for the sum of \$200 in accordance with a resolution passed at your last meeting, and presented distinctly as an 'Honorarium'—a term at once euphonious and much more appropriate in significance than the statutory, formal 'gratuity.' The noble majority will please accept my thanks for the just and liberal consideration accorded me. In leaving the service of the Corporation, I desire to place on record the very agreeable association had with Mr. Jas. Evans, tax collector, the courteous deportment of Mr. John Wesley Sanders, town clerk and of Mr. John Gamble, market clerk, through successive years." Referred to the whole council.

From Mr. R. Grey, Secy. of the Benevolent Society, as follows: "I herewith append a detailed statement of the expenditure incurred by the Benevolent Society on the poor, assisted at the expense of the Corporation, during the last twelve months. A cheque for \$210.05 will greatly oblige our Treasurer, Mr. Helm, at once, as he must close his books before the 30th inst., at which date our annual meeting will be held, and to which we invite your honorable body." From Mr. G. Spence, Cobourg, advising that a meeting of the committee re Lake Shore Road, will meet in the County Clerk's office on Thursday, 11th, at 3 p. m.

From Mr. H. A. Ward, barrister, to the Town Clerk, under instructions from his client, Miss Ada R. Riordan, stating that the town will be held responsible for any damage suffered by her by the sewer now being put in. Some of the tenants of the buildings owned by her will be effected by the sewer and have already signified their intention of leaving, if the discharge is in the neighborhood of those buildings. Referred to the Chairman of Finance.

The mayor remarked something about the Finance Minister and he having looked over the books on Monday, found that the town has always been occupied a great deal in looking over Riordan's business.

From Mr. J. D. Smith, Treasurer, acquainting the council that on the first day of November, inst., he duly assumed the duties of Treasurer of this municipality and expressing his sincere thanks to the council for his appointment. He also forwarded a copy of balance sheet, dated Oct. 31st. The amount of cash handed over to him on assuming office was \$768.31, which he found to the credit of the Corporation in the town bank book. The Treasurer's report for October was laid on the table. The communication was referred to finance committee.

From Messrs. W. J. Robertson and W. S. Bletcher, town auditors, stating that they had examined the Treasurer's books and found them correct.

MARKET CLERK'S REPORT.

Mr. John Gamble, market clerk, presented the following statement of monies received by him during October.

Mr. H. Barrett, Chairman of Finance, stated that the fund for miscellaneous expenses is already overdrawn and it will behoove committees to be careful in expenditure. The estimate is \$355.96 and the expenditure \$396.55.

Before the finance report was presented, Mr. Chalk said he had accounts from the Electric Light Co., claiming balance for the last two months and for arrears of 1894. It was suggested by certain members that the present accounts not be settled until the one in arrears is disposed of.

FINANCE REPORT.

The Finance Committee presented its report, recommending the chairman to sign orders on the treasurer in favor of the following accounts, which, on motion, was received and adopted.

Moved by Mr. Peters, seconded by Mr. Chalk That Mr. James Curtis be allowed to open a drain across Brown street from the property of Mrs. Coleman, eastward, for the purpose of draining said property; owners of said property to be responsible for any damage while so doing, and that the work be done under the supervision of the Street and Bridge Committee.

Mr. Peters said the drain at present in the vicinity of the property is defective and that the water runs back into the cellars.

The resolution was carried.
The Finance Committee reported that the accounts of the late Treasurer have been audited and found correct and the certificates of the auditors is in the hands of the clerk. We accepted the books as correct, and handed them over to the newly appointed Treasurer, Mr. John D. Smith, who has deposited his bonds, properly signed, with the Town Clerk. Now the new Treasurer is taking office, we beg to recommend that all corporation cheques should be signed by the Mayor, as well as the Treasurer, and the Clerk be instructed to inform the Bank of Toronto to this effect and only he need sign the orders on the Treasurer, as passed by the council. Your committee also desire that the heating of the treasurer's office be made workable, the present stove being so defective and dangerous to health.

On motion to adopt the report, Reeve Barrett said the change in signing the cheques was first suggested by the manager of the Bank of Toronto, who thought the orders being simply signed by the Mayor on the Treasurer was not as safe a way as when the cheque is signed by both Mayor and Treasurer, which method gives the double safe guard that money is paid out in a proper manner. The signing of orders by the clerk only, will relieve the Mayor of a double duty. As regards the heating question, it should be looked after at once. The stove in question, leaks gas very badly and Mr. Barrett thought perhaps it was a factor in injuring Mr. Healy's health. A new stove should be put in or a hot air apparatus substituted which will heat a number of rooms in the building.

Mr. Stevenson thought the recommendations of the report all right and the resolution to receive and adopt the report was carried.

Moved by Mr. Barrett, seconded by Mr. Purser, That when this council adjourns, it stands adjourned for two weeks. Carried.
Reeve Chalk spoke in regard to the Electric Light & Power Co.'s account. There is a balance claimed by it since '94 and two for this year in August and February. Reeve McMullen and Coun. Giddy claim that residents of Englestown did not receive proper light in August and object to the bill. Mr. Chalk spoke to Dr. Corbett about the matter and was told the defect was probably due to boys having burned off the switch. A reduction \$5.55, the cost of one light for one month, had been made.

In regard to the accounts of previous years, Mr. Barrett thought the Electric Co. could not collect one cent. Deductions have been made for shortages at the time and the company has accepted the town's cheques in payment of accounts and Mr. Barrett therefore thought the company could not force the payment of more. He thought the account for November should be settled definitely in case any further complications arise.

Mr. Stevenson thought these accounts had been running a long while. In '94 there was a balance for \$5.85 and an extension to Gould's, \$25.00; February, '95, no't. rendered \$3.95; December, same year, another balance of \$10.00; '96, May 22, \$5.85; January, '97, \$14.40; August, \$38.75. He thought the matter should be referred to the Fire, Water & Light Committee to report upon.

Mr. McMullen remarked in regard to the \$25.00 item that Mr. Gould agreed to pay it if the extension were made. The Council should be charged for thirty-two arc lights. One lamp in Englestown, Mr. McMullen said, was not as good as a tallow candle and had been that way for years; he said the yarn about boys turning the switch was all moonshine.

Mr. Barrett maintained that the company had obtained all they were entitled to. The August balance of \$38.75 and that for November, in his opinion, should be settled.

Mr. Giddy suggested that the Committee find some means of knowing what light they are paying for, if possible.

The discussion was all out of order and Mayor Quinlan suddenly asked Reeve McMullen if the construction of the drain on Pine street was being looked after.

The Reeve replied that he had instructed Mr. Ray to see some pipes that were in town and if they were suitable to couple on to those already laid. The culvert will be repaired immediately.

Moved by Mr. Barrett, seconded by Mr. Purser, That the report of the Benevolent Society be received and an order on the

The Farmers' Loan & Savings Company after twenty-six years of business is going into liquidation. It has had some bitter experience with falling real estate values, but there is no likelihood of anybody losing by it, unless it be the stockholders, and improving times may do much for its property and securities.

The discovery that the Nulty children were murdered by their brother to make room in the house for a girl whom he wanted to marry is even more astonishing than the confirmation of the first surmise—that the murders were the work of a tramp—would have been. The whole family seem to have been little if any better than brutes.

The town of Stratford is endeavoring to recover from the Grand Trunk Railway Company \$25,000 paid by the town to the company in 1873 to secure the erection of a railway round-house. The plea is that many of the engines and crews have been removed to Sarnia for the company's convenience hence Stratford no longer derives the advantage to secure which the bonus was voted.

Out in the Transvaal there are not so many limitations on the game of chance as there are in this corner of the vineyard and lotteries, pool-sellers and skin games generally thrive apace. The "Standard and Diggers News" contains regularly flaring cover page advertisements of a certain series of "Monster Sweeps," amounting to from \$40,000 to \$120,000 monthly, tickets £1 each. Evidently the gaming spirit is strong in the adventurous people who rake the Rand for gold.

The Toronto Telegram remarks that "altogether the Conservative party is numerically weak in the Legislature, that party controls a supply of unorganized verbosity which could be drilled into a force for keeping the session going from November until next spring." But we have been led to believe that the Tories did not want delay—that they were chafing and fuming and eager to have the elections brought on!

President McKinley delivered a speech in Cincinnati a few days ago in the course of which he gave expression to some—coming from him—remarkable utterances: "No subject can better engage our attention than the promotion of trade and commerce at home and abroad," said the foremost representative of the gospel of commercial restriction. "Domestic conditions are sure to be improved by larger exchanges with the nations of the world." "We have made wonderful progress in this direction and have only just begun." "Commerce is a teacher and pacifier. It gives mankind knowledge of one another. Reciprocity of trade promotes reciprocity of friendship. Good trade insured good will." "It should be our settled purpose to open trade wherever we can, make our ships and our commerce messengers of peace and amity." And the McKinley idea of promoting good will is commercial restriction by a high tariff. He would club the nations of the earth into good will.

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TOWN COUNCIL.

(Continued from First Page.)

Treasurer issued for the sum of \$210.05 in favor of the Treasurer of the said society. Carried.

On motion Mr. David Hall was heard, addressing the Council as follows: "Mr. Mayor and Honorable Gentlemen of the Town Council:—It was brought up long ago what damages I was to receive from the bank that was put in by Henson last year and I supposed that the Council passed a vote here that I should have damages, but did not mention the amount, and asked me to wait until they got in some taxes. Now during the last four weeks when the flood gates of heaven have been opened oftener than usual I have had to take away forty more barrowfuls of that earth which flooded my garden from the bank above. It seems as tho it has also moved the house; at any rate about six feet of it has accumulated in the cellar, and, gentlemen, even \$50 would not more than pay me. But I'm not asking no such thing. Gentlemen of the Town Council, if I have the right to receive some little remuneration, as honorable members of the Town Council of the Town of Port Hope do what is honest between man and man. Complaints are being made to you from different parts of the town, but, gentlemen, I don't think a more just cause than mine has ever been laid before the Council. I ask a small remuneration. I ask you to do according to your own consciences and with these remarks I sit down."

Apparently unnoticed since an appeal the Mayor immediately read. Moved by Mr. Giddy, seconded by Mr. McMullen, That the Committee on Fire, Water and Light find some means of testing the candle power we receive from the Electric Light Company and report to the Council at its next meeting.

This was a very difficult task, many of the Councilors thought the Mayor said the contract (like others of a similar nature) agreed upon a nominal power. Mr. Barrett said the word "nominal" has been established by custom to represent a certain amount of power, and any court in the country will sustain the Council in demanding a certain amount of power within reason. Mr. Barrett did not believe in jumping on the Electric Light Co., it has had difficulties within the past few weeks, it is true, but when things are straightened out, good lights should be demanded, and for every night in the month. The amount of power given can be learned at the power house.

A vote resulted as follows:—Yeas—Messrs. Stevenson, Giddy, Peters, Barrett and McMullen. Nays—Messrs. Purser and Chalk. Carried.

Moved by Mr. McMullen, seconded by Mr. Barrett, That the clerk be instructed to notify the President of the Electric Light & Power Co. to put the bed of the creek, at points where said creek is crossed by Hope and Cavan streets, in a position that it can be forded in case of damage to bridges, as the blasting the channel of said creek has made it impassable, and if the said work is not started within 15 days, the Committee take legal advice, if thought advisable, that an action for damages may be entered.

Mr. Barrett suggested that the Co's. accounts be not paid until the work was done. The Councilors were of various opinions on such a suggestion, but all were unanimous that they do not hold a life-lease on any of the bridges, and if any were swept away by flood, the town might be held liable on account of the impassableness of the creek. The resolution carried.

Moved by Mr. Chalk, seconded by Mr. Stevenson, That his Worship, the Mayor, be and is hereby instructed to sign an order on the Treasurer in favor of the Electric Light & Power Co. for \$151.43, being the amount of account in full for August 22, October 22, and November 2, as per bills rendered. Carried.

Mr. Chalk reported that he had the bills for valves for hydrants, in response to a question from the Mayor, who said he would report to the Underwriters before next meeting.

The Council adjourned.

Death From A Shot.

D. M. FRASER, OF ALMONTE, FATALLY INJURED WHILE HUNTING DEER IN RENFREW COUNTY.

ALMONTE, Ont., Nov. 9.—M. M. Fraser, barrister, and proprietor of a large knitting mill, was fatally shot on Saturday.

He, with a party from Almonte, were hunting at Burns' Lake, in the township of Griffith, Renfrew County.

Mr. Fraser, having shot at a deer, which disappeared, got upon a log to be able to see farther, standing his gun on the log, holding it with his hand. The gun slipped off, and the hammer, striking against the side of the log, discharged the ball, which passed through his arm near the elbow, shattering the bone.

After the accident Mr. Fraser walked nearly half a mile, to where Mr. A. Loggie, of Hamilton, was placed. Mr. Loggie then took him in a boat to a house across the lake, where medical aid was sent for.

Nothing more serious was thought of than, perhaps, the loss of the arm. When the doctor arrived, upon opening the bandages to examine the wound, Mr. Fraser fainted, and died in a few moments from heart failure.

He was 37 years of age and leaves a widow and four small children, a widowed and a sister. He was a prominent Liberal in politics, and contested North Lanark against Joseph Jamieson in the Dominion elections of 1891.

NULTY'S AWFUL CRIME.

The Prisoner Can Give No Reason for the Deed.

HE EATS AND SLEEPS WELL.

JOLIETTE, Que., Nov. 8.—Tom Nulty, the self-confessed murderer of his three sisters and little brother at Rawdon, still lies in the cells here, where he was brought on Saturday. Nulty to-day appears to be quite unconcerned over his terrible crime and the fate which he admits he knows awaits him.

The murderer is a strange type, the product of the backwoods, where educational facilities are entirely lacking, and where existence itself is but a burden. Knowing nothing but the most degrading poverty from childhood, he can scarcely be said to be even civilized. The man eats and sleeps well.

A TERRIBLE IMPULSE.

When seen in the cell this morning, he talked quite freely of the terrible crime to which he confessed. He said he did not know why he had committed the deed. Altho his sisters and he did frequently quarrel, he said the thought of killing them had never occurred to him. The terrible impulse came over him suddenly, and after he had killed the eldest, he could not resist the desire to kill all.

NO TALK OF LYNCHING.

There is comparatively little excitement in Joliette over the presence of the murderer here, and there is no talk anywhere of lynching. People do not lynch murderers of the Nulty type. Had the victims of the Rawdon murder met their deaths, as was at first thought, at the hands of some passing tramp, who first ravished and then murdered his victims, the murderer, when caught, might, indeed, feel the fear of mob violence. But it is not so much indignation that is aroused in the case of Nulty as disgust. And disgust does not breed the desire to lynch.

FIRST SIGNS OF REMORSE.

This afternoon Tom began to show the first real signs of remorse that he has manifested since his arrest. When he came forward to the door of the cage this afternoon his demeanor had changed from that of the morning and yesterday, and he is evidently just beginning to realize his act and his position. "I am heart-broken," he said, in reply to a question, and he looked it, as he puffed quietly at the pipe which he had. Nulty still says he can give no explanation of his crime. The impulse came over him, and when it had passed the deed was committed. He now says he had no quarrel at all with his sisters and brothers.

DEATH OF MRS. J. V. JACOBS.—The death of the wife of Mr. J. V. Jacobs, formerly of Welcome, took place at Troy, N. Y., on Tuesday, the 26th of Oct. The *Evening Standard*, the *Observer*, the *Times* and *Sunday News* all have highly complimentary notices of her death. The *Sunday News* says, "Mrs. Jacob V. Jacobs died suddenly Tuesday at her home, 2179 Fifth Avenue. The deceased had been ill with pleuro-pneumonia, but a fatal termination of the disease was not anticipated. Mrs. Jacob's heart failed, and she died in a brief time. The deceased was the daughter of the late J. W. Smith, for many years proprietor of the Headquarters store on Congress street. She was born in Troy, June 21st, 1858, and had resided in Troy all her life. On March 2nd, 1885, she married J. V. Jacobs. Mrs. Jacobs was a member of the Fifth Avenue Methodist church and was an active worker in charitable and religious departments. She was one of the lady managers of the Fairview home and a member of the Robert Ross association. Mrs. Jacobs was highly esteemed, and her sudden demise will be regretted by a wide circle of friends. She is survived by her husband, Jacob V. Jacobs, deputy superintendent of public buildings of the state, and by one son, J. Smith Jacobs. One brother, William E. Smith of this city, also survives.

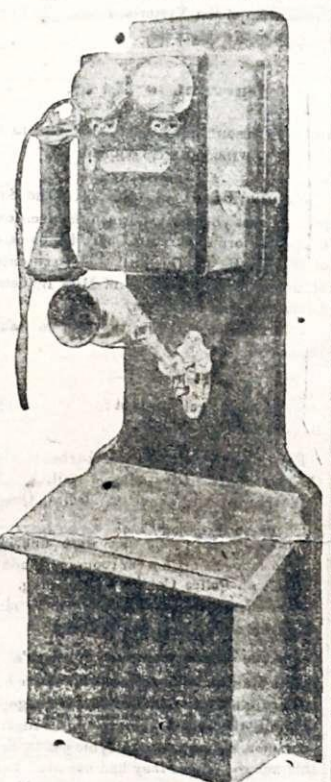

Templeman of the Victoria Times and President of the British Columbia Liberal Association as Senator to succeed Mr. McInnes.
